## Another year for Bracewell

New Zealand cricket coach John Bracewell will step down when his contract expires in April next year. New Zealand Cricket said Friday.

"John has informed me that he will not be looking to extend his contract for another term and will instead pursue other coaching opportunities in cricket," New Zealand Cricket chief executive Justin Vaughan said.

Bracewell, a former off-spinner who took 102 wickets in 41 Tests for New Zealand, has previously said he is interested in returning to coaching English county cricket.

The 50-year-old, currently in England with the touring New Zealand team, coached Gloucestershire for five years before taking up the top New Zealand post in 2003.

Vaughan paid tribute to Bracewell, who has sometimes been a controversial figure for his aggressive style, saying he had produced some tremendous results, "most notably in the one-day game".

New Zealand Cricket would start looking internationally for a replacement.

"We currently have an extremely talented group of players with some really exciting individuals entering the international game," Vaughan said.

"I believe they have the makings of a very successful team, and the coach will be selected to realise this potential."

# Ashraful back in runs

Mohammad Ashraful returned among the runs with a match-winning knock as Mohammedan Sporting Club made sure that there would be no upsets when the Premier Cricket Super League kicked off in immense heat yesterday.

The under pressure Bangladesh skipper led his side from the front with an unbeaten 70 to script second-placed Mohammedan's two-wicket victory over Surjo Torun in the curtailed over match at BKSP.

The right-hander however was the lone national player who shone during the opening day as league leaders Biman rode on Pakistani opener Nasir Jamshed's glittering 92 to get off to a flying start with a convincing 73-run win against City Club at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in Mirpur.

On the other hand, defending champions Abahani managed a three-wicket victory over BKSP at the Fatullah Cricket Stadium. The match was 45-over-a-side due to a delayed start following overnight rain.

## MSC V SURJO TORUN

In his quest to get back in the runs

ahead of the tri-series, Ashraful made a confident start to guide his side to reach the target of 181 with only three balls to spare in a 43-over-a-side match.

The ace batsman, who is under huge pressure following his prolonged bad patch in the international level and some bad performances in the first phase of the league, combined with Faisal Hossain to cancel out the initial burst of paceman Mohammad Sharif.

Out-of-favour Sharif castled three top-order batsmen -- Imrul Kayes for a duck, Zunaed Siddiqui for 20 and Aftab Ahmed for just one -- to reduce Mohammedan to 44-4 but Faisal joined his skipper to take their team out of trouble by adding 99 for the fifth wicket.

Ashraful smote five fours in 85 balls while left-handed Faisal chipped in with a 71-ball 47 that featured two fours and as many sixes.

Sharif finished with figures of 4-39 while Delwar Hossain took two for 40.

Earlier, in-form Shamsur Rahman hit a 67-ball 64 with the help of eight fours and two sixes as Surjo Torun put up 180 before being all out in 41.4 overs while promising batsman Nayeem Islam

added 34 off 56 balls. Pacer Dollar Mahmud captured three wickets while four batsmen fell victim of run out.

## BIMAN VCITY

Jamshed has so far represented Pakistan in seven one-day internationals and the youngster stood tall in a pitch where the ball carried to the wicketkeeper brilliantly. His opening partner Tamim Iqbal made a four-ball duck while one-down Mosharraf Hossain endured a two-ball duck but still Biman managed 212 in 46.4 overs thanks to a 93-ball 92 by Jamshed.

The left-hander struck nine fours and two sixes while the second best knock of 33 runs came from number seven batsman Lipon Day.

Rashedul Islam was the most successful bowler with three for 24 but pacer Shafaq Al Jabir and Arafat Salahuddin made the real damage by taking two wickets each.

On the other hand, young pace-man Mahbubul Alam exploited the condition brilliantly to dismiss City for 139 runs in 44.2 overs. City were never in contention as they lost wickets in regular intervals.

Left-arm spinner Mosharraf started the carnage by removing Golam Mabud (8) and then

# Bangladesh down & out

Late goals sunk Bangladesh's chances to reach the AFC Challenge Cup finals when they gave up a 1-0 lead to lose 2-1 against Kyrgyzstan yesterday.

Bangladesh were in a must win situation against the hosts in the last Group C qualifier and striker Zahid Hasan Emily raised hopes when he put the visitors ahead after 63 minutes at the Spartak Stadium in Bishkek.

