Zanita Ahmed Jhilik was crowned as "Shera Kontho 2008"

Jhilik is a student of class IX at Mohammadpur Preparatory High School and was one of the youngest contestants in Shera Kontho.

Md. Animul Islam Romel and Md. Mahmudul Haque Imran jointly won the second position. The third position went to Sharmin Siddiqui, the youngest contestant of Shera Kontho -- a 13-year-old from Madaripur.

The winner of Shera Kontho received an amount of Tk 10 lakh, the runner-ups jointly won Tk seven lakh and the third position holder won Tk three lakh.

National Film Awards for the last fours years announced

The government has announced National film Shasti, best actress (Shabnur) for Dui Nayaner awards for the years 2004, 2005, 2006 and 2007 recently, says a press release. An eleven-member jury board chaired by the additional secretary of the Ministry of Information selected the winners in different categories.

For the year 2004, 15 awards; for 2005, 13 awards; for 2006, 16 awards and for 2007, 14 awards were announced.

For the year 2004, Jaijatra received seven awards including best producer (Tauquir Ahmed), best director (Tauquir Ahmed), best music director (Shujeo Shyam), best supporting actress (Mehbuba Mahnur Chandni), best scriptwriter (Amjad Hossain), best screenplay (Tauquir Ahmed) and best cinematographer (Rafiqul Bari; posthumous). Samageet celebrates the birth centenary of Manik Bandyopadhyay

May 19, 2008 marked the birth centenary of Manik Bandyopadhyay (1908-1956), one of

the most influential novelists in Bengali Literature. Samageet, a Narayanganj-based progressive cultural organisation, celebrated the occasion on August 30 with a discussion

and a cultural programme at the Ali Ahmed Municipal Library auditorium, Narayanganj.

Hasan Zafrul Bipul, a little magazine activist and member of Samageet, presented the main essay at the discussion. Litterateur Mamun Hossain from Rajshahi, poet-writer Kajal Shahnewaz and columnist Faruk Wasif were the discussants at the event presided over by the convenor of Samageet, Amol-Akash. In his well-written paper, Bipul touched on different aspects of Manik's bohemian and dynamic life and writings -including a brief discussion on his three Nadir Majhi and Diba Ratrir Kabyo.

Chinese extravaganza uses valley as a backdrop

Midway through the grand spectacle "Zen Shaolin," a blue-robed monk on a huge outdoor stage crowded with martial-arts performers appears to banish evil spirits rhythmically with his fists in an artistic meditation of motion and fury.

The extravaganza, with a cast of 500, is staged after nightfall in a valley that sits before a huge mountain in central Henan Province, one of the cradles of Chinese civilisation.

For those who were dazzled by the opening of the Beijing Olympics earlier this month, that ceremony had its roots in shows like this one, which with government backing and private financing are drawing huge audiences to some of China's most scenic or historic spots.

In the new China, investors and the government can team up to acquire a mountain, hire the Academy Award-winning composer Tan Dun and the internationally known dancer and choreographer Huang Dou Dou, and produce a spectacle that includes monks from the famed Shaolin Temple.

And an artiste can dare to create music with the sounds of stones being slapped, wind whistling through the brush and recordings of monks chopping at water in a

nomic boom. And that has begun to happen. More than 300,000 visitors have seen the show in the last 16 months. (The production plays most days, except during the coldest winter months.) NBC came earlier this year to tape a segment that was broadcast during its Olympics coverage. The show employs a mixture of local people and professionals

who are brought in. With China pushing to commercialise its art and cultural industries, state-owned companies, music and theatre troupes and even military dance ensembles are being encouraged to be financially independent and to create shows that might be exported to the rest of the world.
