AFC Challenge Cup from today

The second edition of the AFC Challenge Cup kicks off on Wednesday with the participating teams given the added incentive of knowing that the winners will also earn place in the AFC Asian Cup in

Defending champions Tajikistan open the competition when they take on Group Arivals Turkmenistan, who along with DPR Korea and Myanmar are taking part in the tournament for the first time.

Bangladesh hosted the first edition of the tournament in 2006 when Tajikistan defeated Sri Lanka in the final at the Bangabandhu National Stadium on April 16.

But the inaugural hosts failed to qualify for the competition after being held to a draw by Afghanistan and then qualifiers hosts Kyrgyzstan beatthem 2-1 back in May.

Tajikistan's victory in the AFC Challenge Cup two years ago was inspired by midfielder Ibragim Rabimov but an ankle injury means that coach Pulod Kodirov will be without the inaugural tournament's Most Valuable Player, while Turkmenistan will be relying mainly on a locally-based squad despite having a number of players who ply their trade for top clubs in Uzbekistan, Russia, Azerbaijan, Kazakhstan, and Turkey.

Only two of Turkmenistan's foreign legion are with the squad in Hyderabad -- Vyacheslav Krendelev, who is currently with Russian side Akmar, and Guvanchmuhamed Ovekov, a midfielder with Kazakhstan's Zhetysu -- while Dovletmurad Atayev has been called up despite being without a club after leaving Uzbek outfit Shurtan.

Hosts India are also in action on Wednesday with Bob Houghton's title-hopefuls looking to build on their successful pre-tournament tour of Portugal when they take on Group A's remaining side Afghanistan, who surprisingly qualified for the final stage at the expense of Kyrgyzstan and Bangladesh.

Group B kicks-off on Thursday when a youthful DPR Korea side takes on 2006 runners-up Sri Lanka before debutants Myanmar face Nepal.

Win gold, win jackpot

Cash incentives worth up to 237,000 US dollars await the first athlete to win an Olympic gold medal for the Philippines, sports authorities said Tuesday.

The pot is set to grow as the country's 15 Olympic athletes begin their quest in Beijing on August 8, they said.

"My fearless forecast is that they will be successful," Philippine Olympic Committee head Roberto Aventajado told reporters, declin

ing to set specific medal targets. The impoverished Southeast Asian nation of 90 million people has never won Olympic gold. The country's best result has been

silver for boxing. A Philippine law mandates a cash prize of five million pesos (112,000 dollars) for a Filipino who

wins Olympic gold. Monico Puentevella, a Philippines Olympic official, told reporters the cash incentives now totalled 10.5 million pesos (237,000

dollars). Corporate sponsors, as well as a number of prominent Filipino personalities, also offered cash prizes of a million pesos (22,600 dollars) for each gold medal and lesser amounts for silver and

bronze, Aventajado said. The Filipino Olympic contingent includes a boxer, two track and field entries, two divers, five swimmers, a weightlifter, an archer, a shooter and two taekwondo jins.

Former Pakistan captain Inzamamul Haq on Tuesday offered to talk to players considering a boycott of September's Champions Trophy, saying he would help to allay their security concerns.

The International Cricket Council (ICC) announced last week that the tournament would stay in Pakistan, prompting fears of a "I'm hitting the ball well and I | boycott by non-Asian countries which opposed the decision.

"If a player has any concern, I am happy to talk to them," Inzamam, who retired from international cricket last year, told AFP.

"As someone who has played at the highest level, I would never advise cricketers to put their lives or careers at stake. But I firmly believe Pakistan is a safe place to play cricket and the players should trust the ICC, the PCB (Pakistan Cricket Board) and the Pakistan

government," he said. Defending champions Australia, along with New Zealand and England, have expressed doubts over security arrangements for the September 11-28 tournament, with players associations

urging a boycott. But Inzamam said any pullout would be damaging, not just for Pakistan, but also for world cricket.

