## Lankan jets bomb rebel air, sea bases

20 killed in fighting

Sri Lanka's air force bombed a Tamil Tiger rebel air base and a rebel navy base, while separate ground clashes in the country's war-torn north left 20 combatants dead, the military said Tuesday.

Military spokesman Brig. Udaya ingraids. Nanayakkara said the rebel sea base was targeted Monday night, while the air base was bombed early Tuesday.

Pilots confirmed that they hit their targets but casualty and damage details were not immediately available, he said.

Meanwhile, infantry fighting across the northern front lines of the island's civil war killed 16 rebels and four soldiers, Nanayakkara said. The fighting took place Monday along the Jaffna, Mannar, Vavuniya and Welioya fronts, he

Sri Lankan troops on the ground have been trying to push into the northern rebel territory from four fronts, while the air force has supported them with near-daily bomb-

The government earlier vowed to crush the insurgents by the end of this year. However, the island's army chief Lt. Gen. Sarath Fonseka told Colombo-based foreign correspondents Monday that while the rebels have been stripped of their conventional fighting capabilities, it may take another year to defeat

Tamil Tiger rebels have fought since 1983 to create an independent homeland for ethnic minority Tamils, who have faced marginalisation at the hands of successive governments controlled by majority ethnic Similalese. More than 70,000 people have been killed in the conflict.

Meanwhile, Sri Lanka's main media rights group Tuesday condemned an assault on a journalist and a senior British High air wing last year to attack military Commission officer and

demanded that the attackers be brought to justice.

Political officer Mahendra Ratnaweera was severely injured in the Monday evening attack in Colombo while his passenger, freelance journalist and defence analyst Namal Perera, also suffered serious injuries.

The incident came less than a month after Sri Lanka's hawkish defence ministry launched scathing attacks against journalists critical of its war against Tamil rebels, calling them "enemies of the state."

It also came days after the government moved to deflect a barrage of criticism over its press rights record by promising to help journalists receiving death threats.

The Free Media Movement (FMM) said it will treat the latest incident as a "litmus test" of the effectiveness of the high-powered ministerial committee appointed by President Mahinda Rajapakse to prevent attacks against journalists.

"We will be closely monitoring the actions taken by the government to bring the perpetrators to justice in this latest criminal act,"

## Pak forces demolish new militant-linked buildings

Pakistani forces demolished two buildings used by militants in the Khyber tribal district on Tuesday on the fourth day of an operation against rebels there, officials said.

Pakistan said it launched the operation in Khyber on Saturday to tackle militants who were threatening the northwestern city of Peshawar and attacking convoys supplying Nato and US troops in Afghanistan.

Security forces on Tuesday blew up an empty building used as a local headquarters of the hardline Lashkar-e-Islami in the Khajoori area, a security official told AFP on condition of anonymity.

The building was previously the residence of Lashkar-e-Islam's founder, Mufti Munir Shakir.

## Musharraf warns against Nato strike on Pak soil

THE DAWN, Islamabad

President Pervez Musharraf told a five-member US Congressional delegation on Monday that Pakistan would not tolerate a recurrence of US-led Nato attack on Pakistani troops from Afghanistan.

"The targeted attack on Pakistan's observation post on June 10 was absolutely intolerable," presidential spokesman Maj Gen (retd) Rashid Qureshi quoted President Musharraf as saying.

He told Dawn the delegation, led by Senator Benjamin Cardin, was told that the unjustified attack, which killed a major and 12 soldiers, enraged the people of Pakistan. Qureshi said the American

senators agreed with the president that the US-led Nato forces in Afghanistan should not violate Pakistan's air space. The president briefed the sena-

tors on the situation in the NWFP, particularly on efforts to prevent Taliban from entering Peshawar from tribal areas. "These senators are visiting

Pakistan to gauge the political situation as well as to know what is happening in border areas," The president said that al-

Qaeda operatives were supporting Taliban and some miscreants to create problems in the NWFP. "But they would never succeed in their nefarious designs," Qurashi said efforts.

