





AFI names top 100 genre flicks

Snow White, Dorothy Gale, the HAL 9000 computer, Charles Chaplin's Little Tramp and Marlon Brando's Godfather share top billing among the American Film Institute's best genre movies.

Films featuring those characters were among the number 1 picks last Tuesday on the AFI's top-10 lists of the finest flicks in 10 genres, including mystery, Westerns, sports tales and courtroom

dramas. The winners included "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs" for animation; "The Wizard of Oz," featuring Dorothy and her little dog, for fantasy; "2001: A Space Odyssey," with HAL the demented computer, for science fiction; Chaplin's "City Lights" for romantic comedy; and Brando's "The Godfather" for gangster flicks.

The other number 1 movies: Westerns, "The Searchers"; sports, "Raging Bull"; courtroom drama, "To Kill a Mockingbird"; epics, "Lawrence of Arabia"; and mysteries, "Vertigo."

Not surprisingly, Alfred Hitchcock dominated the mystery category. Besides "Vertigo," he landed three others on that top-10 list: "RearWindow" at number 3, "North By Northwest" at number 7 and "Dial M for Murder" at number 9.

Chaplin's "City Lights" from 1931, one of only two silent films to make the genre lists, was a surprise, beating such popular modern romances as "Annie Hall" (number 2), "When Harry Met Sally..." (number 6) and "Sleepless in Seattle" (number 10).

"This is why these shows are so important. They keep these films in the cultural conversation," said

announced in the CBS special "AFI's 10 Top 10," the latest in the institute's annual best-of shows. actors, filmmakers, critics and that included 50 nominees in each

Past AFI lists have included rankings of the top-100 American films, comedies, love stories,

screen stars and movie quotes. Walt Disney ruled the animation category. Trailing 1937's "Snow White," the first featurelength animated film, in the top five were the Disney tales "Pinocchio," "Bambi," "The Lion King" and "Fantasia."

Some filmmakers were confined to their best-known specialties, such as Hitchcock in mysteries and "The Searchers" director John Ford in Westerns. Others landed films in several genres.

Steven Spielberg had Nos. 3 and 8 among epics with "Schindler's List" and "Saving Private Ryan" and number 3 among sci-fi movies with "E.T. the Extra-Terrestrial." Besides "2001," Stanley Kubrick had the number 4 scifi tale with "A Clockwork Orange" and the number 5 epic with 'Spartacus."

Along with "Raging Bull" in sports, Martin Scorsese was on the gangster list with "Goodfellas" at number 2.

Major movie franchises were snubbed as fantasy nominees "Harry Potter and the Prisoner of Azkaban," "Spider-Man 2," "Batman" and "Superman" failed to make the cut.

Gazzale said part of the fun of the film lists is the debate they prompt over which movies are included and omitted.

"These countdowns are a collective opinion of leaders from across the film community. Any surprise about an omission would be entirely subjective," Gazzale

Kajol and Ajay Devgan: The perfect 'chemistry

The chemistry between Ajay Devgan and Kajol was apparent even in their early films together. Consider Pyaar to Hona Hi Tha, one of the biggest hits of 1998. An unofficial remake of the film French Kiss (with Meg Ryan and Kevin Kline), the film sizzled as the duo realised their true feelings for each other.

Of late the couple has starred opposite each other in U, Me aur Hum. This is a 2008 Bollywood film directed and produced by Ajay under the banner of Devgan Entertainment and Eros Entertainment. The film marks Ajay's debut as a director and casts him opposite Kajol in what is their seventh film together.

Their individual film careers are impressive and thriving as well. Kajol is a six-time Filmfare Award winning actor and a highly popular face on the silver screen. Born in a Bengali family (in Mumbai, 1975) with a long innings in Indian cinema, she is the daughter of highly talented actress Tanuja while one of her cousins is the well known Rani Mukherji. She is the granddaughter of Shobhna Samarth and great granddaughter of Rattan Bai -- all influential figures in the film industry. Her uncles are Joy Mukherjee and Deb Mukherjee, while her younger sister Tanisha stepped into films a few years

back Kajol's debut film was Bekhudi when she was 17. Though the film was not a big hit at the box office, her talent was noticed. With her second film Baazigar, she chalked up her first major hit.

Among her major milestones in Bollywood are Dilwale Dulhania Le Jayenga, Kuch Kuch Hota Hai, Kabhi Khushi Kabhi Gham. For

the first film she received her first Best Actress Award instituted by Filmfare. In 1997, she starred in Gupt. Her work in the film won her a Filmfare Award for Best Villain. She was the first female actor to win the award.

As for Ajay, the actor began his career as an action hero in the early 1990s and has since established himself as one of the serious actors in Bollywood. The lean and hungry looking actor embarked on his film Kaante (1991) in which he played tion with Ram Gopal Verma
