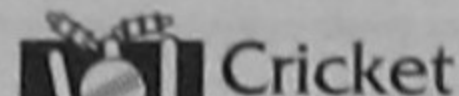


Mobil ITF tennis ready to roll

One-way journey for Polly
Second T20I against Windies today

Shaun Pollock said he didn't want his final round of international matches to be a "Polly parade" but it is inevitable that South Africa's star all-rounder will be feted as he makes his last appearances at the country's major grounds during a five-match one-day international series against the West Indies which starts at Centurion Sunday.

Arguably the most dangerous of all is West Indies skipper Chris Gayle but the extent to which he plays a role is in doubt after he missed the third and final Test because of a broken thumb as well as hamstring trouble.

Pollock was carried off the field by teammates after his final Test appearance against the same opponents in Durban last Saturday, ending a Test career which brought him 421 wickets and 3781 runs.

The opportunity to pay homage to a departing stalwart is rare in South Africa. Other leading players of the post-apartheid era such as Allan Donald, Jonty Rhodes and Gary Kirsten either had their careers ended by injury or announced their retirement too late for alasthurrah.

"It's very important that people celebrate what he's given to South African cricket and what he's achieved as an individual," said repeat of his thrilling century -- which remains the only one in any 20-overs international -- in the opening match of the World Twenty20 at the Wanderers last September. Despite Gayle's heroics, South Africa won by eight wickets.

before winning. South Africa will have a potentially potent fast bowling attack, with the tall Morne Morkel added to their squad after recovering from a stress fracture of the left foot. At some stage Morkel is expected to form a formidable partnership with Dale Steyn, who took 40 wickets in five Tests against New Zealand the West Indies.

But South African coach Mickey Arthur has taken a cautious approach to Steyn as a one-day bowler. He was not part of South Africa's World Cup squad last year and played in only one out of three one-day internationals against New Zealand earlier in the season.

Pollock, though, looks set to play in all five matches provided he is not injured, culminating in what is expected to be an emotional occasion at the Wanderers, South Africa's biggest ground, on February 3.

"It is unfortunate that we have to go on a movement to play. We hope that the federation will take the necessary steps to give the footballers a chance to earn their bread properly," said veteran Jewel Rana, another ex-national captain.

The footballers will officially inform the BFF about their demands within a couple of days.

"We are really worried about the present state of the game. If this goes on, football will be vanquished very soon," said ex-Bangladesh international Kaiser Hamid.

Other footballers present at the agitation claimed they do not belong to any club now as the contract for the B. League clubs ended last December.

"No one can force us to play for them," said many of the booters.

A BFF official, however, said that the federation will begin the B. League transfers by January as it had promised. A meeting on this issue will be held next week, he informed.

Even if the transfers start by the January, the BFF would not be able to launch the second edition of the professional league by February as the window will be for one month, which will be followed by at least two weeks' preparation for the clubs.

Today could be the day

This Test began with Australia chasing history, and India, at least in the eyes of cricket fans, looking to chase away the ghosts. They last played a Test here 15 years ago and, though the only survivor from that team would have carried happy personal memories, even he would not have forgotten the ignominy of the final innings when ten wickets fell for 59 runs.

This Test has not been won or lost yet but, incredibly, it is now Australia who have to chase their worthy opponents.

Fifteen wickets in the day would point to some fire or juice in the pitch. That was hardly the case. It was a day when bowlers were rewarded for their skills and another set of modern batsmen was found wanting against a rare, but thankfully not extinct, bowling art: swing bowling.

Australia lost the Ashes in 2005 to reverse-swing and Thursday they were undone by traditional swing. It had been a similar story in the first innings of the second Test but, unlike that day, fortune didn't desert India, who weathered a dangerous sixth-wicket partnership to finish the second day on top.

It's a match that continues to surprise. Australia began the day with joy, yet by lunch they were up against it. On a pitch that was supposedly designed to blow the Indian batsmen off their blocks, it

was the Indian pace bowlers, at best sharp but mostly medium, who teased the Australians by floating the ball up and curving it away. By the end of the day, the Australian bowlers, who couldn't have imagined they would be bowling again in the day, seemed to be gripped by nerves as they sent down a succession of no-balls and wides. Shaun Tait, pushed to hurry through the last over, sprayed a wide off a short run and then lost his run-up the next ball.

Apart from those two ill-chosen strokes in the last hour of the first day, India have made all the running in this Test so far. Finally they chose the right batting order -- with hindsight it can now be said that the eagerness to accommodate Yuvraj Singh was a great distraction -- and they were not deterred at the toss by the reputation of the pitch. It would have been a defensive decision to bowl first. And even Irfan Pathan rewarded the team management with a cameo with the bat and a lovely opening spell that accounted for the openers. He has regained his pace and swing and was strong enough to bowl 17 overs in the searing heat.

