## Pest attack, blight threaten Aman target in N-dists

Insect infestation and blight of Aman paddy in large areas of northern districts are threatening the achievement of 1.36 crore tonnes Aman production target this season.

Farmers are struggling to protect Aman fields as the prices of pesticides are high. However, government officials say that the situation is not alarming.

Experts concerned, however, warned about pest attack, particularly brown plant hoppers (BPH) locally known as "current poka" in northern districts, and said it may cause massive damage to crops if effective steps are not taken imme-

"We identified BPH on September 10. This was later found in many Aman fields in greater Rangpur," said MA Mazid, princioffice of Bangladesh Rice Research

## racist murder of Bangladeshi

A British soldier was jailed for life yesterday for the racist murder of a Bangladeshi waiter in Scotland, in a case which triggered high emotions and which has dragged on for 14 years.

Michael Ross, who went on to serve in Iraq with the elite Scottish Black Watch regiment, was 15 when he killed Shamsuddin Mahmood in a restaurant on the Scottish island of Orkney in 1994. "This was a vicious, evil, unpro-

voked murder of a defenceless man. The attack was a premeditated assassination," Judge Andrew Hardie told Ross, who is now 30 years old. During a six-week trial the court

## Briton jailed for Pak airstrikes kill 60 militants

AFP, Islamabad

Airstrikes by Pakistani jets killed 60 pro-Taliban fighters in the restive northwest while a Chinese engineer seized seven weeks ago escaped from his kidnappers, security officials said yesterday.

"Security forces destroyed a post. training camp and hideouts of militants in Peochar in Swat valley, killing 60 of them and injuring scores of others," a senior security official told AFP. Another security official said

fighter jets bombed a big training camp and cave hideouts of Taliban militants deep in the mountains, inflicting heavy casualties.

confirmed that 60 militants were killed in the airstrikes and the number could climb once bodies were retrieved from the caves. Earlier in the day, the military said a Chinese engineer had

escaped his Taliban kidnappers and found his way to an army Taliban sources said one of two Chinese hostages they were hold
