Present CHT situation threat for future

Say eminent citizens

Expressing grave concern over the situation of the hill people in Chittagong Hill Tracts (CHT), eminent citizens yesterday said it is frightening and might explode anytime, causing ripple effect across the country.

Quoting hill people, they said by continuing and strengthening settlement of the Bangalees in the hills and the land of the indigenous people, Bangalee settlers and the hill people are set against each

These observations were made in a report presented to journalists at the National Press Club in the city yesterday following the citizens' visit to CHT during January

Pankaj Bhattacharya, journalists Kamal Lohani and Syed Abul Maksud, Dr Rashid E Mahbub, Dr Shaurav Shikder of Dhaka University, social worker Belal Ahmed and former additional secretary Rabindranath Trivedi were in the team that toured the area.

Presiding over the programme, Prof Zillur Rahman Siddiqui, former vice chancellor of Jahangirnagar University, said the present situation prevailing in CHT is a threat to the future of Bangladesh.

As per regional council leaders, there are over one lakh hill refugees, but there is none to address the problem, Prof Ajoy said, adding that Bangalees are also occupying the religious structures.

The present ratio of hill people and Bangalees is now 52:48, but in the next census it will be tilted towards Bangalees, he said. Hill people think the number of voters will also override the number of the hill people in future, which is a

BDB, JSD in favour of 'consensus govt' after election

The leaders of Bikalpa Dhara Bangladesh (BDB) and Jatiya Samajtantrik Dal (JSD) yesterday said they would back the move for forming a 'consensus government' after the national election.

A consensus government comprising the like-minded political parties could be formed after the election, said the leaders at a joint press briefing at KC Memorial Clinic in the capital's Baridhara after holding a two-hour-long meeting.

However, they said it is too early to begin the process of forming such an alliance as the election schedule is yet to be announced.

The leaders of both the parties agreed to place common proposals before the caretaker government while holding political dialogue with it. "The elections must be held by

December as per the electoral roadmap," said BDB President Prof AQM Badruddoza Chowdhury. "A national consensus govern-

ment comprising the like-minded political parties can be formed after the election," he said. JSD President Hasanul Haque Inu

said a national consensus government can be formed for at least five to ten years after the national election. He said they want the election to

be held as early as possible. But it must not be held in a disorganised way, he added.

"We do not want the process o forming a consensus government to begin before the election schedule is announced," said BDB Secretary General Maj (retd) MA Mannan.

BDP Presidium members Arshad-uz-Zaman, Brig Gen (retd) Giasuddin Chowdhury, and JSD General Secretary Syed Jafar Sajjad, among others, were present.

Hannan Shah granted HC bail again

A division bench comprising Justice Khademul Islam Chowdhury and Justice MA Hye, following a petition, granted the bail and issued a rule upon the government to explain why the detainee should not be exonerated from the case under EPR.

Hannan Shah, adviser to detained BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia, was first arrested on November 7 last year from his DOHS residence in Dhaka. He was granted bail several times by the High Court but he was re-arrested.

On February 7, he was arrested soon after he was released from a jail in Narayanganj.
