# Spiralling food prices



It is a common practice in Bangladesh to censure the authorities for everything and demand that the government quit. Now the most talked about issue is the price hike. The prices of the essentials are rising almost every day. The prices of most of the food products have doubled in less than a year. But to overcome this crisis as a nation, we have to think deeply about this matter and analyse the reasons behind the price hike. If we take a look at the international arena we will see that the food prices have ascended globally in a brief period of time. Japan is looking for alternate flour because of the rising wheat price. India, Vietnam and Egypt have put constraints on exporting rice to meet the local demand. The Philippines has announced a ban on converting farmland to other uses in order to cut import of rice. It has to be realised that the food price predicament is global. Cheap local political solutions do not really exist.

The rising prices of food might naturally indicate a global food shortage. But interestingly enough, the scenario is rather different. In consequence of the price hike, the countries have decided to increase production. That is resulting into a global record food production. World paddy production in 2008 could grow by about 2.3 per cent, reaching a new record level of 666 million tons according to the forecasts of FAO. Still, the prices are not declining. The reasons behind the mounting prices are a bit more convoluted. A mix of economic, social, political and environmental factors have led the prices of staples like wheat, corn, rice and

soybeans to skyrocket in recent months.

The value of the US dollar is constantly falling for various reasons, which is affecting the global price range. There is an over-abundance of paper money in the world, and the soaring price of food is a reflection of it. There is no real shortage, but depreciating currencies are triggering prices skywards.

The growing global energy demand is also playing a vital role here. The US government is subsidizing farmers who grow corn for ethanol, a bio fuel that has been touted in some quarters as a panacea for global warming and reliance on foreign oil. The crops that would have normally been destined for dinner places are instead ending up in gas tanks making things even more difficult for the less developed countries. Droughts in Australia and Europe, cyclones in our part of the world, financial market speculation, and increased demand for food in China and India also have significantly contributed to the price hike. This is a complex situation which has been developing over the period of time and a number of factors are operating in alignment or in conjunction with each other to constrict supply going into the food chain, pushing up demand.

Bangladesh has to lessen the rate of unemployment and increase wages by educating people and creating enough opportunity for work. Because ultimately people's income has to catch up with the global higher price regime. Syed Rajaul Akmal Sajid
