'Give Yuvraj more time'

Former cricket captain Kapil Dev on Friday said out of form batsman Yuvraj Singh should be given a long rope to rediscover his touch but the left-hander should not take his place in the team for granted.

"Of course, he should be given enough chances but it should not be lost to him that that players earn their places because of their performance," Kapil said "When you play you are blocking the place of someone else. If you play well, nobody can leave you out. If you are not playing well, naturally you cannot be in the team," he added.

The former all-rounder heaped praise on the young Indian bowlers for their "excellent" performance in Australia but advised them to ensure injury did not affect their promising careers.

They are bowling excellently in Australia. They have proven that they have the talent to unsettle the best batsmen in the world.

"They are all young and in order to sustain their top form, they should take care of their body so that they stay away from injury," Kapil said.

"My message to the young bowlers is that when you are injured, the country suffers. Indian bowlers have been injury-prone for a long time, so they have to take care of themselves and see that injury does not break their sustained peak form."

Local hero Adam Gilchrist scored a fairytale century in a manof-the-match performance that lifted Australia to

victory in their tri-series one-day game against Sri Lanka at the WACA Friday.

After his 118 helped the hosts make 236 from 49.4 overs, Sri Lanka blew the chance to go top of the triseries ladder when several batsmen threw their wickets away as they were dismissed for 173 in the 46th over, giving Australia a 63-run win.

Classy left-hander Kumar Sangakkara anchored the Sri Lankan chase with 80 and was the last man to fall, but received no support and could do little but watch as poor shots cost wickets at the other end.

The tourists' last five men fell for just 14 runs as they handed Australia a bonus point and top spot on the ladder.

Spinner Brad Hogg (2-41) rocked Sri Lanka with two wickets in as many balls, seamer Nathan Bracken claimed 3-31 and Mitchell Johnson led the Australian fightback with the ball, taking 3-29. But the match was all about

Gilchrist, the 36-year-old lefthander quitting international cricket at the end of the series and playing his final innings at his home ground. The wicketkeeper-batsman was

given an emotional farewell when he eventually fell in the 44th over, holing out to Chamara Kapugedera at midoff from a leading edge off impressive speedster Lasith Malinga.

He had faced 132 balls, hitting nine fours and three sixes to notch up his 16th one-day century, Australia winning every match in which he has reached three figures. Gilchrist said it was a best way to

end his career at the WACA. "It turned out to be the perfect day, really," he said.
