

Parties closer to consensus on Nepal power-sharing

Nepal's three big parties in the constituent assembly have come closer to a consensus on most of their differences including amendment of the constitution following parleys at bilateral meetings Saturday.

They have agreed to a meeting Sunday morning at Maoist Chairman Pushpa Kamal Dahal's residence, during which they will set up two tripartite panels—one to prepare a draft of the amendment to the constitution and the other to prepare a package for taking the ongoing peace process to a logical end.

"We have agreed to set up the panels and reach a consensus by day after tomorrow," said Dahal, coming out of a meeting with Nepali Congress leaders at Singhdubbar.

He said the new agreement will

cover ways to take the ongoing peace process to a logical end, amend the constitution and prepare a power-sharing deal among the parties.

"We still have pending issues concerning integration of the armies, they (other parties) have called for change in the YCL's working style, return of land and relief to the conflict victims, which is still an unresolved issue and a commission for disappearances and others are yet to be formed," said Dahal, adding, "We have to address all these."

The second issue to be addressed immediately is amending the constitution, he added. "There is debate over two-third majority and simple majority for forming the government, the constitution has mentioned the names of the seven parties and attached a list of legislators—which are all irrelevant in the present context,"

said Dahal. He said another issue was related to power-sharing. "Discussion on the issues has been quite positive," he said.

The parties have put constitutional amendment, the peace process and power-sharing in that order of priority, according to NC general secretary Bimalendra Nidhi. He said there was an understanding in principle to address the issues in a package and make a strong commitment to refrain from getting involved in the petty game of frequent change of government at least for a few years or until the new constitution is promulgated.

"We are not against the simple majority system for formation and ouster of the government but what we wanted is that there should not be space for the petty game of frequent change of government," said Maoist Chairman Dahal.

UML leader Bhim Rawal said

the parties would come up with a commitment to a common minimum programme to stop such unhealthy practices in future. "The progress made during today's parleys is agreement to immediately end the YCL's paramilitary structure and change its modus operandi, and an agreement to prepare a draft constitutional amendment."

During his meeting with Maoist Chairman Pushpa Kamal Dahal Saturday, Sitaula said he was surprised the Maoists did not propose Koirala's name, recognising the octogenarian leader's contribution to leading the country to the present stage.

"During my talks, I told them in context that they (Maoists) should have offered the post to Koirala because of his role from thrashing out the 12-point understanding to successful holding of the constituent assembly polls," said Sitaula.

US First lady in Afghanistan to highlight progress

First lady Laura Bush, on a mission to highlight signs of rebirth in war-weary Afghanistan, ventured outside of Kabul on Sunday to an area that symbolises both the destruction of war and Afghanistan's attempt at rebirth.

Mrs. Bush, on her third unannounced visit to the country, flew into the Afghan capital then immediately boarded a helicopter for a 50-minute flight to Bamiyan

Province, the farthest she has travelled from Kabul.

Her chopper touched down in a dusty field at a provincial reconstruction team compound operated by New Zealand. From there she could see the empty niches in a cliffside where two giant Buddha statues once stood.

They were carved into the sandstone cliffs more than 2,000 years ago, but were demolished by the Taliban, which considered them

idolatrous and anti-Muslim, in March 2001. Destruction of the historical and cultural treasures prompted an outcry from the international community.

The first lady's visit comes ahead of a donors conference in Paris, where the US hopes billions of dollars in international aid will be pledged to help the embattled nation. Afghanistan was ruled by the repressive Taliban until US forces invaded following the Sept. 11, 2001, terrorist attacks.

Hundreds of students still stranded in Gaza

They squander their days watching TV and surfing the Web instead of studying, but it's not for lack of discipline: Gaza students accepted at foreign universities are stuck at home because Israel and Egypt won't let them leave the blockaded territory.

The students' plight made headlines last week when Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice interceded with Israel on behalf of seven students with prestigious Fulbright scholarships awarded by the US government. But hundreds without such powerful allies will likely lose their shot at a good education, given Gaza's sparse offerings.

The blockade, imposed after Hamas' violent takeover of Gaza a year ago, is meant to bring down the Islamic militants and inspire Gazans to opt for a more moderate leadership.

But critics say the closure, backed by the international community, is accomplishing the opposite.

