

2,940 litres of adulterated coconut oil seized

Police recovered 2,940 litres of adulterated coconut oil from a clandestine factory at Elaipur village in Rupsha upazila on Thursday.

An employee of the factory named Pintu Sheikh was arrested but its owner Farid Sheikh escaped, police said.

Police also recovered 40 empty vessels, an oven, an air cooler, a scale, ingredients for making adulterated coconut oil and labels of various brands.

Aug 17 blasts

Charge framed against 4 in Pabna, PWs statement on Aug 26

A Pabna court has framed charge against four militants of banned Jamaatul Mujahideen Bangladesh (JMB) in the case for series bomb blast on August 17, 2005 in Pabna.

Pabna Special Tribunal has fixed August 26 for taking statement of prosecution witnesses of this case, court sources said.

Following bomb blasts at a few places of the district town including Pabna Court and Bus terminal area on August 17, 2005, a case was filed in Pabna Police station on that day.

The investigation of the case got progress after police on December 17 in 2005 arrested Nurul Haque Kawsar, the second in command of Pabna JMB.

Following his confessional statement, police submitted charge sheet in Pabna court on October 30 in 2006 accusing JMB activists Nurul Haque Kawsar, Abdul Awal and Hasmat Ali. Another JMB activist Bokul Hossain was later arrested.

Pabna Special Tribunal on August 3 framed charge against the four accused -- Nurul Haque Kawsar, Abdul Awal, Hasmat Ali and Bokul Hossain.

Child marriage stopped

Drug smuggling rampant thru' C'nawabganj border

22kg heroin, 6.3kg cocaine, seized in 6 months

Chapainawabganj border has become a safe route for drug smuggling and their dispatch to Dhaka and other areas of the country.

An organised gang of smugglers, mostly from Alatali and Shahjahanpur unions of Sadar upazila, dispatch the drugs via Godagari of Rajshahi to other places of the country, said sources in the area. They have built a strong network in the region taking advantage of people's poverty.

Twenty-two kg of heroin, 6.3 kg of cocaine, 29 kg of hemp, 21,579 bottles of phensidyl were recovered in the area in last six months, said sources of Bangladesh Rifles (BDR) and Narcotics Control Department.

At least 1224 contraband injections and 127grams of morphine were also recovered during the period.

The seized amount is only a small fraction of the smuggled drugs, BDR and Narcotics officials said.

BDR in separate raids on Sunday and Monday night seized heroin and cocaine worth over Tk 5.2 crore from bordering Purbo Kodalkati and Uttar Kodalkati villages in Alatali union in Chapainawabganj Sadar upazila.

Acting on a tip, border guards recovered 2.6 kg cocaine from Uttar Kodalkati village at about 8:30pm on Sunday and 2.6 kg heroin from Purbo Kodalkati village the next evening.

In the biggest haul in recent times, BDR recovered 7.5 kg heroin and 100 gram cocaine on May 4 from smugglers at Hakimpur village in Sadar upazila, BDR sources said.

Most of the smuggled drugs are carried to different areas of the country by buses, goods-laden trucks and other transports from areas close to the border, sources said.

Drug traffickers mostly use Alatali and Shshjahanpur unions for their 'convenient' geographical position, locals said. The two unions are close to the border and

virtually isolated from the district headquarters by the Padma River as there is no road links to the two unions.

The smugglers use poor people, mainly women and children as carriers, BDR sources said.

With easy availability of different kinds of drugs, drug abuse has spread to rural areas in most border areas of Chapainawabganj district.

A joint drive by law enforcers will be launched soon to nab drug smugglers, Maj Syed Abu Hasan of 39 Rifles Battalion, told this correspondent. He also suggested launching a campaign by the administration, socio-cultural organisations and NGOs against the menace.

When contacted, sources in the Department of Narcotics Control in Chapainawabganj said their prime duty is to detect drugs and their use inside the country. They have nothing to do with checking smuggling, which is the duty of law enforcers, they said.

Pirates' leader of Sundarbans arrested

Police arrested a wanted pirates' leader of the Sundarbans on Thursday for his alleged involvement in kidnapping 10 fishermen for ransom from Dudhmukhi cannal in Sharankhola upazila recently.

Mohammad Abdul Awal, 42, second-in-command of Raju Bahini was arrested from Mahila College Road in Mongla upazila, Bagerhat. Police recovered 25 live cartridges from his possession.

Earlier, coastguards rescued 10 fishermen from Dudhmukhi cannal on Tuesday.

Bandits numbering 200 raid fishing trawlers to loot fish, nets, money and personal belongings of fishermen in the Bay of Bengal and coastal belts, fishermen said. They scattered themselves in groups and carry sophisticated arms and speedy water transport to commit piracy. They hold fishermen hostage for ransom, they said.

Fishermen have become panic-stricken in the ongoing peak season of hilsa, said Sharankhola Fishing Trawlers' Association leader Abdul Huq Farez.

Shyamnagar BNP leader, 28 others sued

Shyamnagar upazila BNP leader and Iswaripur Union Parishad (UP) chairman Sadekur Rahamn Sadem and 28 others were sued on Thursday for allegedly beating a landowner, damaging his property and occupying his four bighas of land.

Golam Mostafa of Iswaripur village filed the case with Shyamnagar Police Station accusing the UP chairman, his younger brothers Wahab Ali, Dalim, Abdul Halim, Sadekur Rahamn Sadem and others of Banishpur village.

