The government is going to promulgate ordinances on local government commission, city corporations and pourashavas by the end of this month aiming to grant more power to the local government

An inter-ministerial meeting presided by Local Government and Rural Development (LGRD) Adviser Anwarul Iqbal yesterday finalised the drafts of Local Government Commission Ordinance 2008, City Corporation Ordinance 2008 and Pourashava Ordinance 2008.

"We have finalised the drafts of the ordinances and will send those to the advisory council after March 21 when the chief adviser returns, Anwarul Iqbal said. He was addressing a press brief-

ing after the meeting at the conference room of Local Government Division. In the meantime, the drafts

Hasina should be treated abroad

Concludes medical board after AL president's admission to hospital

Detained Awami League (AL) President Sheikh Hasina was admitted to the city's Square Hospital yesterday, and a panel of seven doctors there unanimously recommended she should be sent to the US for ear treatment.

Prof Mohammad Abu Tahir, Prof Tofail Ahmed, Prof Pran Gopal Dutta, Prof Modasser Ali, Prof MU Kabir Chowdhury, Dr ABM Abdullah and Dr MH Millat examined her for over an hour after her admission in the morning. They concluded there is no alternative to sending her abroad for treatment if she is to avoid permanently impaired hearing.

The Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) yesterday filed two separate graft cases against nine people including seven present and former high officials of state-owned Rupantarita Prakritik Gas Company Limited (RPGCL) for embezzling over Tk 11 crore.

One of the former RPGCL officials who have been accused in both the cases currently holds a high rank at Dhaka Wasa (Water Supply and Sewerage Authority). Abdul Mazed, an assistant

director of the ACC, yesterday filed the cases with Khilkhet Police Station under Sections 409 and 109 of Penal Code and Section 5(2) of Corruption Prevention Act

The ACC in its first case accused eight individuals including six present and former officials of RPGCL-run CNG conversion workshop of causing a loss of over Tk 1.53 crore to the exchequer throughout the period of 1993-

Find out ways to put lid on soaring prices

CA asks advisers, agencies; govt mulls edible oil import by TCB, BDR

Chief Adviser Fakhruddin Ahmed yesterday directed advisers and agencies concerned to find out mechanisms to keep prices of essentials, especially edible oil, under control.

Sources said the government is weighing options, including importing edible oil through the Trading Corporation of Bangladesh and Bangladesh Rifles and reducing duty on oil import, to curb the unusual price hike.

Expressing deep concern over the current price situation, the chief adviser directed the ministries to find out the reasons behind the abnormal increase of prices of has found that the prices of edible essentials.

The directive came at a meeting with Finance and Planning Adviser Dr Mirza Azizul Islam, Commerce Adviser Hossain Zillur Rahman, National Board of Revenue (NBR)

Chairman Muhammed Abdul Mazid and representatives from Bangladesh Bank and edible oil refiners at the office of the chief

The meeting agreed upon a new strategy but nothing was disclosed because of strategic reasons.

"The meeting has taken specific decisions but I will not tell you that now," Commerce Adviser Zillur Rahman told reporters after coming back to his office.

"We will finalise and disclose the strategies after having follow-up meetings with the government agencies concerned and other stakeholders," he said.

A commerce ministry survey oil increased on grounds of price hike on the international market although no new consignments of edible oil reached the country between February 25 and March 9.

The prices of edible oil rather

decreased on the international market last week but it had no impact on the local market.

Zillur said they are going to take some effective measures immediately to ease the edible oil prices.

He said at the meeting the chief adviser discussed possible measures in this regard.

The meeting considered strengthening the market monitoring system to see if there is any flaw in it, if new intervention mechanism is necessary or the government could forecast the market situation, Zilluradded.

Commerce Secretary Feroz Ahmed said the millers and wholesalers are blaming each other for the increasing edible oil price.

"We are monitoring how much edible oil was imported during the last couple of weeks, how much was supposed to be available and how much import is in the

Two huge suicide car bombs ripped through a police building and an advertising office in Lahore mychair." Tuesday, killing 26 people and posing a fresh challenge to Pakistan's incoming government. The deadliest blast demolished

Rescue workers in orange jackets frantically clawed through the debris at the site of the blast at the Federal Investigation Agency (FIA), which deals mainly with immigration and people smuggling, an AFP reporter said.
