### Suharto dies

AFP, Jakarta

Former president Suharto, who ruled Indonesia with an iron fist for over three decades, died on Sunday aged 86, his family and police said at a Jakarta hospital.

"Father has returned to God," Suharto's eldest daughter, Siti Hariyanti "Tutut" Rukmana, told reporters breaking down in tears.

"We ask that if he had any faults, please forgive them ... may he be absolved of all his mistakes," she

His death came more than three weeks after he was admitted to hospital with heart, lung and kidney problems, although he had surprised his doctors by his resilience despite being in a critical condition.

His team of doctors said earlier Sunday that Suharto had suffered multiple organ failure overnight, and had been resuscitated but remained unconscious.

"Our former president HM Suharto has passed away around 13:10 (0610 GMT)," Dicky Sondani, the sub-district police chief, told reporters at the hospital.

#### Deal to take -2 more weeks

The final details of the government deal to export 500,000 tonnes of rice from India to Bangladesh, at a price lower than US\$500 per tonne, might take two more weeks to complete.

Indian High Commissioner to Bangladesh Pinak Ranjan Chakravarty told reporters of this yesterday after attending a monthly luncheon meeting of the Foreign Investors' Chamber of Commerce and Industry (FICCI) held at a city hotel.

The Indian envoy said that the deal outlined sale of rice to Bangladesh at a cost below US\$500 per tonne through government appointed exporters only.

### Two robbers beaten to death in Pirojpur

Two robbers were killed in a mob beating at Madra village in Swarupkathi upazila Saturday midnight.

Police said a gang of robbers, numbering 10-12, swooped on the house of Nityananda at Pashchim Joushar village and looted cash and valuables at about 12:30am.

They hacked Nityananda's neighbour Gouranga Mandal, 38 with sharp weapon when he chased the gang, leaving him criti-

cally injured. Later, the same gang looted cash and valuables from the house of Badshah Miah at Madra village.

But hearing shouts of the family members, the villagers rushed to the spot and caught two of the robbers while the others managed to flee the scene.

They beat them indiscriminately leaving them dead on the

Identities of the deceased could not be known immediately.

On information, police rushed to the spot and sent the bodies to Sadar Hospital morgue for autopsy. Injured Gouranga Mandal was

## AL demands fair probe, justice

UNB, Dhaka

Awami League (AL) leaders yesterday urged the caretaker government to fairly investigate the terrorist attacks and killings including the murder of former finance minister Shah AMS Kibria.

The killers of Kibria and masterminds of the August 21 grenade attacks on an AL meeting on Bangabandhu Avenue are yet to be brought to justice, said AL Presidium Member Abdur Razzak at a discussion marking the third death anniversary of Kibria.

"It is now a public question as to why the state has failed to unearth the culprits."

Razzak said the terrorists and their godfathers could not be arrested during the previous BNP-Jamaat regime as "top men of that government were the masterminds of the brutal attacks".

"Now people hope that the caretaker government will fairly investigate the terrorist attacks and killings," he said.

Razzak demanded that investigation report of the grenade attack and Kibria's killing be published. Kibria was assassinated in a grisly grenade attack in his hometown in Habiganj on January 27, 2005.

Emergency should be lifted at the earliest BEI discussion told

The state of emergency should be withdrawn at the earliest, allowing space for political activities, international relations analyst Professor Imtiaz Ahmed said yesterday. Following the presentation of a

report titled "State of Democracy in South Asia" at a discussion organised by Bangladesh Enterprise Institute (BEI) in the capital, Prof Ahmed also told journalists that if the emergency is not withdrawn or political activities are not allowed, the people might be impatient and its consequences might be compli-

Prof Ahmed, a teacher of International Relations at Dhaka University and the coordinator of

the study on the State of Democracy in South Asia, said the caretaker government does not have much time to meet its challenges and therefore it should first relax the rules of state of emer-

gency and then withdrawit. Commerce and Education Adviser Dr Hossain Zillur Rahman was the chief guest of the programme while noted economist Professor Rehman Sobhan and Dr Rounaq Jahan, professor of Columbia University, took part at the discussion presided by BEI President Farooq Sobhan.

"Military intervention is not favourable for the progress of democracy," said Prof Ahmed, recommending the formation of SEE PAGE 15 COL 2

Barack Obama routed Hillary Rodham Clinton in the racially charged South Carolina primary Saturday night, regaining campaign momentum in the prelude to a Feb. 5 coast-to-coast competition for more than 1,600 Democratic National Convention delegates. "The choice in this election is

not about regions or religions or genders," Obama said at a boisterous victory rally. "It's not about rich versus poor, young versus old and it's not about black versus white. It's about the past versus the future." The audience chanted "Race
