Edible oil, pulses get costlier

Prices of branded soya bean oil went up on the retail market in the city yesterday as retailers said distributors cut supplies following the price hike of the non-brand kind.

Retailers were selling the branded soya bean oil Tk 5-15 higher than the prices stamped on the cans.

Meantime, prices of every variety of pulses rose on the wholesale and retail markets in last two days. However, prices of both coarse and fine rice remained stable yesterday.

The food directorate yesterday increased the daily allocation of rice for Open Market Sale (OMS) outlets from 1,020kg to 1,500kg per dealer in the city. At present, 687 dealers are selling government-subsidised rice to people in the mid-and-low-income bracket.

Non-brand soya bean sold at Tk 108-110 per kg on the retail market in the city yesterday. Fifteen days back, it sold for Tk 100-102.

A shopper at Karwan Bazar said he purchased a five-litre can of branded soya bean oil for Tk 525 even though the retail price was stamped Tk 514 on the can.

EXCESSIVE TIME FOR BORDER CHECKS

Dhaka for on-board visa checking, joint customs inspection for Maitree

Bangladesh today formally proposes to India introduction of on-board visa checking and setting up of a common station for joint customs checking of the passengers of Dhaka-Kolkata train Maitree Express.

The proposal comes in the wake of passengers' sufferings due to too much time taken in customs and immigration formalities during the train's maiden trip.

The communications ministry is also going to propose adjusting the timetable of the Maitree Express to cut the 13-hour journey and checking time by one hour within this month.

Bangladesh rail officials will submit their recommendations to their counterparts today while the communications ministry will send its proposals to the Indian

government in a week through foreign ministry.

Other recommendations include return ticket sale at both sides, easing visa system for the passengers and promotional activities to popularise the service, sources here said.

The much-talked-about train service, which was suspended in March 1965 after the India-Pakistan war, resumed on April 14.

Though the journey was comfortable and immigration checking at Darsana in Chudanga was simple, enthusiasm of the inaugural run's passengers waned when they faced the customs and immigration checking at Gede in India.

In sweltering heat, the passengers had to wait for nearly two and half hours in a metal cage.

Earlier after getting down from the train with all their baggage, the passengers had to stand in queue

for their turn for checking.

Though there is arrangement for food there, the travellers could not buy those for not having Indian currency during the stopover.

Lack of toilets also added to the passengers' woes.

Earlier, it took about two hours at Darsana when Bangladesh officials emptied one compartment at a time for the checking. The passengers could go back to their seats on completion of the formalities.

Besides, immigration officials at 12 counters were prompt in their job.

Though the journey took less than eight hours, the total checking alone took five hours.

"I don't think anyone of this trip would feel like travelling in this train again if things go on like this," a foreign ministry official said,

Army to be deployed at Wasa pumps to ensure smooth supply

The government will deploy army at pumps of Dhaka Water Supply and Sewerage Authority (Wasa) in a day or two to help ensure uninterrupted supply of water during the summer.

"Like previous years, they will help us operate the pumps as well as distribute water throughout the dry season smoothly," Raihanul Abedin, managing director of Dhaka Wasa, told The Daily Star yesterday.

"We have already talked with high officials of the army," he said, adding that they want army deployment to avert chaos or untoward incidents centring inadequate supply in April-June.

Local Government Engineering Department (LGED) will send a letter to the army headquarters today, asking for the assistance.

Speaking on condition of anonymity, an official of the water supply authority said troops will patrol Wasa zones to resist sabotage of supply lines and prevent

illegal sale of water by a section of Wasa staff.

"They will guard deep tube-wells, pump houses and important Wasa establishments, and will also supply water by tankers to places whenever necessary," he added.

Locals of Mirpur and Badda are already experiencing an acute shortage of water while residents of many areas in the city complain of stink in water.

On Friday, people in Badda brought out a procession protesting worsening crisis of water.

At present, Wasa has 479 pump stations with a combined capacity of supplying 172 crore litres a day while the demand for water in the city stands at 210 crore litres.

Frequent power cuts in the dry season disrupt operation of water pumps and add to the crisis, said the managing director of Wasa.

Army deployment at Wasa pumps during the summer and in the month of Ramadan has become commonplace in the recent years.

Diarrhoea patients crowd ICDDR,B

The diarrhoea situation has worsened in the capital city as the extreme hot and humid weather persists.

The emergency section of International Centre for Diarrhoeal Disease Research, Bangladesh (ICDDR,B) Hospital witnessed the admission of 416 diarrhoea patients between 12:00am and 8:00pm yesterday.

Dr Iqbal Hossain, an associate scientist at the ICDDR,B, said that the figure is very high for this time of the year and the hospital has already taken steps to manage the situation.

He said, "The number of diarrhoea patients peak in May, from now on we expect the number of diarrhoea patients to keep increasing each day."

CLIMATE CHANGE MEET NEXT MONTH

Dhaka to press for donors' fund commitment

The government will press for an urgent commitment from the donors to fund projects on climate change mitigation and adaptation at the next month's high-level meeting between Bangladesh and United Kingdom (UK) in Dhaka and the climate change meet in London.

Government high-ups, representatives of NGOs, and climate change experts held a meeting yesterday to review and propose additions to the draft agenda for the second half of the high-level Bangladesh-UK meeting on "Climate Change: Bangladesh Facing

the Challenge."

The first half of the meeting was held in Dhaka last month.

Environment Secretary Rezaul Kabir presented Bangladesh's draft agenda, where he said the government aims to address the issues regarding climate change in Bangladesh.

This will include an overview of the observed changes in Bangladesh due to climate change, future projections, climate-induced natural disasters, and the condition of the victims.

A number of experts suggested that the government representatives at the meeting must describe the contribution of the developed

countries to climate change and their obligation to finance the projects on adaptation to climate change in the affected developing countries.

The adaptation responses include sensitisation, disaster preparedness and community-based adaptation while strategies for mitigating climate change comprise energy efficiency measures and exploring different climate change-resilient forestation options.

The government will also seek to "secure investment funds to make Bangladesh climate resilient."

49 killed in intense Lankan clashes

At least 48 LTTE rebels and a soldier were killed in fierce clashes in the restive Northern Sri Lanka, officials said yesterday.

Two Tamil Tigers were killed at Illamarudankulam area in Vavuniya Saturday, the army said.

Security forces killed 25 members of the Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam (LTTE) in Mannar district while three others were killed in nearby Welioya district on Friday, the ministry said.

It said one soldier was killed in clashes in Welioya.

At least 11 rebels were killed in Thachchanamaruthamadu and Chinnavalankaddu areas of Vavuniya Friday, the Defence Ministry said.

On the Mannar front, troops attacked LTTE bunkers in the

Manipulikulam and Minukkad areas and killed six guerrillas in the confrontations Friday, the ministry said.

In a similar clash in Minukkad and Malikattidal areas of Mannar, troops gunned down three more LTTE rebels, it said.

One Tamil Tiger and an army personnel were killed in clashes at Kokkutuduvai, janakapura and Kribbanwewa in North-east Welioya yesterday, the Media Centre for National Security (MCNS) said.

In a separate incident, at least 13 LTTE rebels were killed and three others injured when army troops captured six bunker in various artillery duels at Kanthankulam, Kaddaikulam and Manipulikulam areas of Mannar yesterday, the MCNS said.
