




Underprivileged Children's Educational Programs (UCEP)-Bangladesh

Inauguration of **UCEP-Hafiz Mazumdar Sylhet Technical School**








Message



The formal opening of the UCEP-Hafiz Mazumdar Sylhet Technical School is yet another milestone for UCEP. With the establishment of this Technical School, UCEP has its presence in all the Divisional Head Quarters of Bangladesh. The establishment of this school has fulfilled the minimum requirement of a Technical School with four Integrated General and Vocational (IGV) Schools as "Feeder Schools" when commencing operations in any new location.

With the expansion of UCEP Programs to Sylhet a large number of underprivileged working children in Sylhet will have the opportunities of a better life for themselves and their families. The graduates of this technical school like the graduates of other Technical Schools will play a vital role in the industrial growth of the region.

UCEP has come a long way from its modest start with only 60 students in 1972. The enrollment of students now stands at about 31,000 studying in 43 IGV schools and 8 Technical Schools. Our plans to have 9 more IGV schools and 2 more Technical Schools, to raise the total number to 52 IGV schools and the total to 10 Technical Schools by the end of 2010 is being implemented as per schedule.

The development and the growth of the programs have been possible due to the generous support of the Government, the Development Partners and the community at large. I express my gratitude to all concerned for the support for the expansion of UCEP programs in the country. I hope our initial steps in Sylhet will be followed by future expansion in the region.

I take this opportunity to express our deep gratitude and thanks to Mr. Hafiz Mazumdar, a member of the UCEP-Association and a renowned philanthropist for the substantial monetary contribution towards the purchase of the land for establishment of this Technical School. I also request the philanthropists in the country to come forward to help UCEP to expand the







UCEP-Hafiz Mazumdar Sylhet Technical School

UCEP-Hafiz Mazumdar Sylhet Technical School is located at Bateshwar opposite to Jalalabad Cantonment, Sylhet. The school complex has been built at a cost of Taka 4.22 crore (approximately). The total land for the project is 0.8247 acre of which 15250 square feet has been used for construction of the picturesque school building. The operation of the technical school started in July 2008. The building has the option for vertical extension to accommodate larger number of students and open more trades in future.

The initial capacity of the technical school is 130 students in 2 shifts a day in 4 trades each of 12 months duration. A Divisional Coordinator along with the 7 divisional Office staff and 12 trainers are dedicated to ensure quality technical education. The trades of this technical school are Welding & Fabrication, Auto Mechanics, Tailoring & Industrial Sewing Operation and Industrial Electrical & Electronic Control. All have been selected following a market need assessment.

Earlier in July 2007 UCEP started 2 Integrated General and Vocational (IGV) schools in Sylhet which were increased to 4 in January 2008. As per UCEP model of education, the children will first be enrolled in the IGV Schools to complete Grade-VIII. On successful completion of the IGV Education, students will be enrolled in the technical school. In the third stage the technical school graduates will be provided employment support by the Employment & Field Service (EFS) Component of UCEP. UCEP will shortly introduce additional services for the students of Sylhet like SSC (Vocational) education under Bangladesh Technical Education Board, SME credit program for self-employment, overseas employment scheme etc.

UCEP- Creating Miracles for the Working Children

Underprivileged Children's Educational Programs, UCEP-Bangladesh is a leading national NGO working with the distressed urban working children. Starting in 1972 at the Dhaka University premises with only 60 students, it is now a hub of over 30 thousand working children striving to inculcate marketable skills and provide employment support service through general education and vocational training in close collaboration with industries and employers throughout Bangladesh.

The main objective of UCEP programs is to improve the socio-economic status of the urban poor and support industrial growth by generating skilled manpower. UCEP has global reputation for its unique model of human resource development. UCEP's success has enabled it to be listed twice in the UN ESCAP's "Compendium of Centers of Excellence in HRD Research and Training".

UCEP Programs: UCEP operates 43 Integrated General and Vocational (IGV) Schools and 8 Technical School in Dhaka, Chittagong, Khulna, Rajshahi, Barisal, and Sylhet Metropolitan Cities and in Gazipur District with an enrolment of over 31 thousand distressed working children with equal gender ration. UCEP also runs 2 technical School in Dhaka in partnership with Plan Bangladesh and 1 technical School at Fatulia, Narayanganj in partnership with the Directorate of Primary Education. UCEP model of education is well recognized at home and abroad and UCEP is the largest NGO in the country producing skilled manpower for the nation.

