# Pakistan hints at N-deal with China

Zardari in Beijing for talks

AFP, Islamabad/ Beijing

Pakistani President Asif Ali Zardari may sign a preliminary civilian nuclear pact with China during his state visit to the country, Pakistan's ambassador to China said yester-

Masood Khan, speaking to Pakistan's Geo TV in Beijing as Zardari arrived for his first state visit abroad, hinted that a nuclear deal could be on the cards during four days of talks.

"Both countries have always supported the peaceful use of civil nuclear energy," Khan said, according to the station's website, adding that an agreement was "expected in this connection."

India, Pakistan's arch-rival, signed a major pact with the US last week opening up sales of civilian nuclear technology to India for the first time in three decades.

Pakistani Prime Minister Yousuf Raza Gilani has demanded a similar agreement with the United

Pakistan, which has one Chinese-built nuclear power station and another under construction, suffers severe electricity shortages with increasing numbers of black-outs in Islamabad and nuclear energy industry.

The government has an "energy security plan" envisaging an increase in nuclear power generation from the current 425 megawatts to 8,800 megawatts by 2030 to

meet its growing energy demands. Pakistan's nuclear weapons programme has been under the spotlight since a 2004 confession by Abdul Qadeer Khan, the father of its nuclear programme, that he sold atomic secrets to Iran, Libya and North Korea.

### Machinery gutted in RMG factory fire

A fire gutted fabrics, machinery and other valuables at a garment factory

at Boardbazar in Gazipur yesterday. Witnesses said the fire originated from fabrics warehouse on the first floor of the seven-storey garment factory -- East-West Industrial Park-- at about 8:00am. The flames quickly spread to other

floors of the building. Fire fighters from five stations took about four hours to put out

the blaze. Officials at the Fire Service and Civil Defence Headquarters said the fire gutted at least 60 machines, around 70 lakh metres of fabrics and other valuablesworthaboutTk10crore.

Bangladesh Garment Manufacturers and Exporters Association (BGMEA) however said the fire damaged property worth about Tk 20 crore.

A press release issued by it said the fire damaged all the seven units of the factory. None was injured in the incident.

Our Gazipur correspondent adds: Amanullah Miah, station officer of Gazipur Fire Station, quoting the factory authorities said the fire originated from electric short circuit.

### Polls must on Dec 18 for democracy's sake

Roundtable told

The parliament elections have to

be held on the scheduled date of December 18 in the interest of democratic process, speakers at a roundtable said yesterday.

Though some of the discussants expressed their doubts over holding of the polls on the scheduled date, they all agreed that there is no alternative to an election to restore

democracy The roundtable titled 'Upcoming election and expectations of the citizens' was organised by Shushashoner Janney Nagorik (Shujan) at the Cirdap auditorium

in the capital yesterday. Shujan President Prof Muzaffer Ahmad said, "Though there is doubt and uncertainty over the election, as a citizen I think the election should be held and everybody has responsibilities in this

regard." An election is the only way out of the current situation, he said, adding, "There is no alternative to an election if we want democracy to be restored in the country."

Prof Muzaffer said that to establish good governance in the country, honest and competent candi dates should be nominated in the elections so that the elected lawmakers make the parliament effec-

The political parties have a vital responsibility in this regard, he said, adding that voters also have similar responsibilities in casting their votes for capable candidates.

He criticised the dialogues between the government and political parties saying, "Dialogues would not be necessary if the government could take a firm stand on some matters."

Former adviser to a caretaker government and former inspector general of police (IGP) ASM Shahjahan said important issues like withdrawal of the state of emergency are yet to be settled.

Uncertainties over the polls would not have been arisen if the government had settled these matters before, he said, adding, "Many critical tasks lie ahead of us right now."
