# Court orders trial of Hasina, Rehana, Selim

AL chief claims she was implicated in extortion case for not striking deal with govt, demands polls by April

A Dhaka court yesterday framed charges against former premier Sheikh Hasina, her sister Sheikh Rehana and cousin Sheikh Fazlul Karim Selim in a Tk 2.99 crore extortion case.

It also decided that trial of the case filed by businessman Azam J Chowdhury would begin Thursday. This is the first time charges

have been framed against a former



prime minister.

Hasina, also president of Awami League (AL), however, protested her innocence and termed the case false and motivated.

Of the three, Hasina and former health minister Selim are detained while Rehana, who lives in London, was indicted in absentia.

Meeting her lawyers after the proceedings, Hasina demanded a national election by March-April. Earlier, standing in the dock, she

said, "False cases were filed against me after I had refused to strike a deal with the government. Another reason was I never want a military dictator to assume power and become the country's president."

Addressing Judge Azizul Huq of Dhaka Metropolitan Session Judge's Court, she said she knows he is helpless as "he has to follow dictates from some special places". "I know even if you move to

#### AL asks govt to hold talks separately

Warns against inviting Jamaat

The Awami League (AL) called on the government yesterday to hold dialogue with political parties separately because they would back out if the administration sits together with all parties, including the Jamaat-e-Islami.

"The Awami League will not go to any dialogue if the Jamaat is invited there. We cannot sit together with Jamaat," AL presidium member Tofail Ahmed told reporters at the party's acting President Zillur Rahman's Gulshan residence in the capital.

## Rice import bill soars 761pc, BoP in pressure current fiscal also increased by 470

Rice import expenditure increased by 761 percent in the first six months of the current fiscal compared to the expenditure in the same period of the last fiscal, creating a pressure on the Balance of Payment (BoP), says a Bangladesh Bank (BB) statistics.

According to the BB statistics \$310 million was spent for importing rice during July-December 2007 period of the current fiscal compared to the spending of \$36 million in the corresponding period of the last fiscal.

The BB data also show wheat import expenditure rose to \$310 million in the first six months of the current fiscal marking a 57 percent rise from the spending for the purpose during the same period of the last fiscal.

LCs worth \$456 million were opened to import another 12.62 lakh tons of wheat in the first six months of the current fiscal, while during the corresponding period of the last fiscal 11.19 lakh tons of of\$238 million.

#### Purchase of 1.6 | ILLEGAL VOIP lakh tonnes of urea okayed

The advisers' committee on public purchase yesterday approved four procurement proposals including import of 160,000 tonnes of urea.

The committee, the highest cabinet body, decided to procure fertiliser immediately following growing demand from the farmers. In its proposal, industries min-

istry sought to procure urea from Bangladesh-Japan joint venture KAFCO in Chittagong and Qatar. Some 50,000 tonnes of urea will

be imported from Qatar Fertiliser Company and Ruias Fertilizer Company at a cost of Tk 48.36 crore.

The price of different varieties of coarse rice continued to fall in the retail market while it witnessed a slight rise in the wholesale market in the capital yesterday. The price of potato and onions

has remained stable in the retail market for the last three days but it soared in the wholesale market. Meanwhile, the joint forces

of rice went up by Tk 15-30 a maund (37.32 kg) in the last two days in the wholesale market at Karwan Bazar, Badamtoli and Mohammadpur Krishi Market in the capital. Guti rice was sold at Tk 1000-

1020 a maund, Swarna at Tk 1010-1025 and IRRI at Tk 990-1000 per maund yesterday while those were Tk 980-990, Tk 990-1000 and Tk 980-985 respectively on Thursday and Friday.

Wholesalers said they sold Swarna to retailers at Tk 1230 per maund and Guti and IRRI at Tk 1150 after the price of rice went up abnormally following India's announcement of not exporting rice to Bangladesh less than USS 500 per tonnes.
