## Use firearms to tackle mugging

### DMP orders cops

UNB, Dhaka

Dhaka Metropolitan Police (DMP) armed its cops with strict orders to use their firearms to forestall mugging in the capital.

This is one of 29 guidelines issued for the 33 police stations under DMP to prevent mugging and protect people's life and property.

For an on-duty police, the guideline says the police will have to use firearms lawfully, if necessary, during a snatching incident.

DMP sources said 436 spots have been identified as vulnerable for mugging. At least 500 muggers are active everyday at those points to commit this crime as an alternative source of income.

Among the 33 police stations, the highest number of mugging points has been identified in Sutrapur area where 39 such crime zones are marked as black spots.

## INCREASED DIESEL, FERTILISER PRICES Aman farming to cost Tk 965cr more in North

Farmers in the 16 northern districts have to bear additional cost of around Tk 965 crore for cultivating Aman rice this season compared to last season due to increased prices of diesel and fertilisers, according to Department of Agriculture Extension (DAE) officials.

Bogra DAE office roughly calculated that cost of Aman cultivation has risen to Tk 12,775 per hectare from Tk 7,160 only due to raising of diesel and fertiliser prices. And total cost of Aman production per hectare this season may be double the cost last season.

Over 17.18 lakh hectares of land

have been brought under Aman cultivation in the northern region with a production target of over 43.30 tonnes. Last season Aman was cultivated on 16.64 lakh hectares for producing 42.71 lakh tonnes.

Diesel price has been raised to Tk 53.43 per litre from Tk 38.81 at Baghabari river port depot in Sirajganj from where it is supplied in the northern districts, DAE officials in Bogra mentioned.

And price of urea fertiliser has been increased to Tk 11.70 per kg from Tk 6 a kg and that of triple super phosphate (TSP) to Tk 68 a kg from Tk 34. Price of murate of potash (MoP), an essential input

for Aman cultivation, has been raised to Tk 45.48 per kg from Tk 30.

Use of TSP cost Tk 3,060 per hectare on an average last season but this time it cost Tk 6,120 a hectare. And cost of urea per hectare was about Tk 900 last season while it has risen to Tk 1,755 this time, the officials said.

Farmer Chand Miah of village Shujabad in Shahajahanpur upazila of Bogra said he had to spend an additional amount of Tk 487 per hectare for ploughing his Aman cultivable land this season.

"I spent Tk 160 per hectare for diesel last season but this time I had to spend Tk 225 a hectare for

## Army may ask Musharraf to resign in a week

### Pak parliament to start impeachment motion tomorrow

The stage was set for the launch of impeachment proceedings against President Pervez Musharraf with the summoning of the National Assembly tomorrow even as he ruled out dissolving the House to overcome the crisis facing him.

In a new twist Pakistan's Army is to ask the country's embattled President to relinquish office in a week's time as its top brass would not want him to be impeached, a news report said yesterday.

Quoting a senior official from the ruling government coalition

partner, the Pakistan's People's Party, 'The Daily Telegraph' said that Army Chief Gen Ashfaq Kiyani has already "whispered in Musharraf's ear that it is time to leave".

"Over the next few days they will make it clear to him (Musharraf) that a protracted battle (against impeachment) is not in Pakistan's interests," the unnamed official claimed.

One of the main arbiters of power in Pakistan, the Army has already publicly declared that the military would take a "neutral" stand on the country's domestic

politics.

"The Army is neutral but is expecting him to resign. It will then influence his honourable safe passage as the Army's senior leadership would not want him to be punished," a former military aide to the President told the British daily.

Pakistan's civilian government is likely to launch impeachment proceedings against 64-year-old Musharraf on Monday, accusing the President of "eroding" trust of the nation through his policies and actions.

## New militant group on the block?

SHARIFUL ISLAM in Dhaka and MONIRUL ISLAM MONU in Bandarban

The ameer of Islami Samaj and six out of the eight of its members arrested in Bandarban on August 7 for propagating Islamist militancy said they have past history with Islami Chhatra Shibir.

The arrestees told law enforcers that a few of them even held leadership positions in Shibir, the student wing of Jamaat-e-Islami.

Another Islami Samaj leader Ansar Ali, one of the seven who were arrested on the same night in Jamalpur, had been detained twice

before on charge of his ties with banned Islamist militant outfit Jama'atul Mujahideen Bangladesh (JMB).

