Strong political will vital to women empowerment

Roundtable on women rights told

Women have to be brought into the mainstream of national development process through economic and political empowerment in order to accelerate poverty alleviation in the country.

At a roundtable in the city yesterday, women leaders and politicians said only strong political will can succeed in making women's empowerment a reality by eliminating all kinds of violence and

discrimination against women. PRIP Trust, Oxfam GB and The Daily Star jointly organised the roundtable on "Women as Citizen: Ensuring women rights in the light of Poverty Reduction Strategy Paper (PRSP)" at The Daily Star

office in the city. Participants at the dialogue

suggested that all political parties keep 33 percent of nominations from their parties for women leaders in the upcoming elections.

Former adviser to the caretaker government Sultana Kamal said the state has to take responsibility in empowering women economically and politically.

"Most women like to keep themselves invisible. Visibility of women will have to be ensured to reduce poverty because development is not possible ignoring women who constitute almost half of the entire population," the executive director of Ain O Salish Kendra (ASK) said addressing the roundtable.

Awami League Presidium Member Motia Chowdhury said her party will try to ensure 33 percent nomination for women candidates in the upcoming election.

"Reduction of poverty is impossible without addressing the issues of discrimination, deprivation, devaluation and injustice against women," she said.

Motia criticised the PRSP saying poverty cannot be eradicated with the help of PRSP prescribed by foreign donor agencies.

"An additional four crore people are now living under the line of poverty due to price hike of essentials. What is the benefit of the PRSP when poverty has been increasing during its implementation?" she

She said politicians do not have any confidence in PRSP.

Jatiya Samajtantrik Dal (JSD) President Hasanul Haque Inu said his party would try to ensure women's nomination for 100 seats in the parliament from the Awami

League led 14-party alliance.

"Around 85 percent of women are now living under the poverty line. We have to bring these women into the mainstream and that is only possible when their economic and political empowerment can be ensured," he said.

Kaniz N Siddique, international consultant at the finance ministry, presented the keynote paper at the roundtable. She said women should be given space in political parties so that they can play a vital role in policy-making.

She also suggested one-third women representation in all parliamentary standing committees.

Workers Party of Bangladesh President Rashed Khan Menon said women have an immense contribution in the country's SEE PAGE 15 COL 1

Pakistan troops kill 16 militants

Gunmen kidnap Polish engineer

Pakistani troops killed at least 16 least 27 troops have also died. Taliban militants after coming under attack in a tribal region near the Afghan border, a security official said yesterday. Militants attacked three mili-

tary posts near Khar, the main town in the restive Bajaur tribal district, late Saturday, but soldiers repulsed them with artillery and mortar fire, the official told AFP.

Early Sunday, helicopter gunships and fighter jets bombed militant positions in three villages in the district, he said.

"According to information gathered here 16 miscreants (militants) have been killed in the intense fighting since overnight," the official said.

There were no immediate reports of any military casualties, he said.

Pakistan's forces have launched a number of major military offensives in recent weeks against militants in Bajaur, which is thought to how to rescue him, an officer told be an al-Qaeda stronghold.

The Pakistani military says more than 1,000 extremists have been killed in the six-week operation, including al-Qaeda's opera-

tional commander in Bajaur,

Earlier gunmen on Sunday kidnapped a Polish engineer in northern Pakistan, and shot dead his two drivers and a security guard during the abduction, police said.

The kidnapping took place near the village of Pind Sultani in Attock district of Punjab province, about 110km northeast of Islamabad, police said.

"Three Pakistanis, a security guard and two drivers, were shot dead by unknown gunmen as they kidnapped Peter Stanczak, a Polish engineer working with an oil company in the area," police official Kazim Ali told AFP.

The gunmen left the engineer's company car at the scene, fleeing in their own vehicle, he said, add ing that police had cordoned off the area to search for the engineer.

Ctg transport workers clash with police over death rumour

At least ten people including seven policemen were injured in a clash between police and transport workers at Kadamtali Bus Terminal in Chittagong yesterday.

The clash, lasting for around three hours, was triggered by the rumour of a worker's death at the venue as police tried to break up congestion on a road.

People bound for their homes at the terminal and on the buses faced acute sufferings during the

A seven-member probe body led by Assistant Commissioner (AC) Iltutmish of Double Mooring zone was formed to investigate the incident.

Police said the clash ensued after a driver of Balaka Bus Service of Chittagong-Ramganj road locked in an altercation with a traffic constable over removal of some buses parked haphazardly on the road by the busy Kadamtali Bus Terminal at around 11:00am.

Workers however alleged the constable demanded bribe from a driver named Shukkur who was trying to drive an empty bus into the terminal. They alleged that the constable hit the driver when Shukkur refused to pay any bribe,

Other workers at the terminal gathered around them resulting in scuffles with the constable, witnesses said.

US House okays N-pact with India

AP, Washington

The House voted overwhelmingly Saturday to approve a landmark pact that would allow the US to provide nuclear materials to India.

The deal still faces obstacles in the Senate, making prospects uncertain for passage before President Bush leaves office in January. Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid, D-Nevada, a supporter, promised a Senate vote on the accord in the week ahead, possibly Monday.

Hoping to raise pressure on that chamber, Bush quickly issued a statement praising House passage and prodding the Senate to do the same thing.

"I urge the Senate to quickly take up and pass this important

piece of legislation before their October adjournment," the president said. "Signing this bipartisan bill will help strengthen our partnership with India."

India's Prime Minister Manmohan Singh, addressing the Indian community in New York where he was attending the UN General Assembly, said "the journey President Bush and I embarked upon is nearing fruition."

"India will be liberated from the constraints of technology denial of 34 years. It will add an important strategic pillar to our bilateral partnership. We will widen our clean energy options," he said Saturday.
