They also demanded cancellation of Lunatic Act 1912 which was formulated on the principle of 'mad and bad should be out of the society'

for persons with severe mental disorders and establishing their rights' was organised by the Welfare Society for Mental Health and Rehabilitation (WSMHR) at the National Press Club in the city.

In a keynote paper, WSMHR

## China expects smooth general elections in Bangladesh

China expects smooth general elections in Bangladesh to maintain stability, as Beijing defined its future relations with Dhaka in four major fields.

"China closely follows the political situation in Bangladesh. Over the past year, the caretaker government has made some strong efforts in maintaining social stability and economic development. China sincerely hopes that Bangladesh will maintain its stability and hold a smooth general election," said Chinese Assistant Foreign Minister Hu Zhengyue.

In an interview with UNB in Beijing, Hu said China would build stronger ties with the country in four fields -- increase high-level contacts; strengthen business ties and address trade imbalance; At least five workers were injured expand cooperation in agriculture, education and science and technology where the potential is great; and maintain support and coordination in international and regional affairs.
