Campbell fails to qualify for Olympics

World champion Veronica Campbell failed to qualify for the Beijing Olympics in her signature event and Usain Bolt won the clash of the sprinting titans at the Jamaican Olympic track and field trials.

Campbell equalled her seasonbest time of 10.88 seconds but it wasn't good enough as she placed a shock fourth in the 100 metre final on Saturday.

Campbell, the bronze medal winner at the 2004 Summer Games, needed to finish in the top three to qualify for Beijing.

Kerron Stewart won the 100m in 10.80, edging out Shelly-Ann Fraser who finished in 10.85. Sherone Simpson was third in 10.87.

Murali targets Akram's feat

Sri Lanka's spin wizard Muttiah Muralidaran said his immediate target at international level is to overhaul Pakistani bowler Wasim -Akram's world record of one-day wickets.

"I want to take 30-odd wickets to get to Wasim's world record in oneday cricket and try out for 1,000 wickets in Tests," Muralidaran said before his team's crucial Super League match against hosts Pakistan in the Asia Cup.

The off-spinner already holds the record for most Test wickets with, 735 in 120 matches and needs 37 more to overhaul Wasim's long standing one-day record of 502 wickets.

The 36-year-old Sri Lankan, regarded as one of the greatest spinners ever, said he is at a stage of his career where he takes it match by match.

"I love this game, so I want to play on but it would depend on my fitness and how I contribute to the team's performance. That is very important for me because you must contribute to the team's performances," he said.

He added that the game -- with three demanding forms of Twenty20, 50-over one-day cricket and five-day Tests -- has become more demanding.

"I have played all forms of the game and I admit that its getting tougher not because I am getting older but there are lots of expectations in a tight schedule.

Mendis, who took 4-47, then Pakistan to 238-9 in 50 overs on a Silva (46) and 88 for the third with slow National Stadium pitch.

ODI in Guwahati. As an observer pointed out, Bangladesh will have to force India to change the state of affairs. And that will happen if they can beat India more often. And that could be one of the reasons why Bangladesh, so hopeless against meaningful opposi-tion over the last year - they haven't beaten one for a year now - suddenly came up with an inspirational show on Saturday for about 70 overs. That could be one of the reasons why India are the only Test-playing nation they have beaten twice in ODIs. That could be one of the reasons why the last time they scored close to 250 in a

live ODI was against India, more than a year ago in Mirpur.

The ICC's Future Tours Programme by the end of which every Test-playing team should have toured each other twice, ends in 2012, and regardless of how well or badly Bangladesh are playing, India will have to invite them twice in the next three years. The BCB, for its part, hasn't really pushed for a tour either. Perhaps India touring Bangladesh is much more advantageous, commercially, for them than vice versa. "We have been playing Test cricket for the last eight years, but haven't toured India," Ashraful, Bangladesh's captain, said. "I think this is very bad for us. I think if we go there and play, it will improve our cricket. It all
