Where orphans, destitute children feel at home

SOS Children's Village Chittagong, a welfare organisation for the children, has been playing a vital role in raising orphans as well as the destitute children of broken families since its journey in the port city in 1989.

The organisation is taking care of 121 orphan and destitute children, some of them are now at university level, amid family environment with educational, health and other social facilities.

It has 12 families each headed by a SOS (service of the society) mother. SOS mothers are usually a widow, a divorcee or an unmarried woman.

The families are housed at three "Paras" (colony) -- Awlia Para, Dwip Para and Pahar Para -of the SOS village on over 1.95 acres of land in the Halishahar A-Block area in the port city.

Each house has everything a middle class family requires. There are separate living rooms for the members of different ages, full-fledged kitchen, veranda, washing corner, television and musical equipment.

The social centre project includes a basic clinic, daycare centre for the children of poor and employed mothers, family strengthening programmie and skill training centre, he added.

A total of 60 girls and boys, who were grown up under the organisation, have passed out of the village till date.

The organisation arranged marriage for 22 female and four male students of the village who are now leading their families on their own. Of the passed-out students,

four are diploma engineers, four are aide nurse and others are working at garments and poultry industries. Kabir said the organisation

has also branches in Dhaka, Rajshahi, Khulna and Bogra. All the branches of the world are run with the financial assistance of six million donors around the world. Only a UK expatriate donates

for the Chittagong centre, he said. Any one's help for the orphaned and abandoned children are welcome, he added.

SOS Children's Village International is the member of SOS Kinderdorf International (SOS-KDI) working in 132 countries across the globe.

Prof Hermann Gmeiner, founder of the SOS-KDI, visited Bangladesh in 1972 immediately after the War of Liberation with Helmut Kutin, present president of the organisation with the proposal of establishing the Children's Village in Bangladesh.

SOS-KDI started functioning in Bangladesh under an agreement with the Labour and Social Welfare Ministry on May 17, 1972.

Passengers hostage to city bus services

Introduction of ticket system for the bus services in the port city has become virtually ineffective due to non-compliance with the traffic rules by a section of owners and drivers, causing untold sufferings to the commuters.

The traffic department of Chittagong Metropolitan Police (CMP) imposed a rule on the city buses to ply through counterbased service on April 14 in a bid to ease the passengers' hassles and streamline the service.

The system was launched to force the buses to carry passengers according to the seat capacity and to stop dropping and taking passengers from unscheduled stoppages.

Besides commuters are to wait for long time at the makeshift ticket counters after purchasing tickets everyday as the buses come after long intervals.

Female commuters are the worst sufferers failing to get into the buses after scuffling amid the huge rush due to inadequate buses.

CMP (traffic) and joint forces in a joint survey said around 50 per cent of 840 city service buses are not plying in 11 routes in the port city despite taking route permits from Bangladesh Road

Transport Authority (BRTA). Deputy Commissioner (traf-

fic) Abu Sufian said around 420, out of 840 buses, ply in different ply outside the city or some carry staffs of different factories in the CEPZon contract.
