"To do well in the Test match, we should bat eight out of 15 sessions in two innings," said Mohammad Ashraful in yesterday's pre-match press conference at the Chittagong Divisional Stadium.

added the ace batsman, who added that playing session-by-session should be his side's main goal.

Bangladesh are playing a Test eight batsmen to match after a gap of seven months (since April), similar to a 13-month break between the series against tain's edict ahead Australia at home in 2006 till the New Zealand tour earlier this year.

"We have been preparing to play Test matches in the last seven months, when we didn't play a Test. We had many national players in England where they played several four-day games for the A team and we have two guys who have toured to South Africa and Sri Lanka with "A good result can be expected if the Academy," said Ashraful before reminding everyone that his side performed well after the year-long

break back in 2006-07.

"After the 13-month break, we played two good Tests where we had a good start in New Zealand and pushed South Africa very hard (in Dhaka).

I think our bowlers have done well in the last few tournaments and a few batsmen were good too," said Ashraful. He also hoped that the wicket is nothing like the one they had against South Africa back in March this year when Dale Steyn wrecked havoc in the Tigers camp.

"(Dale) Steyn bowled at 140kph and it came to the bat at the same speed but normally we see that the ball comes 10-12kph slower in these wickets. It was two-paced last time so I hope it is better now,"

informed Ashraful

But all that everyone worries about is the lack of a genuine Test match spinner in the lineup and it is alarming to find out the record of the two main left-arm spinners in this team.

Razzak has two Test wickets at a staggering average of 168.5 while Shakib has three wickets in six Tests. Add to that the heat and it is not unlikely that if the allimportant toss falls on the wrong side, it could be a very long Test match for Bangladesh.

"Rafique bhai (Mohammad Rafique) retired after the last Test we played and I hope Razzak and Shakib continue his good job," said Ashraful.

Bangladesh have gone for both Mehrab Hossain and debutant Nayeem Islam, leaving aside seamer Syed Rasel from the lineup. And with Rajin Saleh making a long-awaited comeback, the batting order looks heavy on paper. Rajin and Mehrab last played in the Sri Lanka tour in 2007 even though they had been in the Test or ODI squad for several series.

Mehrab will be under the microscope from the word go as one bad knock could see him give his place to Rokibul Hasan while Rajin said he hoped he can do the job that is expected of him.

"I want to take responsibility as a senior batsman and I know that is why I have been called up," said the Sylhet batsman, who played 22 Test matches for Bangladesh but knows the pain of sitting out a lot of games.

## 'On-field umps | Vettori warns hosts should be in total charge'

He played alongside Aftab The two on-field umpires should be in charge of the review system, since they are the ones held responsible for any errors, a senior International Cricket Council (ICC) official has said. The system, first trialled internationally on India's recent tour of Sri Lanka, will be tried out in four more series over the next few months.

Dave Richardson, the ICC's manager for cricket operations, said there were concerns the on-field umpires were not totally in charge of referrals and left most to the third umpire. "The only disappointment [during the Sri Lanka series] was that the third umpire ruled the roost. We want the on-field umpires to be in total charge all the time.

"It's good for the game as well as the umpires who carry the stigma for giving wrong decisions throughout their life [in the absence of such a system]. It gives them an opportunity to rectify their mistakes. It also eliminates umpiring controversies and brings back SEE PAGE 18 COL 1

The two spinners will do the Vettori warned that bulk of the job with Kyle Mills and New Zealand have Iain O'Brien providing support as the seam options. But there won't be any of the hostility that was on show in the last Test played at this venue where Bangladesh even had Aftab Ahmed retired hurt after being felled by a bouncer. The South Africans were at the Tigers' throat at all times but Vettori believed that it will not be their mode of attack.

> "It depends on what type of bowlers you have. Obviously South Africa have a very strong fast bowling attack and they don't rely on spin that much so that's their plan of going about things.

> "I think we have our spin options pretty well covered with me and Jeetan. I think we also have the fast bowlers to do the job (of bowling short-pitched) if it is required but it won't be our dominant form of attack," said Vettori.

The scorching heat coupled with a typically high humidity in the country's second largest city have become a major factor ahead

many believed that the visitors will find it very difficult to cope with the conditions, the Kiwi skipper thought otherwise.

"The heat will play a role and we have talked about getting the job done," said.

"We just cannot get away from it and I think we should try not to talk about it and just move on and do the job properly," he added but some observed that the Black Caps were sapped during the latter stages of the third and final match of the one-day series here.

Apart from the overhead conditions, the condition of the Chittagong wicket is another talking point. Vettori, however, said that although the wicket looks to be low and slow in nature, it will be

imperative for the batsmen to fire. "To put up a big score on board is always key to allow spin bowlers to do their work," said Vettori adding, "You expect to have the spinners stand up and probably be the main wicket-takers when you come to the sub-continent.