Hamas has become more entrenched and Gazans are growing more angry at the West as isolation worsens the strip's poverty, say the critics, who include both Israelis and Palestinians. They add that Gaza is also being robbed of future leaders—the trapped students—because they can't get the necessary training.

Earth is 'beautiful', says Japanese astronaut

Japanese astronaut Akihiko Hoshide, on his first mission in space, said Sunday he was in awe of the Earth as he spoke with his prime minister in Tokyo.

Prime Minister Yasuo Fukuda joined a group of students who spoke through a video link with Hoshide, who is on the International Space Station (ISS) to help install Japan's first space laboratory, Kibo.

Hoshide, working 338 kilometres (210 miles) above the Earth, showed students the inside of the bus-size lab.

"Earth, as I see it from here, is very beautiful," he said, pointing to one of the round windows of the lab. "I think to myself it is so wonderful and fragile."

Fukuda, amazed at how sharp the image was, said: "I can see you very clearly."

"Maybe you can see my face getting dark, too," Hoshide replied, referring to his stubble.

37 missing in Ukraine mine blast

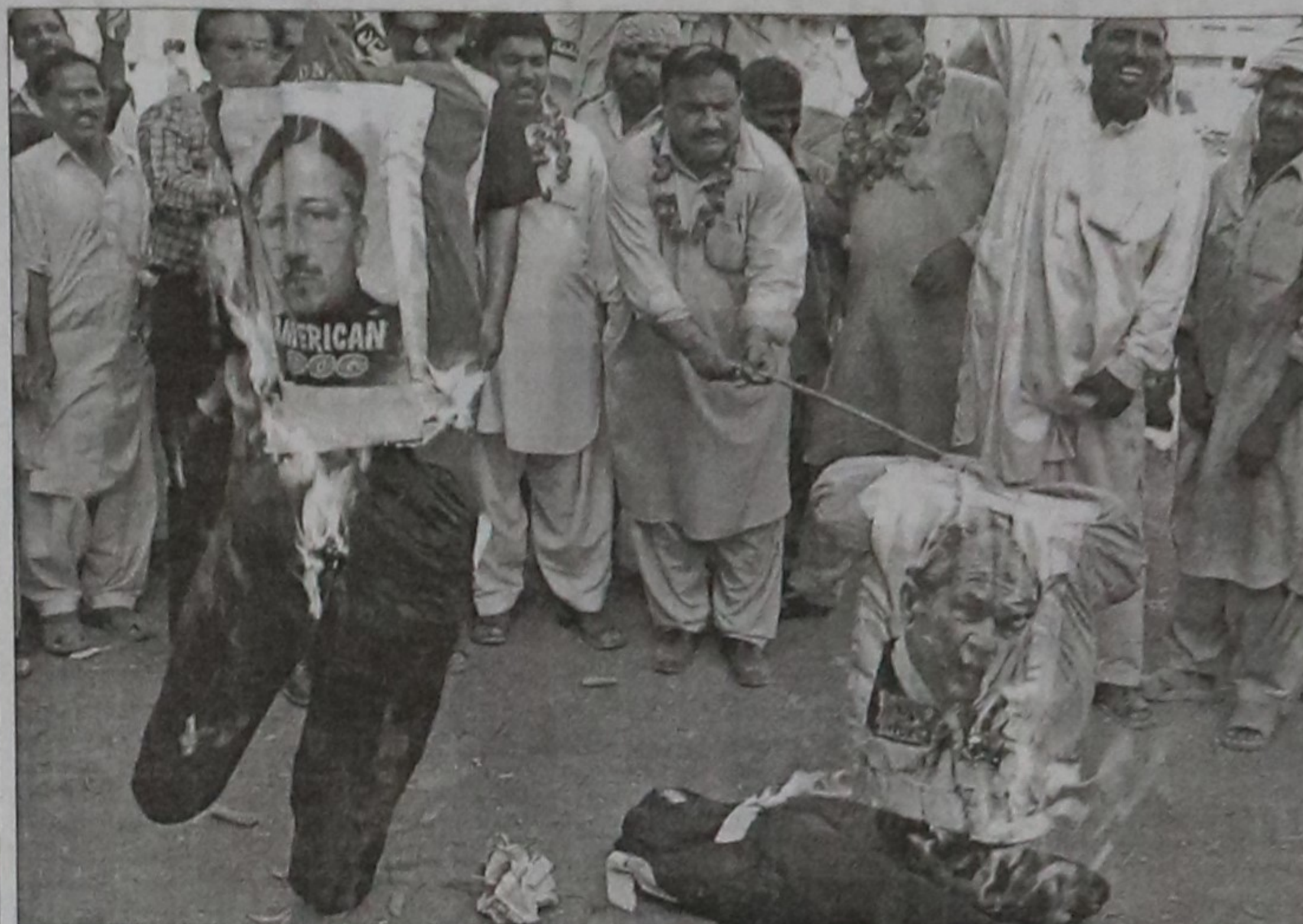

Thirty-seven people were missing Sunday after an explosion ripped through a coal mine in eastern Ukraine, an emergency official said.