Mostafa said he had been cultivating crops on his four bighas of land at Banishpur mouza for long. All on a sudden, the accused led by UP chairman Sadem attacked and damaged two houses, beat inmates and wiped out planted Aman plants on Wednesday. They also looted away goods worth Tk 40,000 from the houses, he alleged.

When contacted, Shyamnagar Police Station sub-inspector Rasel said Mostafa filed a case. 'An investigation is going on and action will be taken after the investigation,' he said.

However, the UP chairman denied the allegations terming Mostafa and his brothers land grabbers.

Agri staff held for fertilizer scam

Joint forces arrested an agriculture official of Pirganj upazila on charge of irregularities in disbursing fertiliser on Wednesday night.

AKM Golam Rasul, assistant agriculture officer of Shanerhat union of the upazila, distributed 300 bags of TSP among the farmers but showed 350 bags of fertilizer in the record, police said.

The accused was sent to Chief Judicial Magistrate's court Rangpur on Thursday and the court ordered sending him to jail.

When contacted, PSTU Vice Chancellor Dr Harunur Rashid said, 'We will take step to activate the machine soon. Proper utilisation of the tool can save lives in coastal areas from natural disaster like tsunami.'

Fertiliser crisis may frustrate Aman yield in Gobindaganj

Aman cultivation is likely to face a setback in Gobindaganj upazila due to scarcity of triple super phosphate (TSP) and murate of potash (MP) ahead of paddy seedling transplantation season.

This is because of dealers' delay in lifting their allocated quota of fertiliser, said sources in Upazila Agriculture Department.

A total of 30,200 hectares of land have been fixed for aman cultivation in the upazila. Nearly 80 per cent of the total cultivable lands were brought under aman farming, said sources in Agriculture Extension Department (AED). With a view to meeting the demand of fertiliser, the authorities allocated 700 metric tons of TSP and 180 metric tons of MP for distribution among 18 dealers of Bangladesh Chemical Industries Corporation (BCIC) in the entire upazila on July 31. But fertiliser dealers are not drawing their allocated quota of fertiliser in pretext of high price although 13 days already passed, farmers and AED sources said.

Dealers said the present rate of TSP (50 kg) bag is Tk 3,800 while it was sold at Tk 1,800 earlier. Similarly, a 50 kg bag of MP is being sold at Tk 2,373 while its previous rate was Tk 1,400. Price of a bag of urea was also refixed at Tk 590 against its previous rate of Tk 300. Poor farmers will not be able to

purchase MP and TSP due to high prices, they said.

Demand for fertiliser is almost limited as farmers should have to apply at least 10 to 12 kg TSP and 8 to 10 kg MP on a bigha of land, said agriculture officer Khorsed Alam.

The Agriculture Department issued a warning to the BCIC dealers on Thursday to lift their allocated TSP and MP without further delay. On failure, drastic measure will be taken against the defaulters, the warning said.

Chemical pesticide seized

A crime prevention team led by a magistrate seized a large quantity of chemical pesticide from a warehouse at Bangladesh Small and Cottage Industries Corporation (BSCIC) industrial area yesterday, Rab said.

The chemical pesticide was being packed and marketed without environmental clearance, they said.

Md Abdus Sobhan, director, the Department of Environment said there is no provision to repack and marketing any sort of chemical pesticide anywhere in the country without environmental clearance.

The team also recovered a large quantity of adulterated food and arrested Md Abu Taher.

AUG 17 BLASTS IN SYLHET

6 cases may face final report as no clue found

Three years after the series blasts on August 17 in 2005, there has been no progress in investigations in six of the 10 cases filed in connection with the incidents in Sylhet.

Five of those cases, earlier investigated by the police, is now being investigated by the CID while Detective Branch is probing the other one.

Three JMB cadres were awarded jail terms in three cases while trial in another case has started, court sources said.

Between 11:00am to 11:30am on 17 August in 2005, bombs were blasted at 12 spots in Sylhet city.

Kotwali police started 10 cases under the Explosives Act.

Police on 25 September the same year caught JMB cadres Mohsin Khan and Abdul Hai, also teachers of Zaintapur Sengram Dakhil Madrasa.

Under police remand, Mohsin admitted to his complicity with the

blasts at three spots including the premise of Collectorate Building and the court garden.

The court awarded them 10 years RI. Besides, JMB man Akhtaruzzaman was awarded 10 years RI in the case for blast at Ambarkhana.

On 18 October the same year, JMB cadre Akhtar Hossain of village Satpota under Mymensingh Sadar upazila was caught when he was fleeing after hurling bombs aiming at Speedy Trial Tribunal Judge Biplab Goswami at Kumarpura in the city.

Akhtar in his confessional statement disclosed the names of several other cadres of JMB, who took part in the series blasts in Sylhet.

Seven militants are in the jail and facing trial for the blast at South Sylhet Bus Terminal. Detective Branch Inspector Mubinul Islam submitted charge sheet in the bus terminal blast case accusing Mohsin Khan and Abdul Hai.

Progress in the six cases is almost nil as no clue has yet been found, a CID official said, adding that they may submit final report if no more progress is made soon.

Fake captain of Rab arrested

A fake captain of Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) was arrested from a local hotel on Thursday.

Mizanur Rahman Subuj, 26, of Mashkipur village in Atrai upazila, Naogaoan was arrested by Rab while extorting illegal toll from one person named Shanti Ranjan Dutt. At that time, a college girl who identified herself as his girl friend was also arrested.

On interrogation, Mizan said he had been extorting illegal toll identifying himself as a 'Rab Captain' for a long time.

Later, the arrestees were handed over to Kotwali police.
