3 arrestees used Govt yet to act on EC licensed guns for crimes

Three gangsters arrested Thursday for killing a man and injuring his two brothers in Wari last month confessed they had been carrying out murders, extortions and other serious crimes with licensed guns, police yesterday said.

They told police that they licensed their guns in 2001 using both Awami League and BNP connections.

Detective police arrested Manjurul Abedin Russell, 37, Mahbubul Alam, 34, and Mohammad Ali Munna, 33, at Kaunia upazila on information from the man who hired them for the murder.

Two other people involved in masterminding and executing the murder are also in police custody. Police are now hunting down the sixth man involved in the crime.

US envoy hails

US Ambassador James F Moriarty yesterday welcomed the parole of former prime minister Sheikh Hasina, saying it kick-starts the process of ensuring all parties' participation in the general elections.

Moriarty however warned that release of leaders charged with corruption should not mean a return to the levels of corruption in the past which would scare away investors.

"It's (Hasina's release) a good start ahead of fair and credible elections. Now, it should be ensured that all parties are going to participate in the elections, Moriarty told a press conference at the US embassy in connection with extension of the embassy's consular section.

He declined to comment on whether the other detained former premier Khaleda Zia should be released, but said political parties must run in the elections for the sake of democracy.

The envoy called for a 'compromise' between the government and other stakeholders, mainly political parties, to ensure that the election preparations are based on mutual understanding.

He stressed that political parties must agree on the larger, long-term political, social and economic goals of Bangladesh -- resembling the government-proposed 'citizens charter'.

The press conference was followed by Moriarty opening three new booths at the consular section's visa wing.

Body of a young woman, severed into nine pieces, was recovered at Sutrapur in the capital yesterday, a day after similar recovery of the body of a brutally murdered young woman from Teigaon area. Besides, a man was found

butchered at Adabar in the city.

Identity of the victims could not be ascertained till the filing of this report at 9:00pm yesterday.

Informed by the locals, police recovered the body pieces of the young woman, aged around 22, in three bags from Hemendra Das Road and Protap Das Road in Sutrapur around 7:00 in the morning, said Sutrapur police.

The head and the arms were chopped off the body of the victim while the legs were cut into four pieces and the remainder of the body into two, the police

The recovered body pieces were sent to Sir Salimullah Medical College (SMC) morgue for an autopsy. The victim might have been

slain several hours before the police made the discovery, said sources at the SMC morgue. Meanwhile in Adabar, police

discovered the body of the man, approximately 35 years of age, from an empty plot in Sunibir Housing Project at around The victim's throat was slit and

he had a black shirt and a lungi on. Separate cases were filed with the police stations concerned.

Obama hits McCain, oil companies

Democrat Barack Obama told voters yesterday he would push an aggressive economic agenda as president: cutting taxes for the middle class, raising taxes on the wealthy, pouring money into "green energy" and requiring employers to set up retirement saving plans for theirworkers.

Campaigning in Pennsylvania, a key battleground in the fall campaign, Obama said he would take a much more hands-on approach than would Republican John McCain. He again criticized McCain's proposal for a temporary halt in the federal gasoline tax. It would "actually do real harm," Obama said, by reducing revenue for road and bridge construction even as oil companies make record

Obama planned to visit the flooded Midwest later Saturday, stopping in Quincy, Ill., to help fill sandbags.

Speaking to about 200 people in Wayne, a Philadelphia suburb, Obama made no new proposals but emphasized earlier ones in light of rising gas prices, inflation and job losses. They include a \$1,000 tax cut for most working families; a new Social Security tax on incomes above \$250,000; a "windfall profits" tax on oil companies; a \$4,000 annual college tuition credit for those who commit to national or community service programs; and an end to income taxes for elderly people making less than \$50,000 a year.
