## CU non-resident students cry fiasco

Thousands of students shuttle back and forth around 22 kilometers everyday between Chittagong city and Chittagong University (CU) to attend their classes due to lack of adequate dormitories on the campus.

A total of 18,000 students have been studying in 35 departments under six faculties and three institutes at the university. Of them, over 12,000 students are to attend their classes by shuttle trains or buses from the port city, hampering their academic life seriously.

There are six dormitories --Shah Jalal Hall, Shah Amanat Hall, Suhrawardy Hall, Alaol Hall, F Rahman Hall and Abdur Rab Hall, for male students and three dormitories Shamsunnahar Hall, Pritilata Hall and Khaleda Zia Hall, for the female ones.

The dormitories can provide accommodation for around 4,500 students, only one-fourth sources said. of the students.
