

Shamim Iskander, younger brother of detained former prime minister Khaleda Zia, was released on bail from Dhaka Central Jail yesterday.

DIG (Prisons) Major Shamsul Haider Siddiqui told The Daily Star that he was freed from the jail in the morning as he secured bail from the High Court.

On July 18, the joint forces arrested Shamim Iskander, former flight engineer of Biman Bangladesh Airlines, when he came out of Khaleda Zia's Shaheed Mainul Road residence in Dhaka Cantonment after visiting his ailing nephew Arafat Rahman Koko, now in Bangkok for treatment.

On May 5, the Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) filed a case with Ramna Police Station against Shamim Iskander and his wife Kaniz Fatema for concealing information about wealth worth Tk 20.47 lakh in the statement submitted to the ACC.

Nasim's release delayed

Despite a High Court order for releasing detained Awami League Presidium Member Mohammad Nasim on bail, a confusion among jail officials has already stalled the release for four days.

The jail officials became confused about the detained former home minister's bail after a news report had been published yesterday about the release of six prisoners from Chittagong Central Jail on August 7, based on fake bail orders.

Deputy Inspector General of Prisons (DIG Prisons) Maj Shamsul Haider Siddique told The Daily Star last night, "Until we verify the bail order, we cannot release Mohammad Nasim, as there are examples of releasing prisoners based on fake bail orders.'

"We will verify the bail order after the High Court re-opens on August 18," the DIG said, although he had told The Daily Star on Thursday night that they had already received all the papers regarding Nasim's bail and that he would be freed by Friday.

Meanwhile, family members of Nasim expressed their worries and said they are frustrated by the jail authorities' 'dillydallying in releasinghim'

Khaleda's brother freed on bail Maoist leader elected new Nepali PM

Lawmakers in Nepal yesterday voted in former rebel Maoist leader Prachanda as the Himalayan country's first republican prime minister, officials said.

The vote in Nepal's constitutional assembly ends months of political deadlock that followed the sacking of unpopular king Gyanendra and the abolition of the 240-year-old monarchy. It also clears the way for the

ultra-leftists -- still listed by the United States as a terrorist organisation -- to press ahead with their vow to radically reform one of the world's poorest nations that was devastated by a decade of civil war. Prachanda was backed by 464

deputies, with 113 against, constitutional assembly chairman Subash Nemwang announced. His only rival was Sher Bahadur Deuba, a three-time former pre-

Prachanda, 53, led a decadelong insurgency to overthrow the monarchy -- a war which cost at least 13,000 lives and shattered the landlocked country's mainlyagricultural, subsistence-based economy.

He signed a peace deal with mainstream parties in 2006, vowed to renounce violence and steered his party to victory in elections to a new constitutional assembly in April.

Maoist number-two, Baburam Bhattarai, hailed a "golden dawn" for Nepal.

"We have already finished destroying the roots of feudalism in Nepal, the monarchy. Under the leadership of Prachanda, the main agenda of the new administration will be nationalism, republicanism, economic and social transfor-



Woes of hundreds in four border villages in Sylhet

Sand and stones from hills across the border bury their homes, cropland and ponds



Excessive rainfall-caused landslides in the hills of Meghalaya in India send sand and rocks across the border into villages near Tahirpur in Bangladesh causing havoc.

Hundreds of families in four villages on Tahirpur border in Sunamganj are fearing further disaster after sand and stones from landslides in India's Kalapahar hill following torrential rains played havoc with their houses and croplands last month.

Rains are likely to continue intermittently till mid-October in the area.

More than 600 people in the two most-affected Chandpur Noyachhara and Rajaniline villages have been made homeless in the July 20-23 driving rains and intermittent downpour that followed.

Some 30 tubewells have gone out of order and 50 small ponds are now thick with sand. About 500 acres of farmland lie under 2-3 feet of sand and stone. The mosque and Gano Shikkha Kendra at Chandpur Noyachhara had to be closed.

Some parts of the two villages remain inundated with stagnant water. The border road from Laurer Garh to Takerghat has been badly SEE PAGE 15 COL 1
