

In Stefan Frowein's (EC Ambassador to Bangladesh) view, "Cultural cooperation between partners is crucial in creating confidence and trust. Opening oneself to the mutual exchange of cultural wealth leads to building common interests". Within the framework of the EC/ Bangla-

desh Cooperation Agreement, (guidelines fixing the way in which partners work), is the Joint Commission held every second year, alternating between Dhaka and Brussels.