But forward Roman Kornilov cancelled the lead in the 83rd minute before defender Ruslan Sydykov sealed the victory for Kyrgyzstan four minutes later.

The result meant dark-horse Afghanistan qualified for the 8-team finals as group champions with four points following a

goalless draw against Bangladesh and a stunning 1-0 defeat of favourites Kyrgyzstan who finished second with three points.

Bangladesh, who hosted the inaugural Challenge Cup in 2006, were left in the cold with one point.

So far, Bangladesh's South Asian rivals Sri Lanka and Afghanistan have made it to the July 30-August 10 final rounds to be played in Hyderabad, where they join automatic qualifiers North Korea, Turkmenistan, Myanmar and hosts India.

On a warm evening at the Kyrgyz capital, unlike Bangladesh's opening match when the weather was cooler, the home side got better midway through the first half.

As Zakirov later confessed, his men were not motivated well after losing all chances to progress but Kyrgyzstan started pouring with attacks. Hurshid Lutfullaev was left

alone with rival keeper Aminul in the area in the 22nd minute but his shot sailed over the crossbar.

Ruslan Djiamshidov's powerful shot in the 45th minute was foiled by Bangladesh keeper Aminul who was forced to make another fine save on an effort from Igor Kudrenko.

Bangladesh got their first chance when Emily got behind the rival backline but his close-range drive went straight to the Kyrgyz goalkeeper.

The second half started with Kyrgyzstan changing formation to a more attacking 4-3-3 as Bangladesh settled rather defensively.

Kudrenko's freekick from close flew just over the bar six minutes after resumption and the hosts paid for missing too many chances as Bangladesh scored from a counter

# Women end Asia Cup quietly

Bangladesh women's cricket team completed their first Asia Cup campaign with an embarrassing nine-wicket loss at the hands of hosts Sri Lanka at the Welagedara Stadium in Kurunegala yesterday.

Electing to field first, the Lankan women were always on top bowling out Bangladesh for only 120 runs in 49.3 overs. Dedunu Silva smashed an unbeaten 66 to power the hosts to the winning target in only 25.5 overs to move into the finals where they face India on Sunday.

Right-handed Silva, an opening batswoman, struck twelve boundaries in her 82-ball innings that was complemented by Shashikala Siriwardene, who chipped in with a

34-ball 23. The two batswomen shared an unbroken 81-run second wicket stand to take the Lankans home.

Off-spinner Rumana Ahmed took the only wicket to fall as she had Chamari Polgampola caught behind for 14.

Earlier, the hosts had Bangladesh in early trouble. Janakanthy Mala removed Shukhtara for a nine-ball duck and added Shathira Jakir in her next over, and left-arm spinner Suwini de Alwis struck to make it 29 for 3. Ayesha Akhtar struck around long enough to top-score with 30 from 75 deliveries but nobody else crossed 20 and Bangladesh were all out for 120 in 49.3 overs.

Mala finished with the most excellent figures of 10-6-9-3 and was backed up by Shashikala Siriwardene's 3 for 28.

Meanwhile, powerhouse India

crushed women's cricket minnows Pakistan by 207 runs in Dambulla. Batting first, the Indians scored 283-3, to which the Pakistanis replied and only scored 76.

India, who have got four of the five 200-plus totals in the tournament, were given an impressive start by openers Karuna Jain and Jaya Sharma, who added 114 in 20.4 overs. Anagha Deshpande and Mithali Raj put on 53 more before Raj and Rumeli Dhar added an unbeaten 90 to take India to the big score.

An out-of-depth Pakistan lost their first four wickets for 44 runs. Snehal Pradhan removed Bismah Maroof off the second ball she bowled. Pakistan had crawled to 62 when left-arm spinner David took two wickets in one over to reduce them to 66 for 8. The misery lasted six more overs before India ended it

Pakistan's Rehan Butt scored four goals to help his team to a 6-3 win over New Zealand in a highly entertaining Sultan Azlan Shah Cup match Friday.

Pakistan, who beat hosts Malaysia 3-2 on Thursday, placed themselves among the favourites in this seven-team tournament with near flawless hockey.

Argentina also were also rampant as they beat India 5-1, while earlier Canada edged Belgium 1-0.

Pakistan had to come from behind as New Zealand drew first blood but failed to capitalise in the match at the Azlan Shah Stadium in northern Perak state.

