#### Upazila poll dates won't be deferred

Says CEC

Amidst the growing demand from political parties for deferring upazila parishad polls scheduled for December 24 and 28, Chief Election Commissioner (CEC) ATM Shamsul Huda yesterday ruled out any possibility of meeting the

"We are not re-thinking about the upazila election dates," Huda told reporters emerging from a Justice Aziz termed this task of meeting of the Election Commission that discussed preparations for upazila polls.

Replying to a question, the CEC said the political parties must apply for registration with the commission within October 15 for contesting the upcoming parliamentary polls to be held on December 18.

#### Cabinet returns proposal for re-evaluation

The caretaker government's cabinet purchase committee yesterday returned a power ministry proposal to award the contract for 450 megawatt Bibiyana power project to Malaysian-Korean consortium Powertek, asking the ministry to re-

evaluate the bid. Being the lone bidder in the tender, Powertek sought a power tariff almost double that of the past large private power projects like the 450 MW Meghnaghat or 360 MW

Haripur projects. A top official of the power ministry said the cabinet committee wants the tender committee to reevaluate the single bid offer and clarify some points raised by it. The cabinet body yesterday discussed the power ministry's proposal on

Bibiyana. Powertek offered a 22-year levelised tariff of 4.53 cents per kilowatt hour (a unit) whereas the 1998 AES Haripur 360 MW power plant charges a tariff of 2.72 cents

#### 2 top army officials made peacekeeping force chiefs




