Pola Uddin hails govt's handling of Sidr aftermath

Visiting British-Bangladeshi Member of the House of Lords Baroness Pola Uddin appreciated the caretaker government's performance in handling the aftereffects of super-cyclone Sidrin the coastal belt.

She made the remarks during a discussion when she paid a courtesy call on Chief Adviser Fakhruddin Ahmed at his office yesterday.

During the meeting, Pola Uddin, on behalf of herself and the Bangladeshi expatriates in the UK, handed over a cheque for Tk 10 lakh to the chief adviser in aid of the cycloneaffected people.

UK-based NGO Muslim Aid worked for water purification at Sharankhola in Bagerhat district while Pola Uddin coordinated from the House of Lords raising money for the Sidrvictims.

Thanking her for the donations, the chief adviser said now rehabilitation and reconstruction works are going on in the Sidr-hit areas and emphasised more capacity building and permanence through the cooperation of development partners.

"We must think for long-term measure," he told Pola. Adverse impacts of climate change on Bangladesh were also discussed.

The Chief Adviser said the World Bank is taking initiative to hold a meeting on Climate Change in London that will be very helpful. The baroness visited some

The location of the earthquake was near Qamdo in China and the distance of the epicenter was 957kms northeast from the Dhaka Seismic Centre, the release added.

Frame stringent laws to ensure urban sanitation

Say experts

Expressing concern over health and environmental hazards caused by indiscriminate dumping of solid wastes, urban planners yesterday suggested incorporating the issue in the national policies and framing stringent laws to ensure urban

They also proposed establishing a secretariat, which will engage itself in policy formulation and sharing best practices among different city corporations on solid waste management with a target of recycling 80 percent of waste in the next five years.

These recommendations came at the Second Bangladesh Waste Management Conference-2008 organised by Dhaka City Corporation (DCC) and Japan treatment, which is a serious health International Cooperation Agency

(JICA) at a city hotel yesterday. corporations -- Dhaka, Chittagong, Barisal, Khulna, Rajshahi and Sylhet -- took part in the daylong conference that put emphasis on appropriate urban planning




> While formulating action plans for the solid waste management of the city corporations, role of ward commissioners, communities, departments of local governments, central government, NGOs and private sector should be clearly defined, the reports said.

"Problems, solutions and lessons learned from city corporations should also be shared among themselves for improving services," it said, adding that human resources can also be transferred from one city corporation to another for sharing expertise.

Reduce BCS quota, ensure merit-based appointment'

Speakers at a roundtable yesterday urged the government to reduce the amount of quota in the BCS examinations to a reasonable level and ensure merit-based appointment for the sake of proper development of the country. The provision for 55 percent quota

in the Bangladesh Civil Service (BCS) examinations has created an obstacle to utilising the talents of the majority population, resulting in an incompetent public administration, they said.

Many speakers also demanded that the quota system be abolished, saying that the incompetent people, who are appointed through quota system, have brought the administration to a standstill.

The 'Student Parishad', a platform of Dhaka University students who have been demonstrating for the cancellation of the quota system, organised the roundtable at the National Press Club.

chairman of the University Grant Commission, said the Public Service Commission (PSC) should reform the quota system to restore its image.

"Quota for the freedom fighters' children should be reduced to 10 percent and there is no need for women's, indigenous and district quotas. We should consider a quota for the people with disabilities and the total amount of quota should not exceed 20 percent," he added.

He said a number of organisations submitted several reforms proposal of the PSC, but none of them was brought to public or imple-

Sharing his experience in his classroom at the finance department of Dhaka University, Prof M Prof M Asaduzzaman, former Mujahidul Islam said students who got admitted under the quota system cannot keep pace with other students, as they lack talents.

He called for abolishing all the quotas except the quota for the freedom fighters.

In the BCS examinations, a total of 55 percent of appointments is made under four quotas -- 30 percent reserved under freedom fighters' children quota, 10 percent under women's quota, 10 percent under district quota and five percent under indigenous quota.