In the context of what has gone so far, it is easy to miss the significance of the partnership yesterday between Rahul Dravid and Sachin Tendulkar. In a Test where most batsmen have played and missed, their performance in the second session can be called commanding. Andrew Symonds and Adam Gilchrist, who scored his first fifty of the series, almost matched them today (Thursday) but, if their rollicking stand was based on adventurism and bold stroke-play, Dravid and Tendulkar provided technical virtuosity.

So much has already happened in the Test it is hard to believe only two days are over. But India will know that five sessions don't win a Test. Some had predicted a three-day finish for this Test but, barring a sensational collapse from India, it is expected to go into the fourth day. India will need three solid sessions to take control of the match. There will rarely be a better opportunity for their dazzling batsmen to set it up for their much more inexperienced bowlers who have, once again, surpassed all expectations.

Australia would want to keep the chase down to 300 and wouldn't want to chase more than 350. India would perhaps feel secure with a 450-run advantage. The battle for those hundred runs would be fascinating. Brett Lee and Stuart Clark have been Australia's outstanding bowlers but Ponting will expect Tait, who has replaced the man who is not only their main spin option but a handy No. 8, to step up on Friday.

Australia are behind in this match but it is not beyond them. Nothing is. They have not racked up this winning streak with the help of umpires. They will fight like hell to maintain it. Expect another cracking Friday. Perhaps the decisive one.

Kumble admitted that he was motivated to prove his critics wrong and criticism spurred him to strive for better results.

The first game of Keegan's second spell as manager will be Saturday's Premier League clash at home to Bolton.

By then, it should be clear if, as many have predicted, he will be joined by Alan Shearer, the former club captain who is also the Magpies' record goal scorer.

Shearer has admitted he would listen to any offer from the coach who signed him for 15 million pounds when he was the hottest property in English football.

manager's job without any prior coaching experience.

He added: "It remains an ambition of mine to manage one day, when that will be I don't really know. But the fans have what they want. They want entertainment, they want passion and they want commitment. They haven't seen that of late."

"One thing they will be guaranteed with Kevin is that they will get all of those things, everyone is excited up here. Newcastle is in his heart and he wants to do so well for them. He failed to win a trophy there when he was manager last time but you can bet your bottom dollar that he will give it a right good go this time around."

Nigel Pearson, United's caretaker manager, is expected to leave the club as Keegan moves to bring in his own coaching staff.

to victory over 70th-ranked Bollelli in just one hour 32 minutes.

Djokovic, humped with expectations that he might be the young gun to end the Roger Federer domination of men's tennis and seeded to face the Swiss star in the semifinals, will next play American Sam Querrey.

Baghdatis, the Cypriot 15th seed and a runner-up to Federer two years ago, began strongly against Safin but was drawn into a dogfight with the 58th-ranked Russian before prevailing, 6-4, 6-4, 2-6, 3-6, 6-2.

It sets up an enticing third round match with Australian Lleyton Hewitt, who survived a four-set struggle against lowly-ranked Denis Istomin of Uzbekistan.

Elsewhere on day four, Spanish fifth seed David Ferrer knocked out Juan Martin Del Potro with the Argentine retiring injured after losing the opening two sets, 6-3, 6-4.

Argentine 10th seed David Nalbandian wore down Australian Peter Luczak 4-6, 7-5, 6-4, 6-1 and will play Spanish 22nd seed Juan Carlos Ferrero in the third round after Ferrer downed Australian wildcard Alun Jones.

American 12th seed James Blake progressed to a third round match with Frenchman Sebastien Grosjean after a 6-3, 6-2, 6-2 over compatriot Michael Russell.

Federer's victory stretched his record over the 36th-ranked Santoro to 9-2 with four of his last

five wins coming in Grand Slam tournaments.

"I really got off to a good start. And after that it was tough for him. I really didn't give him much," Federer said. "I think I really played him in a very smart way."

"We had a few nice points. You always usually have them against Fabrice. But sometimes you wonder where they are."

"Then all of a sudden they're right there. So it was fun to play against him, even if the score was very one-sided."

Santoro was effusive in his praise of Federer's tennis, saying "I feel like he's coming from somewhere else."

Federer has been unrivalled as world number one since February 2004 and has won three of last year's four Grand Slams for the third time in four years.

But he comes into the Australian Open for the first time since 2004 Wimbledon with his top ranking under threat.

He could lose the position he has held with a record 207 consecutive weeks if he fails to reach the semifinals and world number two Rafael Nadal goes on to win the Australian title.

Djokovic once again controlled his match with Bollelli, cruising along with nine service breaks.

"It's always good to start a Grand Slam with two straight-set wins," he said. "I just needed really to stay in the match and stay focused, just be aggressive."
