

But after his ruthless demolition of Federer four weeks ago in the French Open final to claim a fourth successive Paris crown, and becoming only the third man to win Roland Garros and Wimbledon in the same year, it is the 22-yearold Spaniard who is now widely seen as the world's top player.

He ended Federer's 65-match, six-year winning streak on grass, a significant psychological blow with Nadal shattered Federer's the Swiss still without a French Open title to add to his 12 Grand Slam trophy collection.

> "It's more of a surprise to win here than the French," admitted

"It's my most emotional win "He's still the number one. He's and probably the best."

Nadal went through emotional turmoil in the four hour, 48 minute final where he wasted three match points before celebrating his victory by clambering over the scoreboard and into the Royal Box where he was warmly embraced by Spanish Crown Prince Felipe.

Federer had his opportunities but could only convert one of 13 break points while sending down 52 unforced errors to the world number two's 27.

Nadal also shattered the myth that Spaniards don't like to play on

"I love playing on this surface. Sometimes if your opponent serves very well it can be a little boring," said Nadal of a final which finished in the gloom of Centre Court at 2116 local time (2015GMT) after two rain delays.

He also admitted that he felt for Federer after pulling off his 12th win in 18 meetings with the world number one, especially after losing the last two finals to the Swiss here.

BFF plans qualifiers

The Bangladesh Football Federation (BFF) will have to hold the Federation Cup in two phases in the wake of increasing teams for the season's curtain raiser tourna-

Already ten teams have sent their entries and another one have showed interest to play in the tournament, which kicks off July 31, beside the 11 automatic choices for the final phase from the B.

Although the B. League committee, which also looks after the Federation Cup, had invited four services teams to join the professional league clubs in the initial stage, four Senior Division teams, BKSP and Rajshahi's Diganta Prasari have officially wanted to

In addition, the committee, headed by BFF's senior vicepresident Abdus Salam Murshedi, will now have to consider Bangladesh Customs' appeal to

"With the number of teams increasing, we have no other alternative but to go for qualifying rounds," said Salam yesterday.

"Customs are not affiliated with the BFF but as the Federation Cup is an invitational tournament, there is no legal barrier to include them,"

opined the former national striker. "We are considering a 16-team final round and in that case, five teams will qualify through the first phase on knockout basis," he said adding that the tournament com-

mittee has yet to finalise the format of the qualifying phase. "We can't organise too many matches in the first phase because it will be time consuming.

"The 16 teams will be split into four groups in the finals with all the group winners making it to the
