

## Fighting mars semi

Incompetent umpiring by Golam Kibria brought a premature end to the first semifinal of the Brac Bank Club Cup hockey tournament yesterday.

Kibria, who failed to control the players of archrivals Abahani and Mohammedan throughout the proceedings, blew the final whistle with less than two minutes left and the teams locked 1-1.

Favourites Abahani took a 1-0 first-half lead through Rocky from the first penalty corner of a lacklustre match at the Maulana Bhasani National Hockey Stadium while the young and energetic Mohammedan equalised in the 68th minute.

According to bylaws, the match will restart at 3pm for the remaining one and half minutes (official time) and go into the tiebreakers if the result remains a draw.

The tournament committee took the decision last night and cautioned the players involved in the incidents.

The second semifinal between Usha Krira Chakra and Sonali bank will begin at 4pm.

Defending champions Mohammedan's equaliser was credited to Al Masum but it appeared that a long free-hit by Mohammedan's Pintu from the right side went in off Abahani defender Shamsuddin Tuhin's stick.

But Kibria, who appeared to walk toward fellow umpire Latifur Rahman to have a talk, suddenly signalled a goal.

Abahani stick wielders protested vehemently and threatened both the umpires as the match was stopped for about 20 minutes.

When everyone was feeling that the match could be started, Kibria blew the final whistle much to the surprise of all.

"I felt my life was at risk. So I refused to continue the game. Had it started, both teams would chase me," said Kibria before rushing to the tent.

Kibria himself was responsible for spoiling the match as he failed to punish a few properly during the match.

Mohammedan captain Ariful Haque Prince kicked him in the back while the black and whites were protesting a decision in the first half and he again pushed Kibria after the break. After twice failing to show the nerve to penalise the Mohammedan skipper, Kibria was third time brave when he only showed a green card to caution the striker.

Abahani players also pushed him for getting decisions their way to interrupt play often.

Referee Latifur Rahman later claimed Abahani wanted Kibria removed from the pitch and let the third umpire stand for him.

"We returned to play after officially lodging our protest to the tournament committee secretary (Ehtesham Sultan) but the umpire ended the match. We told the tournament committee to see video footage to confirm whether it was a goal or not," said Abahani coach Mahbub Harun.

## Hopes run high

### Gen Moeen lays foundation stone of NCA

The foundation stone of the much-desired Grameenphone-Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) National Cricket Academy (NCA) was laid yesterday with a promise that all initiative would be taken to make the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium a pure sporting arena.

National Sports Council (NSC) chairman and Chief of Army Staff General Moeen U Ahmed assured after laying the foundation stone for the academy building that the shops around the stadium would be removed gradually to give the stadium a sporting atmosphere.

"You will be happy to know that the NSC has given the Sher-e-Bangla National Cricket Stadium to Bangladesh Cricket Board for 15 years. We have also decided to close down all the shops around the stadium. Also, the vacant spaces around this venue will be handed over to the BCB," he said in his brief speech.

It came as a refreshing announcement from Moeen as there has been a lot of talk about the commercial usage of the stadium, always looking indecent to see the shops around the venues.

He thanked BCB and Grameenphone officials for coming forward to develop the country's cricket with this academy and also said that he was looking forward to see the construction of the academy building be completed by April 2009.

"I would like to thank Grameenphone for coming forward wholeheartedly and spending Tk 60 million on the academy and I am sure the rest of the amount needed will come from the BCB and other sponsors interested in seeing this academy get finished on time," said Moeen.

It took more than a year only to lay the foundation stone as the BCB signed a benchmark deal with Grameenphone, who has agreed to provide 750,000 dollars (about Tk 5.25 crore) to the board for establishing and operating the academy for five years, on March 13 last year.

"This academy is expected to be completed in 12 months and we are all looking forward to next April to see PAGE 18 COL 6

## Sehwag mauls Deccan

A clinical performance from the Delhi Daredevils, beginning with some miserly bowling and capped by Virender Sehwag's blistering 41-ball 94, produced an early finish in Hyderabad, the Deccan Chargers losing by nine wickets with seven overs to spare.

For the second game running, the bowlers and the top order did the job for Delhi. Sehwag had fallen after a cameo against the Rajasthan Royals but he took full toll of the Deccan bowlers, smashing 30 off one Andrew Symonds over to help his team to another resounding win.

The victory, though, had been set up by Delhi's bowlers and followed another unimpressive performance by the Deccan batsmen. Rohit Sharma's dazzling 66, including 26 in a Farveez Maharoof over, had helped them recover from a shambolic start to post 142 for 8, but the score was well short of being competitive on a flat deck. At Eden Gardens the pitch was to blame but at the Rajiv Gandhi International Stadium, the bowlers held sway over the Deccan batsmen for most of the innings.

The presence of Adam Gilchrist, Andrew Symonds and Shahid Afridi in one team might scare off any bowling attack but Glenn McGrath and Mohammad Asif were perhaps the ideal pair to challenge them. McGrath started in typical miserly fashion with a

## Rajshahi lights for tri-series

Four hundred flood light bulbs of Rajshahi Divisional Stadium are being taken to Mirpur Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in Dhaka for holding the day-night tri-series in June.

The decision was taken in order to prepare the Mirpur venue eligible for the international cricket match in a low cost of about Tk 2 crore. For holding international cricket matches, there must be 2200 lux lights (light unit) from the floodlight towers, but the Mirpur venue now has only 800 lux lights, as it was prepared as a football stadium.

"The present floodlights of Mirpur Stadium are eligible for holding football matches, not for cricket. This is why, floodlight bulbs of Rajshahi will be taken to Mirpur for a short period of time," said Badrudin Ahmed, deputy director, National Cricket Council of Rajshahi.

