Implement election roadmap to boost investors' confidence

US Charge d'Affaires urges govt

US Charge d'Affaires Denise Rollins yesterday urged the caretaker government to continue implementation of its commitment to the election roadmap to boost investors' confidence and give business greater certainty.

"The more the CG can show its commitment to the roadmap, the greater confidence the investors will have in Bangladesh," she told the Annual General Meeting (AGM) of International Business Forum of Bangladesh (IBFB) at Hotel Sheraton.

Law Adviser AF Hassan Arif stressed the need for more and more interaction between the government and the stakeholders to remove bottlenecks and improve the investor confidence and the better business climate.

"Business problems will be solved to a large extent through continued interaction in the Better Business Forum," he told reporters after the plenary session.

IBFB President Mahmudul Islam Chowdhury voiced concern over the fear factors of the business community and urged the government to eliminate the fears.

Rollins said the government's election preparations, anticorruption campaign and efforts to reform rules and regulations all impact on investors while invest-

CPD training on WTO, trade policy

The course has three major learning tools: lectures, assignments and negotiation simulations.

'Take nat'l programme to combat diabetes'

Diabetic Association of Bangladesh (DAB) at a press conference yesterday urged the government to take a national programme to combat diabetes as around 60 lakh people in the country have been suffering from this non-communicable disease.

The DAB is working on preparing the draft for national programme on diabetes to boost the activities in preventing the disease, speakers at the press conference said.

DAB organised the press conference at its auditorium at Birdem hospital where it also accorded a reception to Foreign Adviser Iftekhar Ahmed Chowdhury for his role in the passage of a Bangladesh resolution adopted by the United Nations to designate the World Diabetes Day on November 14 as a United Nations day.

The UN announced the Diabetes Day asa UN dayin December 20, 2006. Iftekhar was the permanent representative of Bangladesh to the UN during that time.

Terming the recognition from UN a milestone for Bangladesh and other countries to combat the disease, Iftekhar said the announcement from

UN will strengthen the activities to prevent diabetes. Around 30 crore people across the world have been suffering from diabetes.

Although the country had been observing the Diabetes Day every year as elsewhere across the globe with the support of International Diabetes Federation (IDF), there was no national programme on diabetes. But as the UN has recognised the day, all the member countries would formulate national policy and would increase awareness programmes in this regard, the speakers said.

Different government organisations would be incorporated to implement the programme, they added.

Though 65 percent diabetes is preventable, a huge number of people have been suffering from the disease and the number of diabetic patients has been increasing day by day. If we can change our diet system and exclude fast food from the diet, give up smoking and engage ourselves in physical activities much, we could easily prevent the

disease, the experts said. DAB President Prof AK Azad Khan, Secretary General Prof Saifuddin and ProfHazera Mahtab were also present.

OCs asked not to assign more than 9 cases to IO at a time

The Dhaka Metropolitan Police (DMP) authorities have ordered officers-in-charges (OC) of all police stations in the city not to assign more than nine cases at a time to an investigation officer for ensuring fair investigation.

The authorities have also directed the police stations not to register any case before checking its authenticity. The move has been taken to reduce harassment of people through false

DMP Commissioner Naim Ahmed disclosed these moves to the press after its regular crime conference at Rajarbagh Telecom auditorium yesterday.

"Police will take legal measures if anyone files any false case," Naim Ahmed told newsmen replying to a

He said the move to assign no more than nine cases has been taken to reduce burden on the case investigation officers and ensure fair investigation.

Replying to a question, the DMP chief said under DMP Ordinance punitive measures have been taken against 45 policemen while 20 policemen lost their jobs after their involvement in corruption were found in two months ending on December 31.

The DMP commissioner said the overall law and order situation has marked a gradual improvement in the last three months. The statistics show a total of 2,304 cases were filed in October while the number of cases filed in November and December were 2248 and 2148 respectively.

However, the number of robberies has increased during the last three months. A total of 72 incidents of robbery were recorded in December, 61 in November and 54 in October.

The DMP commissioner said they are sincerely working to combat crime and succeeded in bringing down the number of crimes. He said they have already formed

Protect whistle-blowers in graft cases

Say civil society organisations

Civil society organisations from some 100 countries attending the UN Anti-Corruption Conference risk. here have sought better protection for whistle-blowers in graft cases.

Protection of whistle-blowers is an important benchmark for gauging governmental commitment to fighting corruption, they said yesterday. Whistleblowers refer to indi-

viduals who disclose inprogress crimes to authorities, often at considerable risk to themselves. The organisations demanded that the states parties to the United

Nations Convention Against Corruption (UNCAC) provide comprehensive protection programmes for whistleblowers.

In a joint statement issued after a discussion on whistleblowers and witness protection programmes,

the Coalition of Civil Society Friends of UNCAC said governments should be able to provide "long term" guarantees to those at ers.

perceived as disloyal, whistle blowing carries severe consequences, including retaliation in the workplace, social stigmatisation and, in extreme cases, the threat of physical harm.

The coalition, comprising more than 70 organisations from 34 countries, was established in early 2006 to promote the ratification implementation and monitoring of the landmark UNCAC, the first global anti-corruption treaty, adopted by the UN General Assembly in October 2003.

"We will push the governments to protect whistle-blowers by

treating them as defenders of human rights," coalition member Devendra Raj Panday told report-

Panday, a former finance minis

ter of Nepal, said whistle-blowers deserved to be treated like rights defenders because they were exercising their freedom of expression, a human right.

He said the coalition was now deliberating technical strategies to be proposed in the UN anticorruption conference.

One of the strategies under discussion is how to secure whistle-blowers adequately, especially after they "blow the whistle" on corrupt officials but before investigation and prosecution has reached a conclusion.

Pressure from civil society communities was needed to monitor the implementation of protection programmes, Panday said.

HC asks govt to submit report on steps for safety of construction workers

The High Court on Tuesday asked the government to explain within four weeks why its failure to establish a government agency to enforce the Bangladesh National Building Construction Code, 2006 is not in breach of the law, says a press release.

The High Court also directed the government to submit a statement setting out what steps it has taken to ensure the safety of construction workers since the Code became a law in November 2006.

The rule was issued upon the secretaries of the ministries of housing and public works, labour and manpower, and environment and forest, the chairman of Rajdhani Unnayan Katripakkha (Rajuk) and REHAB, an organisation of the developers. The rule came following a pub-

lic interest petition filed by Bangladesh Occupational Safety, Health and Environment Foundation (OSHE) and Bangladesh Legal Aid and Services Trust (BLAST).

The petitioners argued that the failure by the government to establish of a functioning agency led to deaths of at least 50 construction workers, which were reported in national newspapers in 2007. The actual number of deaths in this sector is likely to be much higher.


