
Sayeed Ahmed's book with its cultural gleanings

About his book "In Pursuit of Culture", which was launched at "Etcetra" on July 18th, Sayeed Ahmed speaking to The Daily Star said, "I tried to use my visits to not only see the countries but to dwell deep into their cultural and traditional aspects. When I went to Moscow, for instance, I linked up the experience of ballet with the famous British ballerina Margot Fontyn with that of Maya Plistskiya so that this was a presentation of a long chain of cultural events. In Nepal I met a famous writer and poet Balakrishna Sama and in the midst of the intellectual contributions, I brought out their traditional behaviour and ways of life in the simplest of words.

" I introduce personalities like Khatir Ghaznavi of Pakistan, and other individuals of international fame, like the Russian poet Syed Akhmet, with whom I've had cross cultural exchanges. When I took the Bangladeshi cultural delegation to Tashkent, along with Bobita, we met famous Russian actresses so that there was a humanlink.

"In my writings I brought in Boris Pasternak and Yevtushenko, who are dear to the hearts of the freedom loving Bangladeshis, along with the sending of the Russian astronauts into space, which had an appeal even to the common man. I tried to punch human interest and humour into the travelogue, as when we got theatre tickets in Russia by bribing with ball point pens."

What comes out in the book is Sayeed Ahmed's passion for culture. Wherever he goes he is always in the look out for cultural institutions, personalities and activities."

Aly Zaker, media personality, said, "Sayeed Ahmed brings to life difficult things in a simple language. He looks into the fascinating and varied cultures of different counties without making the book heavy reading. When he discusses the fate of the Buddhist statues in Afghanistan he deals with the subject with compassion but does not run down anyone.

"He is an individual who can discuss absurdity in plays with authority and alacrity. Similarly he can talk about abstraction in fine arts as about traditional art. His knowledge of music too is profound. His presentation of Brecht's personal life is also fascinating too."

At a recent concert in New Delhi, the internationally reputed vocalist, music teacher and composer did justice to her entire repertoire. As she pointed out at the outset, "Inspired by the original English, Scottish and Irish music, Tagore used similar tunes in Bengali numbers."

Explains Keya, "The aim was to promote Bangla and Hindi numbers, using Eastern and Western music and international folk fusion. While the words and tunes were kept intact, the style, presentation and musical arrangement were different."

Torched Hendrix guitar to be sold



The guitar was burnt across its surface, but remained intact.

The guitar torched by late rock at his family home, where it was cert, but experts now favour Garlegend Jimi Hendrix during a live performance in London is expected to fetch £500,000 at auction in September.

The 1965 Fender Stratocaster was doused with lighter fuel and set on fire by Hendrix at the London Astoria in 1967.

It was the first time Hendrix had set his guitar on fire. He later repeated the stunt at the Monterey Pop Festival.

Hendrix was taken to hospital following the Astoria stunt, where he was treated for minor burns.

The guitar was recovered by the rock star's press officer and close friend, Tony Garland, who stored it

rediscovered last year. "When Hendrix set this guitar

alight it marked a watershed in live performance," said Ted Owen, director of acquisitions at the auction house, The Fame Bureau, which is holding the sale on 4 September.

"He raised the bar of what could be expected and paved the way for a series of imitations and pastiche that exist to this day." Another guitar set alight during

a concert in Miami in 1968 failed to sell at auction in 2002.

That guitar was previously assumed to be the same guitar that was set alight at the London con-
