Huge smuggled electronics seized at ZIA

Customs officials seized smuggled mobile phone handsets and other electronic items worth about Tk 70 lakh at Zia International Airport yesterday.

The smugglers, however, managed to flee from the scene on seeing customs officials approaching them, leaving behind a bag containing the contraband on the second floor of the airport.

The seized commodities include 998 cellphone handsets worth about Tk 26 lakh, 1177 MP3 and MP4 players priced at around Tk 23 lakh, 197 batteries worth The budget deficit is estimated | about Tk 4 lakh, 4,140 memory cards for mobile phone valued at about Tk 14 lakh and 177 iPods worth about Tk 6 lakh.

Customs officials said they seized the items on information that some smugglers were trying to take the goods out of the airport.

BEGUNBARI CANAL

300 shanties demolished

The Rajdhani Unnayan Kartripakkha (Rajuk) yesterday demolished over 300 illegal shanties on the Begunbari canal near Tongi Diversion Road.

A Rajuk team led by Magistrate ASM Emdadud Dastagir started tearing down the shanties at around 11:00am to make way for a road network under Hatirjheel-Begunbari Integrated Development Project.

At least 60 workers, 40 police personnel and two bulldozers took part in the drive that continued till 5:00pm.

"We are bringing down the structures as part of our ongoing drive against illegal encroachment to implement the Hatirjheel-Begunbari Integrated Development Project," said Dastagir adding that the drive will continue for five days.

However, the Rajuk could not demolish the filling station across FDC due to an injunction from the court, he said.

Besides, the station owner was negotiating with the railway authorities to get a replacement land elsewhere, he added.

Since March, Rajuk so far has removed over 600 illegal structures from Hatirjheel-Begunbari area to implement the road network.

50 Bangladeshi women trafficked to India a day

Says home adviser

Every day 50 Bangladeshi women are lured to India and sold there, Home Adviser Maj Gen (retd) MA Matin yesterday told the inaugural ceremony of a new police investigation unit formed to strengthen fight against human trafficking. "According to one report, every

day 50 Bangladeshi girls are lured across the Indian border and sold. India shares 4,222 kilometres of border with Bangladesh and most of the border is open to trafficking," The unit labelled "Trafficking in

Human Beings (THB) Investigation Unit" has been set up within the Criminal Investigation Department (CID) with Additional Deputy Inspector General Abdul Jalil as its head. The unit will initially have 12

police officials having specialised training on investigations into human trafficking at home and abroad.

Held at a city hotel, the function

was also addressed, among others, by Home Secretary Abdul Karim, Inspector General of Police Nur Mohammad, Additional IGP and National Project Director of Police Reforms Programme (PRP) NBK Tripura, advocate Salma Ali of Bangladesh National Women Lawyers' Association and THB unit chief Abdul Jalil.

The home adviser said poverty, land fragmentation, natural disasters, landlessness, and demand for dowry push people of Bangladesh to search for opportunities abroad. He added with an average per

capita income of approximately \$500, Bangladesh is one of the largest migrant-exporting countries in Asia. He went on to say most illegal migration flows to India as Bangladeshi traffickers have built

up bases in the border districts of India. He also said an estimated 90 percent of trafficked women are forced into prostitution.

office going people and the students, faced untold sufferings to get to their destinations, as there were few vehicles in the inundated streets. Many were forced to stay indoors.



Musharraf will be replaced soon

Says Zardari

With rival-turned ally Nawaz Sharif stealing the limelight with his fullthrottle demand for Pervez Musharraf's ouster, PPP Chairman Asif Ali Zardari has said his party will soon "appoint" the next president, hinting that the former general's

days in office could be numbered. "The day is not far off when someone like Salman Taseer will be in the Presidency. The PPP will soon appoint the next President," Zardari said addressing a gathering of PPP workers at the Governor's House in Lahore on Monday night.

He was referring to Tasser, a Pakistan People's Party stalwart who was recently made Governor of Punjab province. Zardari said the Presidency will

soon resound with slogans like "Jeay Bhutto" (Long live Bhutto). Though Zardari had last month

described Musharraf as a "relic of the past standing between the people and democracy, the PPP has been lukewarm to PML (N) leader Sharif's demand to remove him from presidency.
