3,510 RAIL CLIPS GRP, railway investigators differ over theft timing

Government Railway Police (GRP) and Bangladesh Railway investigators made contradictory claims about the 3,510 sleeper clips stolen from train lines in the capital. The GRP investigators claimed that thieves took at least two to three days to steal the clips while Bangladesh Railway investigators claim the theft was committed overnight.

A three-member committee of Bangladesh Railway headed by its engineering chief was formed Friday to investigate the theft of the clips from rail lines between Banani and Cantonment stations. The GRP is also investigating the incident.

EARTHQUAKE

Bangladesh at high risk, but lacks preparedness

Bangladesh due to its geographic location has a high risk of experiencing earthquakes but the country does not have the capacity to combat such natural calamity, experts said at a roundtable yester-

They pointed out that unplanned urbanisation, over population, poorly constructed structures, lack of coordination between institutions concerned, inadequacy of recovery tools and lack of awareness are putting the nation at high risk.

The experts suggested launching massive earthquake-related awareness campaigns, retrofitting existing buildings, strengthening

building inspection system, proper implementation of building code and training for masons, architects and engineers.

Response and Preparedness Activities on Disaster (Nirapad) in association with USAID and Care organised the roundtable titled "Earthquake risk in Bangladesh: Preparedness and limitations" at Cirdap auditorium in the city to Preparedness Day 2008 today.

ASM Maksud Kamal, an expert on earthquake and tsunami preparedness of Comprehensive Disaster Management Programme (CDMP), in his keynote paper said during the last 150 years seven major earthquakes took place in

the country and two of them had their epicentres in Bangladesh.

He said there are four tectonic source zones that can lead to major Network for Information earthquakes in future and the faults are the Meghalaya fault zone to the north, the Tripura fault zone to the east, the Sub-Dauki fault zone to the north east and the Bografault zone to the west.

If an earthquake occurs outside the country then three cities-mark the National Disaster Dhaka, Sylhet and Chittagongmight be badly affected, he said adding that rapid urbanisation has accentuated the problem of vul-

Meanwhile judgement in the arms case filed against Khondaker Akhter Hamid Paban, son of Khaleda-appointed BNP Secretary General Khondaker Delwar Hossain, and four others, will be delivered today.

The study shows the number of arsenicosis patients are increasing alarmingly due to want of safe water sources in affected areas.

The study conducted under the project titled "Sustainable Arsenic Mitigation under Integrated Local Government System (SAM-ILGS)" also finds many identified patients died in last five years without proper treatment.

The first government arsenic project titled Bangladesh Arsenic Mitigation and Water Supply Project (BAMWSP) started in January 1998 and continued until June 2006.

Kawahara said they found 799 lakh. patients in Chowgachha upazila in Jessore while the previous BAMWSP found only 275 patients

"The main reason of increasing number of patients is that previ-"The actual number of patients ously the patients were identified

in the country could be even more by the field workers under BAMWSP whereas the patients have been identified under the new [SAM-ILGS] project by health assistants and confirmed by doctors," Kawahara added.

He said BAMWSP identified around 38,000 arsenicosis patients in 268 upazilas across the country. But if the areas are surveyed again and doctors confirm the patients, the number would cross even 1

He emphasised initiating a fresh survey on the most vulnerable areas in Comilla, Chandpur, Chapainawabganj and Faridpur.

Arab summit wraps up without Lebanon breakthrough

An Arab summit failed on Sunday to clinch a breakthrough on Lebanon, spotlighting the rift between host Syria and stay-away US allies, which blame Beirut's political crisis on Damascus.

A Damascus Declaration -which Arab League chief Amr Mussa read out at the end of the two-day summit -- called on Lebanon to elect a consensus president and re-endorsed an Arab initiative for peace with Israel.

They also urged Iraq "to disband all militias without exception ... and speed up the building and training of the Iraqi armed and security

forces... in preparation for the withdrawal of foreign troops from

The leaders called on Arab states to bolster their diplomatic representation in Iraq by opening up embassies in the war-torn

On Lebanon, "Arab leaders stress their commitment to the Arab initiative to solve the Lebanese crisis, and call on Lebanese leaders to elect consensus candidate General Michel Sleiman at the time agreed," in the final resolutions.
