EC-promised city polls in May not in sight

The Election Commission (EC) appears to have failed to go by its promise to hold elections to four city corporations and seven municipalities next month.

have been announced by mid-April at the latest for holding the polls in May since the EC's proposed electoral rules require it to come up with schedules at least 40 days before the polling day, senior officials at the EC Secretariat said.

But the EC could not announce the polls schedules due to lack of fresh laws on such local government bodies, their functions and elections to those, the officials pointed out.

3 criminals killed in 'shootout' with Rab

Three criminals were killed in a 'shootout' with Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) at Aminbazar of Savar early yesterday.

They are Alam, 32, Anis, 32, and Bashar, 34. Alam was the secondin-command of infamous 'Gangcheel Bahini' and accused of killing two Rab men in Savar last year. The other two are his cohorts, according to a Rab press release.

With yesterday's, the number of those killed in 'shootouts' between Rab and 'criminals' in last one month stands at nine.

Between June last year and March this year, 34 people were

killed in 'crossfire' while the number was 179 in the proceeding 10 months. No incident of crossfire was reported throughout February.

A team of Rab-4 raided a brick kiln at Boliarpur at around 4:00am following up leads that members of the 'Gangcheel Bahini', a local crime gang, were preparing to commit robberies.

Lt Commander Ariful Islam who led the Rab team told The Daily Star yesterday that they came under fire as soon as they reached the spot by the Turag river. The elite crime busters returned fire, prompting a gunfight with some 15 members of



Pennsylvania a must win primary for Hillary

Democrats in Pennsylvania were choosing between Hillary Clinton and Barack Obama in a bitterlyfought primary yesterday that Clinton must not only win, but win convincingly to rescue her trailing White House bid.

The New York senator is tipped for victory in late opinion polls, but many observers think it will take a double-digit triumph to stave off more calls for her to quit the epic Democratic nomination race.

She also needs a fresh burst of momentum ahead of the next round of contests in Indiana and North Carolina on May 6, which are followed quickly by the last six voting showdowns of the epic nominating battle into early June.

"I don't think the margin matters. I think a win is a win," Hillary

Clinton told NBC television, asked if she might drop out if unable to win by a wide margin. "We'll see what happens," she

added. "The bottom line is we have a lot of contests yet to go. This is a really close race." A shock win by Obama would narrow Hillary Clinton's already

Nepali Maoists meet to map out new govt

Top leaders of Nepal's former rebels met yesterday to map out a future government for the Himalayan nation, which they will most likely lead, officials said.

The Communist Party of Nepal (Maoist) won 120 of 240 directly elected seats in the April 10 elections for a Constituent Assembly, which will write a constitution and rule the country during an interim period.

The results make it increasingly likely that the Maoists will form the backbone of a new government. Just before their meeting began,

a senior member of the Maoists, Ram Bahadur Thapa, told reporters the party leaders were discussing the future government and made progress in talks with other political parties for a coalition government. Another 335 seats are chosen by proportional representation and 26 are nominated by the government.

Koirala's Nepali Congress party had won 37 seats, the Communist Party of Nepal (United Marxist-Leninist) had 33, and the Madeshi People's Rights Forum, which was seeking autonomy and greater rights for people in southern Nepal, had 30 seats. The commission said counting
