Stephen Evans new British envoy in Dhaka

Stephen Nicholas Evans has been appointed the next British High Commissioner to Bangladesh. He succeeds Anwar Choudhury

who will be completing his fouryear tenure to Dhaka shortly. According to an announcement made by the Foreign and

Commonwealth Office (FCO) in London yesterday, Evans will take up his appointment in Dhaka in June this year. A press release from the British

High Commission in Dhaka said Anwar Choudhury would shortly be completing his four-year tenure as British High Commissioner to Bangladesh. Choudhury, whose position in

Bangladesh had been extended by a year in April 2007, has been confirmed in his new appointment to a critical senior diplomatic position at the Foreign and Commonwealth Office in London.

Judicial probe body wants code of conduct for DU teachers, students

The Judicial Enquiry Commission that investigated the violent incidents on and around Dhaka University (DU) campus in August last year has asked the government to formulate a code of conduct for the DU teachers, students and

dents, officers and employees of the university will have to be specified by formulating a code of conduct. And they will have to be apprised of it and compelled to followit. Otherwise, administrative and disciplinary actions will have to be taken against an individual [in case of violation of the code of conduct]," the commission said in

The report, made public on university.

March 23, also suggested that orientation classes for newly appointed teachers and freshers should be arranged to teach them the code of conduct to ensure a congenial academic atmosphere on the campus.

Chief of the judicial commission Justice Habibur Rahman Khan placed the report to Chief Adviser "Behaviour of teachers, stu- Fakhruddin Ahmed on November 15 last year with a 28-point recommendation that include a ban on slavish teachers and student politics by amending the Dhaka University Order 1973 and repealing the political parties regulations 1976, if necessary.

Section 56 (2) of the Dhaka University Order 1973 allows teachers to 'keep association' with any lawful organisation outside the

"The service condition shall be determined without any prejudice to the freedom of the teacher or officer to hold any political party views and to keep association with any lawful organisation outside the university and shall be clearly stated in the contract," it says.

Referring to this, the judicial commission says, "It means there is no bar on teachers from becoming members of any political party. This order allows excessive democratisation resulting in groupings among the teachers but there is no provision in it to ensure accountability of teachers, the commission

expressed the hope that these would make democratic institutions in the country sustainable. The UN secretary general's

appreciation came when Foreign Affairs Adviser Iftekhar Ahmed Chowdhury called on him at the UN Headquarters in New York on Monday afternoon, according to a foreign ministry press release. The foreign affairs adviser

arrived in New York earlier in the day and was scheduled to chair a session on poverty alleviation and education yesterday. He will also address the General Assembly's plenary on Millennium Development Goals in his capacity as chairman of Least Developed Countries.

Iftekhar informed the UN secretary general about the determination of the caretaker government to hold "free, fair and credible elections in accordance with the road map before the end of December this year" which the secretary general "deeply appreciated" and offered any logistic assistance in this regard that the government may wish to seek.

Mahmud yesterday criticised the government's decision to take loans from International Monetary Fund (IMF) and a foreign bank to tackle liquidity crisis. He observed, "It cannot be a

permanent solution. If they [government] take loans from external sources today to pay for fuel and rice imports, what will they do to solve those problems next year?" Mahmud, chairman of the

Institute of Microfinance, was speaking at a seminar in the city on 'Food Crisis in Bangladesh: Present and Future Challenges'. The government on Monday

decided to take \$300 million in from IMF to ease the pressure that rising cost of fuel and food imports has put on balance of payment.

A former adviser to caretaker government, Mahmud said, "If the

government continues its trend of giving large subsidies it would have Economist Prof Wahiduddin to obtain more loans."

He said spending a huge amount in subsidies would obviously affect the other priorities like ensuring loans to private sector at lower interest rates, and strength ening social safety net and poverty alleviation. Mahmud chaired the discus-

BR to install theft proof sleeper clips on tracks

The Bangladesh Railway (BR) authorities decided to install highly secured modern anti-vandal sleeper clips on rail tracks in theftprone areas in the country. The step was taken to prevent

fatalities against the backdrop of the biggest ever theft of sleeper clips from rail tracks between Banani and Cantonment stations in the capital last week.

Sri Lanka accused Tamil Tiger rebels of shelling a state-run hospital yesterday as fighting across the northern front lines reportedly left at least 47 rebels dead.

was partially damaged by heavy artillery from the Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam (LTTE), the defence ministry said, adding that a few shells had also fallen close to a nearby state-run school.

"The explosions had caused panic and trauma among patients and civilians who were immediately evacuated by troops into safer shelters," the ministry said in a statement. It was not immediately clear if there were casualties.

Government troops exchanged defeat the Tamil Tigers and scrapped fire with guerrillas in Mannar on atruce with rebels earlier this year.

Tuesday, killing 12 rebels, while fighting in the north on Monday killed at least 35 more rebels, the ministry said, putting its own losses at six soldiers wounded.

There was no immediate comment from the Tigers, whose armed The hospital in Mannar district struggle since 1972 for an independent state for minority Tamils in the majority Sinhalese nation has left more than 60,000 dead.

At least 2,520 rebels have been killed since January, while 151 soldiers have lost their lives in the same period, according to defence ministry data. Casualty numbers given by both

sides cannot be independently confirmed since Colombo bars journalists and rights groups from front-line areas.
