CDD Executive Director AHM Noman Khan in his keynote paper said though the policy regarding disability was prepared in 1995 and the Disability Welfare Act was passed in 2001, very few of the policymaking level are aware of it and its implementation.

"Even a district committee regarding disability issue was formed and ministrywise plan of action was taken. But the executive body has little information about it that leads the physically and mentally challenged people to be deprived of getting their rights," he

able children do not get chance in the mainstream public education institutions and cannot enjoy the quota system in public services and rehabilitation programme of the government.

The speakers said the issue of services for the people with disabilities mentioned in the ministrywise citizens' charters are not satisfactory and often absent.

They also underlined the importance of amending Disability Welfare Act 2001 and the policy. At the same time, political parties should also incorporate the issue at their electoral manifesto.

Karmojibi Nari President Shirin Akhter said, "Local government can play an important role in disseminating the information regarding disability and the rights of the disabled. Even area-based list of such people can be prepared by the government.

Industry and Commerce Secretary of Awami League Farook Khan said ensuring total rights of the disabled people depends on political commitment much.

"A parliamentary caucus should be formed to facilitate the activities regarding disability," he added.

Manusher Jonno Foundation Executive Director Shaheen Anam said political leaders should also play a pivotal role in passing the ordinance in the parliament. "Manusher Jonno Foundation

has already formed an RTI forum to work with the issue and is now busy with preparing draft rules of the ordinance that is approved by the government," she added. IT expert Mostafa Jabbar

January next year. "The preliminary test of the 28th BCS will be held on the last Friday or Saturday of November. We've pencilled in November 28," PSC Chairman Dr Saadat Hussain told a press conference at the commis-

Acting on a tip-off, a team of Rab-1 raided Quality Melamine factory at about 5:00pm and seized the urea. Production manager Shahbuddin and four employees were taken into custody.

A Rab officer from the spot told UNB by phone that the factory illegally uses urea as raw material. It procured the urea from Ashuganj and Ghorashal fertiliser factories in connivance with the lo lealers who are supposed to sell the urea to farmers.

Four get life for killing girl in Ctg

A court here sentenced life term imprisonment to four people for killing a teenage girl after raping her yesterday.

The convicts were identified as Khairul Islam Juboraj, Jamshed Alam Samrat, Jashim Uddin and Anwar Hossain. Of them, Juboraj was behind the bars while others were absconding.

First Additional District and Sessions Judge Sharif Uddin Ahmed handed down the verdict.

According to the deposition of the case, they raped Najma Begum, a teen of freedom fighter Nurun Nabi, of Azam Nagar village under Mirersarai upazila in the early hours of January 18 in 2001 when the victim went out of her house to go to the toilet.

The miscreants then killed the girl and left the body on the Dhaka-Chittagong highway.

Father of the victim filed a case with Mirersarai Police Station on the same day while the charge sheet was framed on July 28 in

4th teachers' 1pc result may be registration exams Nov 14-15

The fourth teachers' registration examinations for qualifying for appointment to private education institutions under monthly payment order (MPO) will now be held on November 14-15 instead of October 17 and 18 at 20 district headquarters across the country.

The dates for the exams have been re-fixed due to unavoidable circumstances, a press release of Non-Government Teachers' Registration and Attestation Authority (NTRCA) said yesterday. The schedules and venues of the

exams will be unchanged. The exams will be held in Dinajpur, Rangpur, Bogra, Rajshahi, Pabna, Kushtia, Jessore, Khulna, Jamalpur, Mymensingh, Tangail, Dhaka, Faridpur, Comilla, Noakhali, Chittagong, Barisal, Patuakhali, Sylhet and Rangamati, an official handout said. The lists of the examinees and the exam venues/sub-centres will be posted on the NTRCA's website 'www.ntrca.gov.bd' one week before

The admit cards of the examinees will be sent to their respective exam venues/sub-centres at the same time. The test on school-level compulsory subjects will be held on November 14 (Friday) from 9:00am to 12:00pm and the optional subjects from 2:00pm to 5:00pm.

In the same way, the exam on college-level compulsory subjects will held on November 15 (Saturday) from 9:00am to 12:00pm and optional subjects from 2:00pm to 5:00pm.
