








# Crime dons active ahead of Eid, polls

Notorious underworld criminals are coming out of hideouts and reorganising their operatives ahead of Eid-ul-Fitr and upcoming elections, which has resulted in the recent rise in criminal incidents like murder, extortion and mug-

Officials of a number of intelligence agencies said they have reports that at least six top criminals wanted in eight to 10 murder cases visited the country three to four times in the last six months from their hideouts allegedly in India and had meetings with their associates.

## Wasa plans 20pc hike in water tariff

Dhaka Wasa is planning to increase water tariff by 20 percent, only after a month it slapped a five percent increase in tariff.

(MD) engineer M Raihanul Abedin said, "The Board has approved increasing water tariff by 20 percent and the proposal has already been sent to the LGRD ministry for final decision."

"The Dhaka Wasa Board has the mandate to increase tariff up to five percent annually. The Board increased tariff by five percent in July after three years. But it is not sufficient to meet the expenditure as the salary of Wasa employees were increased by 20 percent," he

## Tac chief missing corrupt politicians

Politicians are not facing the Truth and Accountability Commission (Tac) as it would bar them from contesting polls for the next five years, Tac Chairman Justice Habibur Rahman Khan yesterday.

The Tac chief however said he is not sure whether the graft-accused are disclosing full information about their ill-gotten wealth.

"We did not get expected response from politicians although the commission was primarily planned for them. So, we could not make much progress. Still there is time, and politicians might come to us towards the end of the time limit (September 30)," he said at a press briefing.

"Politicians will become nonentity (in political arena) once they confess to corruption before Tac,

and they will be ineligible to participate in elections for the next five years. They are not coming to us just because of this as preparations for elections are going on," said the Tac chairman.

Replying to a question, he said he did not know if the restriction on corrupt politicians' participation in polls would be lifted or not.

He told another questioner, the deadline for applying to the commission for clemency might be extended if people demand and the press supports it.

Referring to disclosure made so far by those accused of corruption, Justice Habibur said,

"It is not known whether the graft-accused are disclosing full information about their ill-gotten wealth or they are depositing part of that wealth. But it is clear to me

The US military chief vowed yesterday to respect Pakistan's sovereignty, the American Embassy said a commitment apparently aimed at easing controversy over a rash of US attacks on militant havens near the border with Afghanistan. Admiral Mike Mullen, chairman

of the joint chiefs of staff, arrived in Pakistan late Tuesday to discuss a range of issues, including ways to improve coordination and cooperation, in the wake of Pakistani anger over a Sept. 3 ground attack by US commandos in a border area. He met separately with army

Gilani for what an embassy statement called "extremely frank, positive and constructive" discus-Meanwhile, US Defence Secretary Robert Gates, during a visit to Kabul yesterday, expressed "personal regret" for recent US airstrikes that killed Afghan civil-

said at a news conference, "As I told them, I offer all Afghans my sincere condolences and personal regret for the recent loss of innocent life as a result of coalition airstrikes."

Gates said the US military takes extraordinary precautions to avoid civilian casualties, but added, "It is clear that we have to work even harder." He told Afghan officials that he would be discussing the issue with American commanders and pilots on Wednesday.

Later, Gates flew to Bagram, the

main US base in Afghanistan. Admiral Mike Mullen arrived the same day in Pakistan as its army said its forces have orders to open fire if US troops launch another chief Gen Ashfaq Parvez Kayani raid across the Afghan border, and Prime Minister Yousuf Raza raising the stakes in a dispute over how to tackle militant havens in
