

DISMISSAL OF HAROON HABIB Supreme Court rejects BSS appeal

The appellate division of the Supreme Court on Monday upheld a High Court verdict declaring illegal the Bangladesh Sangbad Sangstha (BSS) authorities' action of dismissing MD Haroon Habib as its managing director.

A full bench of the appellate division headed by Justice Mohammad Fazlul Karim passed the verdict rejecting an appeal filed by BSS, the state-run news agency, against the HC judgment.

The BSS authorities dismissed Haroon Habib as its managing director on October 31, 2001. Later, he filed a writ petition with the High Court challenging the legality of the dismissal order.

On August 20 in 2007, the High Court delivered its verdict declaring illegal the dismissal of Haroon Habib.

The court also directed BSS to reinstate Haroon within 30 days and pay him all salary arrears and benefits within 60 days.

On December 31, 2007, the appellate division of the Supreme Court stayed the HC verdict following an application filed by the BSS authorities.

The Supreme Court also asked BSS to file a regular leave to appeal against the HC judgment.

After the hearing of the case, the appellate division yesterday rejected the BSS authorities' appeal.

Barrister M Amir-Ul Islam and Barrister Tania Amir appeared for Haroon Habib while advocate M Asaduzzaman moved for the BSS.

PSP urges govt to stop mass arrests

Declare local govt polls schedule before national election

Bangladesh Upazila Chairman Association demands

Members of Bangladesh Upazila Chairman Association have demanded declaration of the local government election schedule before the national election.

At a press conference at the National Press Club in the city on Monday, they hailed the caretaker government for its initiative to hold

the local government polls.

The speakers expressed their apprehension that the upcoming elected government will not hold the local government polls but the leaders discouraged them in different ways.

The Association members urged the government to arrange the local government election as early as possible because it will help revive and strengthen democracy at grassroots level.

They said upazila parishad administration system was introduced during an autocratic government in 1985 but it was later dissolved by a partisan government in 1991.

Besides reducing people's tendency for rushing to cities and bureaucratic tussle, a lot of new roads, bridges, culverts and employments were created under that local government system, said Association Convener and Chairman of Srinagar upazila of Munshiganj district Azizul Haque Lebu Kazi in a paper at the press conference.

The speakers said as the High Court has ordered the government to arrange the local government election, it cannot disobey its verdict.

Besides, nowhere in the constitution it has been mentioned that the caretaker government cannot hold the local government election, they added.

but the BNP-led four party alliance government stopped the activity of the clinics.

Prof Dr Rashid E Mahbub, former president of Bangladesh Medical Association (BMA), said the community people even donated their land for these community clinics in the hope that they would receive free treatment. As the government is now transferring the clinics to the private sector, the people would now have to pay for their treatment, he added.

It is part of the government's efforts to encourage the increased involvement of private organisations in the health sector, he said in the budget speech.

But the health experts sharply reacted to this government's decision, terming it a process of commercialisation of the health sector.

Around 11,000 community clinics were set up to provide primary healthcare service to the people free of cost during the tenure of Awami League government.

Rather, the clinics should be given to the local government after strengthening it and ensuring its accountability, the experts said.

Safe water supply coverage widens to 87pc in rural areas: Adviser

Finance Adviser Mirza Azizul Islam on Monday said the supply coverage of safe drinking water in rural areas has widened to 87 percent from 83 percent while such coverage in the urban areas has increased to 60 percent in the current fiscal.

"Steps are also being taken to supply safe drinking water through pipelines in 300 villages of arsenic-prone areas and to establish sources of arsenic-free safe drinking water in 200 villages and 5 municipalities," the adviser said in his budget speech.

The government has also achieved 85 percent sanitation coverage in urban areas and 81 percent in rural areas against the goal of providing 100 percent sanitation coverage by 2010, he added.

A comprehensive plan of the Local Government Engineering Department (LGED) is being implemented to construct growth centres, union complexes, markets exclusively for women, roads, bridges and culverts at upazila and union levels, he said.

About the local government institutions, the adviser said a number of bold steps have been taken to make them more dynamic and strong on the basis of a report of a committee formed to formulate recommendations for this purpose.
