BNP, allies stand against electoral reforms

Ask EC to hold JS polls as per previous laws

BNP and its allies yesterday told the Election Commission (EC) they will not accept the new electoral provisions being implemented in the upcoming parliamentary polls.

Sitting with the EC separately, BNP, Jamaat-e-Islami and Islami Oikya Jote (IOJ) also called for scrapping of constituency redemarcation and immediate withdrawal of the state of emergency.

Minor tremor jolts Dhaka

A minor earthquake shook the capital and parts of the country yesterday evening causing panic among the people.

The Meteorological department said the tremor measuring 4.8 on the Richter scale struck at 5:16pm. Its epicentre was 76 kilometres off the eastern side of the capital, somewhere near Brahmanbaria area.

It lasted for about 23.12 seconds. Minor tremors jolted the city twice just before iftar. However, there were no reports of damage or

The council of advisers yesterday gave final approval to the muchawaited Right to Information (RTI) Ordinance 2008 aimed at ensuring people's right to information.

New posts will be created in most of the government offices and non-government organisations (NGOs). Officials holding those posts will provide people with the information they seek within 20 days of receipt of applications from them, says the ordinance.

But in cases of issues concerning a person's life and death, arrest and release from jail, the officials will have to provide primary information within 24 hours, it says. The widely-debated law ensures

people's right to information from organisations run with public money, and the NGOs using foreign funds, Information Secretary Jamil Osman, who placed the proposal before the council of advisers, told The Daily Star last night.

The law covers government offices down to upazila level. "The rest of the local governwill be covered by the laws on different local bodies which have provisions for ensuring people's access to information," the information secretary said.

The RTI ordinance with 36 sections and a schedule of six security and intelligence agencies, which cannot be asked for information, has a list of about 20 instances of exemption from disclosure of information, an official said seeking anonymity.

The government said the new law will increase transparency and accountability, reduce corruption and establish good governance in government offices and NGOs.

Politics, poll process need some reforms thru' consensus Observes Dr Wahiduddin

Former adviser to a caretaker government Dr Wahiduddin Mahmud yesterday said some kind of reforms should be brought into the country's politics and electoral process through a consensus among the parties before the next parliamentary elections.

"It is not acceptable that no reforms measure would be taken when the election is getting closer. Some reforms in politics like transparency of political parties' fund management should be ensured," said Mahmud, also an eminent economist.

He said, "For a transition to sustainable democracy such reforms and consensus are needed." He made the remarks while