"The fate of 37 people who were in the mine when the explosion took place... remains unknown," said Andriy Bondarenko, the regional head of the Emergency Situations Ministry.

The blast took place at around 5:00 am local time (0200 GMT) 1,000 metres below the surface of the Karl Marx mine in Yenakiyev, some 60 kilometres north-east of the regional capital Donetsk, he said.

The blast severely damaged the entrances to the mine and rescue workers on the scene said they had yet to reach the affected area.

Myanmar dead may never be identified Says Red Cross

Tens of thousands of people killed in last month's cyclone may never be identified because their bodies have been decomposed so badly and many ended up far from home, an aid organisation said Sunday.

The task of burying an estimated 78,000 bodies has been overshadowed by efforts to assist Cyclone Nargis' 2.4 million survivors, many of whom are still without adequate food, water and shelter, the International Committee of the Red Cross said.

As a result, bloated bodies still litter the hard-hit Irrawaddy delta more than five weeks after the storm, while other bodies have been dumped in canals or unmarked mass graves.

"Many now are in advanced stages of decay and the information we have been able to gather is that many of the bodies that were effected by the tidal surges were stripped of clothing and any identifying items," said Craig Strathern, a Red Cross spokesman in Myanmar.

The Red Cross has received reports that some bodies ended more than four miles from their place of origin, he said.

The organisation last week began distributing kits to volunteers that include body bags, forms to list where a body is buried and any details identifying it, Strathern said. But he said he doubted there would be any large-scale effort to identify victims, mostly because Myanmar law allows families to declare someone dead after three weeks.

"We're certainly not aware of any initiatives that try to achieve positive identification of bodies," Strathern said. "I don't know what the reason would be. If there is not a demand from the families or legal imperative in the system, it's not going to achieve too much."

Survivors in the delta said they tried to identify bodies but were overwhelmed by the numbers of dead clogging rivers and washing up on beaches.

"Initially, the bodies were identified by relatives and we cremated them after holding religious rights," said Myint Thuang, a survivor from the delta town of Bogalay. "However, after more bodies washed up on the shore and with no one to identify them we buried them in mass graves."

28 rebels killed in Lanka clashes

Sri Lanka's defence ministry said yesterday its forces had killed at least 28 Tamil Tiger rebels in the latest clashes across the north of the island.

The fighting on Saturday in the Mannar, Vavuniya, Wel Oya and Jaffna areas saw one soldier killed, the ministry said. It also said 25 rebels and 34 soldiers were injured. The Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam (LTTE), however, said that they had killed four soldiers in the Vavuniya area alone. The rebels did not report on their own losses.

Casualty figures in Sri Lanka cannot be independently verified, as the defence ministry bars journalists from reporting from frontline areas or travelling into the rebel-held north.

On Saturday security forces killed at least 13 guerrillas in separate attacks in the north and bombed a rebel base, the military said Saturday.

Air force fighter jets pounded a rebel base in Pooneryn late on Friday, hours after the guerrillas set off bombs in the southern suburb of Colombo and central district of Kandy, the defence ministry said.

China, Taiwan look to build trust at talks

China and Taiwan will this week hold historic talks aimed at building trust following decades of angry rhetoric and military tensions that made their relationship one of the world's potential flashpoints.

The four days of meetings in Beijing starting on Wednesday will be the first direct dialogue between the rivals in over a decade and have come about thanks to a dramatic rapprochement between the long-time rivals in recent months.

Establishing permanent direct flights between China and Taiwan and allowing more mainland Chinese tourists to visit the island will be the main topics on the agenda.

However analysts from China and Taiwan agreed that, with mutual distrust and suspicion so entrenched, this week's events were only the first step in a very long march towards a permanent thaw in ties.