"The players have to understand and realise that if they pull out it will not help the cause of cricket, it may devalue an impor-

development process in Pakistan,"

"Pakistan is a sport loving country and by pulling out, they will be denying the opportunity to millions of local supporters who want to see them in action," said Inzamam, who played 120 Tests and 378 one-dayers for Pakistan. Inzamam hailed the ICC's deci-

sion and said outside perceptions of Pakistan formed by news reports of bombings and Islamic militant violence could be deceptive.

"There are always two sides to the picture, and I think the players need to see the other side of the picture to get to the bottom of the reasons for these acts of violence. They are not attempted or targeted at cricketers," he said.

"In the past, domestic competitions have been played during those tough times and never has a cricketer or a sportsman been affected by them.'

He added that the ICC "has shown great support for Pakistan and has proved they did not want to isolate a country which has been deprived of some valuable cricket in recent past."

The ICC has appointed a task force to ensure that Pakistan implements a full security plan for the biennial event, regarded as cricket's second major tournament after the World Cup.

Former Pakistan leg-spinner Mushtag Ahmed said he was ready to offer advice to any international waverers.

"A player understands another player's language, so I am ready to convince players from England, tant tournament and stop the Australia, New Zealand and South

Africa that it is safe to play cricket in Pakistan. No one is going to target cricket," said Mushtaq.

"I think the whole world is quite unsafe compared to maybe seven years ago. But that doesn't mean that we should stop our routine lives -- the show must go on and it is the responsibility of everyone to beat terrorism," he added.

"Some fight against it with guns and some by showing solidarity. I think to beat terrorism, you have to be a team player and that is what cricket teaches us -- team spirit and unity."

Another former captain, Moin Khan, said Pakistan should not be cast into cricketing isolation.

"Pakistan must not be left alone in this and I hope the ICC's decision would be backed by its member countries," Moin said.

India work on fielding

Robin Singh, India's fielding coach, says India's close-in catching will improve in the next Test with the team working on it in the nets. Dropped catches affected India's performance in the first Test against Sri Lanka in Colombo.

"There have been a few lapses in the past that won't be repeated, Robin said after a practice session ahead of the second Test in Galle, starting on Thursday. "Most of the people are aware of their responsibilities. I feel we had a bad day [in the last Test] but we will come back strongly in the [next] Test matches."

India lost the first Test by an innings and 239 runs and conceded 600 runs in the first innings where four Sri Lankans scored centuries. Mahela Jayawardene, the top scorer with 136, was dropped by wicketkeeper Dinesh Karthik on 55 and 96 while Thilan Samaraweera, the next highest scorer with 127, was dropped by Gautam Gambhir at short leg when he was on 53.

Robin said both players had put in time for fielding practice. "Gambhir is working hard on close catches. Dinesh Karthik had a bad match. He dropped a few catches but it's a part of the game. He is working hard in the nets. We hope to come back strongly."

Robin said the team was in a better mental shape than it was after losing in Colombo. "Everyone is trying to lift their game. Everyone is prepared in their own way. If each player plays well, if we are able to get a good start, the rest can follow.

UN calls for Olympic truce

The UN General Assembly and UN chief BanKi-Moon on Monday called for a truce in hostilities around the world during the 2008 Olympic Games in Beijing.

Assembly President Srgjan Kerim made an appeal to member states to observe an Olympic truce, following an ancient Greek tradition dating back to the eighth century BC. Ban meanwhile said a truce

would provide "a pause in which to reconsider the heavy cost of war; an opening to initiate dialogue; and a window to provide relief for suffering populations."

The Olympic Games are scheduled to take place from August 8 to 24 and the Paralympic Games from September 6 to 17.

Last October, the General Assembly unanimously adopted a resolution calling on member states to observe a truce during the Games in Beijing and help build "a peaceful and better world through The resolution urged all mem-

ber states to cooperate with the International Olympic Committee "in its efforts to use sport as an instrument to promote peace, dialogue and reconciliation in areas of conflict during and beyond the Olympic Games period."

If Jagmohan Dalmiya wasn't the king himself, then he would at least be the kingmaker. That script, penned in the early