The president said the NWFP government was committed to rooting out terrorism and militancy from the province. He explained the government's comprehensive multi-pronged strategy combining political, military and socio-economic development measures.

He appreciated congressional support for Pakistan's counterterrorism initiatives including Fata development plan, reconstruction opportunity zones and capability building of the Frontier Corps.

The spokesman said the president urged the delegation to release development funds out of the \$750 million assistance announced for five years to help improve the socio-economic conditions in tribal areas.

Supporting development activities in tribal areas would be the best way to curb extremism and poverty, the president said,

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### Secret US plan for Pakistan on hold Reports New York Times

Sharp policy disagreements and turf battles between American counter-terrorism agencies have held up Bush administration's secret plan to operate inside Pakistan's tribal areas, the New York

Times reported on Monday. It quoted a senior Defence Department official as saying there was "mounting frustration" in the Pentagon at the continued delay in deployment of special operations teams into Pakistan's tribal regions where senior al-Qaeda operatives are thought to be hiding.

The new plan, outlined in a highly classified Pentagon order, was intended to eliminate some of those turf battles. And it was meant to pave a smoother path into the tribal areas for American commandos, who for years have bristled at what they see as Washington's riskaverse attitude towards special operations missions inside Pakistan.

They also argue that catching Bin Laden will come only by capturing some of his senior lieutenants alive.

The Times report, based on more than four dozen interviews in the US and Pakistan, said al-Qaeda stew-

## Ousted crown prince Paras leaves Nepal

Thirty-three days after his father Gyanendra was stripped of his once revered position as the king of Nepal - and he himself lost the right to succeed to the 239-year-old throne, Nepal's controversial former crown prince Paras on Tuesday left the country for Singapore, triggering speculation about his return.

The 37-year-old was accompanied by two body guards and his brother-in-law Raj Bahadur Singh.

This is his first exit from Nepal since being confined to the country for nearly two years following the fall of his father's absolute reign in April 2006.

Unable to attend the birthday celebration of Thai king Bhumibol Adulyadej in Bangkok due to the restrictions on foreign travel imposed on him and his family by the new government, the former crown prince enjoyed the first and abolished the throne enjoyed advantage of becoming a commoner as his flight to Singapore kings.

Reports said Paras' wife, the former crown princess Himani, would join him within a week with their three small children.

As the former royals remained silent on the departure, there was speculation that Paras could be looking for fresh pastures, unwilling to remain in a land that had inflicted such severe punishment on him and his family. A local daily, however, reported

on Tuesday that the former prince was not fleeing his country. He was merely going to Singapore to find a good school for his children, the Himalayan Times daily said.

Militants killed more US and Nato troops in Afghanistan in June than in Iraq for the second straight month, a grim milestone capping a run of headline-grabbing insurgent attacks that analysts say underscore the Taliban's growing

The fundamentalist militia in June staged a sophisticated jailbreak that freed 886 prisoners, then briefly infiltrated a strategic valley outside Kandahar. Last week, a Pentagon report forecast the Taliban would maintain or increase its pace of attacks, which are including at least 27 US forces and already up 40 percent this year from 2007 where US troops operate

along the Pakistan border. Some observers say the insurgency has gained dangerous Press count.

momentum. And while June also saw the international community meet in Paris to pledge \$21 billion in aid, an Afghanistan expert at New York University warns that there is still no strategy to turn that commitment into success.

Defence Secretary Robert Gates has noted that more international troops died in Afghanistan than in Iraq in May, the first time that had happened. While that trend now two months old is in part due to falling violence in Iraq, it also reflects rising violence in Afghanistan.

At least 45 international troops 13 British died in Afghanistan in June, the deadliest month since the 2001 US-led invasion to oust the Taliban, according to an Associated
