"I hope our batsmen will put up at least 250 runs on the board and if The advice was simple: bowl on they can do that, anything can happen," he said.


A great Hindi movie fan, Shahadat quipped, "Film abhi bi baki hai (the movie has not ended)"

The overwhelming win gave New Zealand the five-match series 3-1, with one game tied, and importantly gave them a psychological boost going into the three lests next month.

"I went back in my crease when I saw it pitched short and when it bounced twice I knew I could not be given out so I hit it up in the air.
