After a pause of about 20 months, Awami League (AL)-led grand electoral alliance is about to be resurrected again, as its key leaders are scheduled to meet for iftar today, ahead of the parliamentary election scheduled for December 18.

Leaders of the components of AL-led 14-party coalition, and of Jatiya Party (JP-Ershad), Bikalpadhara Bangladesh (BDB), Liberal Democratic Party (LDP), Jatiya Party (JP-Manju), the Communist Party of Bangladesh, Misbaur Rahman led Islami Oikya Jote (IOI), Zaker Party, and of some other parties which had not been in the grand alliance earlier, have been invited to the iftar in a community centre in the capital.

Bangladesh Energy Regulatory Commission (BERC) will hold public hearings from today on proposed hike in gas prices ranging up to 65 percent.

On conclusion of the hearings, the commission will announce its final decision by October 30.

The state-owned Petrobangla has proposed the price hike. Earlier, BERC in an initial hearing had accepted the proposal placed by the Petrobangla subject to eliciting public opinion about the raise.

Mayors of five city corporations yesterday said holding of parliamentary elections and upazila polls within a short span of time would hamper both.

It would be difficult to ensure coordination in electoral activities as well as in administrative and security duties in holding the elections with such narrow gaps as announced, they said.
