Singer Farida Parveen wins Fukuoka Prize

Singer Farida Parveen has been awarded the prestigious Fukuoka Asian Cultural Prize 2008.

The prize instituted by Fukuoka City in Japan and Yokatopia Foundation was officially announced in Japan on June 24.

This was disclosed at a press conference at a city hotel yesterday.

Farida Parveen won the prize for her contribution to raising the standing of Lalon song and promoting it internationally.

The prize giving ceremony will be held in Fukuoka City on September 10. The city mayor will hand over the prizes to the winners.

The other winners are Ann Hui of Hong Kong (Grand Prize), Savitri Goonesekere of Sri Lanka (Academic Prize) and Shamsul Amri Baharuddin of Malaysia (Academic

The Fukuoka Prize was instituted in 1990 to honour the outstanding work of individuals or groups to preserve and create unique and diverse cultures of Asia.

Farida Parveen is the second Bangladeshi to be honoured with Fukuoka Prize. Dr Muhammad Yunus was awarded the Fukuoka

Grand Prize in 2001. Speaking at the press conference, Japanese Ambassador Masayuki Inoue said Japan has been assisting Bangladesh in different sectors since the Liberation War and that the friendship of Japan and Bangladesh

would be strengthened in the future. "The recognition of Fukuoka has once again proved that ours is a rich culture. Bangladesh needs artistes like Farida very much and to protect the original songs of the artistes, we would have to resist piracy through coordinated effort," said Cultural Affairs Adviser Rasheda K

"The Fukuoka Prize is undoubtedly a great achievement for me, for the country and for the people of Bangladesh," said Farida.

Anti-corruption campaign to be strengthened

ACC, TIB to hold youth gathering titled 'Jago Manush ... Durniti Protirodhe Jago' from July 23

Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) and Transparency International Bangladesh (TIB) are going to hold youth gatherings at district level to engage people in strengthening the ongoing anti-corruption movement in the country.

The gatherings will include cultural programmes, cartoon exhibitions, game competitions, information fairs, distribution of anticorruption posters, leaflets, stickers and swearing saying 'no' to corrup-

This was stated by ACC and TIB officials at a press conference at Dhaka Reporters Unity in the capital vesterday.

The first youth gathering titled 'Jago Manush...Durniti Protirodhe Jago' (wake up to resist corruption) will be held in Chapainawabganj on July 23, which will be followed by Satkhira on August 12, Barisal on. August 19, Rangpur on August 26, Srimangal on October 13, Chandpur on October 20, Comilla on October 23, Mymensingh on October 29 and Faridpur on November 5.

The final youth gathering will be held in Dhaka on December 16 or 17, said TIB Executive Director Dr Iftekharuzzaman.

He said local conscious citizens committees and youth engagement and support groups, which were formed earlier under the encouragement of TIB, will help in holding the gatherings.

"Through these campaigns the youths will be provided with various information on corruption and ways to curb them. We are expecting to involve 2.5 lakh youths in this social

movement,"headded. ACC Deputy Director Afzalur Rahman said despite various anticorruption drives corruption at the field level could not be curbed yet. He said during previous awareness

programmes there had been demands from the youths to organise gatherings for them at district level. "Students often express their bad feelings about corruption. We are

encouraged by them and so we are trying to involve them in anticorruption campaigns," he added. Asked about the success of the

youth concerts held earlier in the capital and Chittagong, Dr Iftekharuzzaman said they are trying

to instill values in the minds of the youths through programmes liked by them and the concert is one of them.

"We need values as well as strong judicial system," he said, adding, "We are trying to awaken people who are victims of corruption so that they do not take corrupt practices granted, rather they protest them."

Popular singer Meherin said it is not possible to remove corruption from the society unless the parents, especially the mothers do not educate their children to refrain from involving themselves in corrupt practices.

Earlier, youth gatherings were held at Gulshan Youth Club in Dhaka on March 8 and at Patia of Chittagong on May 10 and 11 this year, said TIB Senior Advocacy Officer Sazzad Hussain in a written statement.

ACC and TIB began this campaign on December 9 last year.


