


Former deputy minister for communications Salahuddin Ahmed was released yesterday on parole for six hours to attend the namaz-ejanaza of his father, Saidul Haque.

Several thousand drivers of CNG-run taxicabs on Thursday observed a work stoppage in the city protesting an increase of rate of daily money deposition by the owners.

They also staged demonstration in the city's Matuail and Gabtoli areas against the decision of the cab owners, urging the government for taking measures in this regard.

The drivers alleged that in the name of the price hike of the CNG, the taxicab owners increased the rate.

They said although the government had fixed a rate of Tk 450 per day, they had to pay the owners Tk 560. But the cab owners at a sudden decision fixed Tk920 for each cab per day.

According to witnesses, several thousand taxicabs were seen parking at different depots in the city as the drivers went on work stoppage.
