

# Home appliances under baggage rule may get duty exemption

The government is mulling exempting some home appliances from customs duty under baggage rule to reduce hassles of homebound remittance earners and also to ease customs clearance at Zia International Airport (ZIA) from the next fiscal

The items that are on the possible duty exemption list include colour television (up to 21 inches), video cassette recorder, video cassette player, satellite receiver, oven, fax machine, vacuum cleaner and LCD computer monitor (17 inches), according to the sources in the National Board of Revenue (NBR).

Dhaka Customs House (DCH) in a recent letter proposed to the NBR for such a duty exemption at the ZIA and it is now reviewing the baggage rule to bring about some changes in the rule, an NBR high official said.

The DCH also proposed to reduce duty on some products like plasma television, LCD, TFT, music centre, refrigerator, air conditioner, washing machine and dishwasher, if those are under the purview of the baggage rule.

Although prices of some of the home appliances have already come down in the local market, inbound passengers, mainly workers, have long been facing serious hassles at the international airport in Dhaka.

"It is unfortunate that remittance earners face hassles on landing at the airport of their own country," said the NBR official, who preferred to be unnamed. The customs house, however, suggested a rise in duty on air

revenue earning under the baggage rule at the ZIA is only 20 per cent of the total revenue at the airport.

Statistics shows the Dhaka Customs House earned Tk 612.6 crore in 2007 at the ZIA. Out of the earning, Tk 560 crore wasearned from the foreign currency passengers, Tk 29.7 crore from duties realized from the passengers' imported products, Tk 10.37 crore from the goods seized by customs from outbound passengers and the remaining Tk 5 crore came from taxes on liquor and cigarette.

## WFP for lowering commodity export curb

Facing a mounting global food crisis, the UN food aid agency Tuesday urged governments to lower export controls to allow muchneed grain to flow to the world's neediest.

"I call on all nations to provide procurement access for all humanitarian purchases," the head of the World Food Program (WFP), Josette Sheeran, said.

Rising shortages of basic grains, milk and foodstuffs that have led to deadly violence in developing countries is perhaps "the first global humanitarian emergency," she said in a speech at the Peterson Institute for International Economics, a think tank.

She said more than 40 nations imposed export controls on commodities since prices began "relentless" surge last June.