Different intelligence agencies are currently working on to dig up details about the Islami Samaj and its activists, said sources.

On last Thursday, Islami Samaj Ameer Syed Humayun Kabir was interrogated for several hours at the office of an intelligence agency, said the sources adding that the agency did not yet arrest Kabir.

Col Gulzar Uddin Ahmed, additional director general of the Rapid Action Battalion (Rab), told The Daily Star, "It draws our attention

when an organisation distributes leaflets. We are investigating the background of the arrestees and how the activities of the organisation have spread."

During a conversation with The Daily Star over cell phone, Islami Samaj chief Kabir said he was the president of Jahangirnagar University (JU) unit of Islami Chhatra Shibir in 1983.

However, when The Daily Star approached Prof Tasnim Alam, Jamaat-e-Islami's publicity secretary, regarding the matter, he could not confirm Kabir's claim.

## 450 tonnes 'date-expired' powdered milk seized

Customs authorities seized 450 tonnes of suspected date-expired powdered milk at Chittagong Port on Thursday.

The powdered milk worth over Tk 12.58 crore imported by Abul Khaer Milk Products of Abul Khaer Group did not have any manufacturing or expiry dates. They did not have any radiation certificate either, sources said.

Customs officials of the Audit Investigation and Research (AIR) branch opened five of the 18 containers while they were being offloaded at the port. The officials carried out physical examination and found none of the 25-Kg sacks has manufacturing and expiry

dates.

The stickers believed to have the expiry date on them were seen as torn off, sources said.

The powdered milk imported against five Bill of Entries arrived at Chittagong Port by three ships from Malaysia on Wednesday.

The customs authorities will open the rest 13 containers of the consignment for physical examination in presence of the representatives of the taskforce, importer, C&F agent Shaikat Trading and the PSI company concerned Bureau Varitus today, said the sources.

Officials of Customs AIR branch said they informed the higher authority of the matter and sent samples of milk powder for radiation test.

Decision on the fate of the powdered milk will be taken following the test reports, said AIR Preventive Officer Habibur Rahman while talking to this correspondent yesterday.

But officials of Abul Khaer Group and C&F agent concerned claimed they received report of the radiation test in their favour.

However, the customs officials said even if the radiation test report comes in their favour, the importer and others like the PSI company can not escape action for violating import rules.

## 48 rebels killed in Lankan air strike

Sri Lanka's air force bombed and destroyed a Tamil Tiger rebel base in the country's embattled north yesterday, while infantry clashes in the same region killed 48 rebels and seven soldiers, the military said.

The military has increasingly used airstrikes to try to weaken the rebels as part of an ongoing campaign to drive the guerrilla's from their de facto state in the north.

In the latest assault, air force fighter jets pounded a Tamil Tiger supply base and an intelligence operation centre deep in rebel-held Mullaitivu district early Saturday, said air force spokesman Wing Commander Janaka Nanayakkara.

He said the airstrikes were successful and had destroyed the base.

Separately, helicopter gunships

overnight hit a radio centre operated by the Sea Tigers, the rebels' naval wing, in their stronghold of Killinochchi, he said.

Meanwhile, ground fighting continued Friday along the front lines in Mullaitivu, Vavuniya and Welioya regions, said military spokesman Brig. Udaya Nanayakkara.

Troops fought fierce battles on Thursday and Friday, with the worst fighting reported in Vavuniya, where 27 rebels and three soldiers were killed, the ministry said.

Sri Lanka fighter jets also carried out three air sorties over rebel areas in the north on Friday and Saturday, the air force said.

The Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam (LTTE) did not comment on the fighting, but accused the special army commandos of setting off

## 21 trawlers looted, 20 fishermen abducted

Pirates looted fish and fishing nets worth Tk 10 lakh from 21 trawlers in the Bay on Thursday and Friday nights, injuring 15 fishermen.

They also abducted 20 fishermen for ransom.

Fishermen, who returned from the Bay yesterday, said the gang numbering 15 to 16, looted four trawlers on Friday night and 17 trawlers on Thursday night when they were fishing in Kochikhali, Dublar Char, Gabtola, Padmashuli and Chardoani areas of the district.

They said the pirates beat up 15 fishermen as they tried to resist them.

Commander of Coast Guard Mongla West Zone Captain Abidur Rahman said coast guards are conducting drives in different areas to arrest the pirates.