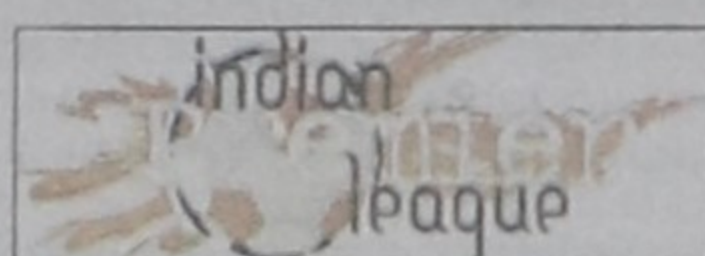
New Zealand skipper Phillip Burrows gave his team the lead in the sixth minute, noticing Pakistan's goalkeeper Salman Akbar was blocked by his own players, and sending a shot sailing into the back of the net.

But Pakistan did not let the goal dampen their spirits, producing an equaliser five minutes later, when Butt connected with a cross from Muhammad Saqlain.

# Kolkata reign in rain

Desperately seeking points after a string of losses the Kolkata Knight Riders and Bangalore Royal Challengers, two of the IPL's struggling but high-profile teams, produced a fascinating, if low-scoring, contest that was decided in Kolkata's favour off the penultimate ball. Their second encounter lacked the batting heroics of the first but there was plenty of brilliance in the field and with ball in a rain-shortened match that ended way past midnight.

The day began with Kolkata celebrating the birthday of its greatest son, Rabindranath Tagore, and ended with a crowd of thousands, braving a typical seasonal thundershower, delighting in the exploits of its current favourite as Sourav Ganguly led with the ball to revive his side's hopes in the tournament.

Ganguly had limped to a run-a-ball 20 with the bat, but his miserly spell -- 3 for 7 from three overs -- choked a stumbling chase of 130 in 16 overs that, despite a flurry towards the end from Mark Boucher, was always behind the eight ball. It was Ganguly's canny bowling, after Brad Hodge pro-

duced a superb direct hit from backward point to get rid of J Arunkumar, that perhaps decided the outcome. Bangalore's top order failed to keep pace and Ganguly, clearly charged up by the occasion, struck a huge blow by bowling his opposite number Rahul Dravid. By the time Ganguly was done Bangalore needed 78 off 36 balls, a near-impossible task.

Cameron White and Boucher played good hands, the latter almost pulling off a win, but Bangalore's top order had left them with a bit too much to do. White cut loose to take 15 runs off the 11th over from Laxmi Ratan Shukla, eight came off the next from the next from Ashok Dinda, and another 15 off Umar Gul kept them in line with the asking-rate. Ishant Sharma just gave five off the 14th, and when White was run out backing up too far at the non-striker's end by Murali Kartik, it seemed a done case. Boucher, whose 26 had needed 30 deliveries, then scored 24 off just 10, but Bangalore still fell five runs short.

Bangalore's top-order mess needs to be addressed, but their effort in the field after Kolkata decided to bat was heartening. Aakash Chopra, the former India opener, came in to bolster a struggling top order but didn't make much of an impact, lbw to Dale Steyn, and Hodge fell pulling Zaheer Khan.

If he looked smooth with the ball, Ganguly wasn't as much with the bat. Off the mark with an uppish drive for four and tangled by a short one from Praveen Kumar, he nudged around for 20 and was the first of two run-outs in Kolkata's innings. White pulling off a direct hit.

The going had been slow for Kolkata, and David Hussey tried to step it up, lofting a Praveen slower delivery over long-off, before placing the following delivery through extra-cover. He launched Anil Kumble for two consecutive sixes, but a good throw from Steyn cut him off. Tatenda Taibu got his first game but went early, top-edging Steyn, who then picked up a third when Shukla chopped onto his stumps.

An embarrassing goof-up delayed play ahead of Steyn's final over, the 14th of the innings, with only one bowler allowed to bowl four. The scorers and umpires mixed up the two Kumars, and had R Vinay with four overs bowled and Praveen with one, instead of three and two. Dravid, taking the walkie-talkie from one of the on-field umpires, pleaded his case and Steyn finally got to bowl. Wriddhiman Saha and Murali Kartik added 34 quick runs, the highest partnership of the innings, and Kolkata finished on 129.

That proved just out of reach for