"This would save around Tk 10 crore for fresh purchase of floodlights," he said.

Activities for taking the bulbs have already started as concerned officials visited the spots and figured out methods of transferring the bulbs, he informed adding that the bulbs would be reinstalled at Rajshahi at end of the international matches.

It was learned that NEO Sports, television rights holders of any international match held in Bangladesh, have asked for the lights since India have pressed to play under lights.

Earlier Bangladesh Cricket Board sought permission of National Cricket Council for the shifting of bulbs and the plan was approved last week.

The floodlight shifting works will be ended with June 1. The tri-nation one-day series among India, Pakistan and Bangladesh is scheduled to be held between June 8 and 15.

## Booters call to vote for Amin

A group of former and current footballers called the councillors to vote for Maj Gen (ret'd) Amin Ahmed Chowdhury at this month's election of the Bangladesh Football Federation (BFF).

Speaking at a press conference at the NSC conference room yesterday, former national footballer Dewan Shamsul Arefin Tutul said Amin was the better candidate considering the 'reality' of the country.

Amin will compete former national captain Kazi Salahuddin in the April 28 polls for the president post.

"We don't have any question about Salahuddin's honesty. But he has failed to prove his ability as an organiser as he had to resign as BFF vice-president," said Salahuddin's one-time national team colleague Golam Sarwar Tipu.

"The men who were responsible for his resignation, we believe, are with him now. So his candidature is questionable," stated Tipu.

Rumman Wali Bin Sabir said that they stood behind Salahuddin at the start but had to leave him.

"The committee that destroyed football in the past years is with him now. How can Salahuddin revive the

## Salahuddin cleared

Kazi Salahuddin and his fellow ex-national footballers Ashrafuddin Ahmed Chunnun and Golam Rabbani Helal were cleared yesterday as candidates for the April 28 election of the Bangladesh Football Federation (BFF).

The complaints brought by BFF councillor Shamsul Haque Chowdhury that the three footballers had not filled up their nomination papers properly and tried to hide their conviction under the criminal offence, were dismissed by the election commission last night following a hearing.

Chief election commissioner Mesbahuddin Ahmed said that the 'matter had been settled' earlier.

While replying to a question why the election commission then called a hearing, Mesbah said he wanted to prove his neutrality.

"I called both parties to prove that the election commission is not biased," he said adding that the complaint was submitted well after the deadline of April 15.

Barrister Tania Amir, who was pleading for Salahuddin and his colleagues, told reporters that the complaints were dismissed as they were filed after the deadline.

"If my clients are guilty, why did the government awarded them later? Also, the plaintiff did not submit any papers in support of their complaints," the lawyer said.

Barrister Omar Sadat, who defended Chowdhury, said they did not get justice.

"If it was delayed, why the election commission accept the com-

plaints and served notice to the three BFF councillors?" he questioned.

"How can one complain about one's nomination before its submission?" he added.

Salahuddin, who looked a bit depressed, refused to make any comments. "I never thought I would have to make comments on this."

Salahuddin had told The Daily Star two years back that the 17 days he and Chunnun were incarcerated in the Jessore jail, is still the most painful experience in his life.

It was the same incident that saw their Abahani colleagues Helal and Kazi Anwar also being imprisoned after the then military-ruler found the four players guilty in a one-day trial under the Marshal Law violence following a match against Mohammedan in 1982.

## PCA clinch Academy Cup

Sensible batting from Nasir Hossain and Mushfiqur Rahim was not good enough for GP-BCB National Cricket Academy (NCA) to turn the table on Pakistan Cricket Academy (PCA) in the Academy Cup final at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium yesterday.

The home side's hopes of pulling off a surprise in the final after losing both the league matches were dashed when Nasir Hossain was run out while attempting to take a risky single and Tigers wicketkeeper Mushfiq was dismissed in the next over.

The local Academy side lost their last four wickets for two runs to suffer a 39-run defeat, as they were bundled out for 237 runs in 46.3 overs in reply to Pakistan Academy's 276 which was built around Khurram Manzoor's hundred.

NCA made a bad start in reply to the fighting total when Imrul Kayes was trapped by Anwar Ali in the first over but Shamsur Rahman and Farhad Hossain repaired the early damage by sharing 57 runs for the second wicket before a mini-

collapse saw them reach 124-5.

Mushfiq joined in-form Nasir to revive the innings as the pair rotated the strike brilliantly to challenge their opponents before Mushfiq was caught at cover by Ali Asad off Mohammad Amir for 55-ball 56 that featured only three boundaries. Nasir continued his good form with a 67-ball 52 that saw two fours and a six.

Ahmed Shehzad, one of three leg-spinners, was the most successful bowler with three wickets for 35 runs.

Earlier, Raheel Majeed gave the visitors a flying start after captain Khalid Latif decided to bat first. The two openers amassed 62 runs in first ten overs before paceman Mahbubul Alam dismissed him. Raheel hit 43 off 36 balls that contained four boundaries and three sixes.

But NCA would have had the breakthrough much earlier if Farhad Hossain held a simple chance offered at slip by Khurram off Mahbubul Alam when the aggressive batsman was just on seven and the opener took the opportunity with both hands to smash 107 off 141 balls with the help of seven fours and two sixes.

But it was the visiting Academy's captain Latif who put the local bowlers to the sword by smashing two fours and five sixes during his blazing 81 made in 79 balls.

Captain and left-arm spinner Mehraz Hossain captured three wickets for 59 runs in 10 overs.

The two teams will travel to Bogra today to play two-match four-day matches at the Shaheed Chandu Stadium.