Integrated General and Vocational (IGV) Education: UCEP IGV schools follow the curriculum of National Curriculum and Textbook Board (NCTB) in an abridged form. They complete the curriculum and a class in 6 months instead of 1 year the usual time for a formal school. UCEP schools use the text books prescribed by the BOARD and also use its own complete basic education up to grade VIII before they go to the technical schools. Student Attendance and Dropout rates in UCEP general schools were 95.34% and 3.38% respectively in 2006-2007.UCEP General Education component launched SSC program under Bangladesh Open University(BOU) in 2005.

Technical Education: Upon completion of general school education, UCEP students pursue skills training in the technical schools. UCEP provides technical education in 16 trades through 8 technical Schools in Dhaka, Chittagong, Khulna, Rajshahi, Barisal and Sylhet. The trades of technical schools are based on the demand of the existing employment market. Attendances and dropout rates in the technical schools were 94.45% and 2.76% respectively. In 2005-2006 UCEP introduced SSC (Vocational) program under Bangladesh Technical Education Board (BTEB) in January 2005. The result of the latest batch of SSC (Voc) Students who appeared in the SSC (Voc) exams in 2008 was the best in the country as the success rate was over 97 of with 6 GPA-5 holder. UCEP has also launched Diploma in engineering sponsorship program for its graduates who successfully completed SSC (Vocational) and are willing to go for higher studies.

Employment and Field Service: Employment and Field service (EFS) Component of UCEP arranges on the Job training for its technical school students and places its graduates in gainful jobs. EFS operates through labor market survey, linkage with employers, observance of the employer's day ,meeting with the employers; observance of job hunting days/ weeks and follow-up visits to the employers and employed graduates.

Overseas Employment Scheme: UCEP launched its overseas employment scheme under the EFS Component in 2003 and has already placed 105 of its graduates in overseas employment. Overseas employment is the prioritized area of UCEP programs and the number is expected to increase manifold within the next couple of years.

UCEP SME Credit Program: UCEP introduced SME Credit Program in June 2005 for self employment of UCEP graduates. About 300 UCEP graduates are enjoying loan facilities under this program. The progress of the program is highly satisfactory and the recovery rate is 100%. UCEP Multipurpose Cooperative Society: UCEP introduced Multipurpose Cooperative society for the stake holders in March 2006. The main objective of the Cooperative Society was to foster bondage and responsiveness to UCEP programs. The society will also be a potential source of personal and business loan for UCEP students and others concerned.







Bangladesh's potential and challenge are its people. For the country to further grow and develop, Bangladeshi people need skills as well as employment opportunities. In this context, UCEP has been playing a very important role since 1972, aiming to provide basic and technical vocational education and job placement to urban working children and adolescents. A highlight of UCEP is that it provides different alternatives to its beneficiaries. It provides education opportunities, through which the beneficiaries are seen to enter mainstream education, either in the general or in the technical stream. Having 98% job placement rate, UCEP has been successfully able to give a considerable number disadvantaged children and youth from the streets and urban informal work a chance by placing them into meaningful employment within the country and abroad with appropriate high demand skills. It also provides micro credit support for those who opt for self employment.

Bangladesh's Poverty Reduction Strategy (PRS) stresses on the importance of pro poor economic growth as a key for poverty reduction. It emphasises that basic and technical vocational education and relevant skills training are significant measures to improve the chances of the huge pool of unemployed or underemployed for significantly increasing their income, principally in the case of working children and adolescents who have not been able to access school or have dropped out and are already in an employable age.

The Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation (SDC) has been a partner for development since Bangladesh's independence. SDC has been supporting the Underprivileged Children's Educational Program (UCEP) since the 1980s. through a consortium with DFID, Denmark, Save the Children Sweden-Denmark, and previously Norway. In Bangladesh, priorities for SDC are to support the government and other national players to enhance employment and income opportunities for the disadvantaged and to strengthen local governance. The objective of SDC's development cooperation is to improve the living conditions of the most deprived people. In order to achieve this goal with maximum effectiveness and sustainable impact, SDC provides long term commitment to countries and agencies

At present UCEP provides support to about 40 thousand urban working children and youth through its 43 Integrated General and Vocational Education (IGVE) school and 7 Technical Education schools in different parts of the country. I am convinced that UCEP's work in Sylhet will greatly contribute to the growth of education, skills development and employment opportunities for underprivileged children and adolescents and contribute to reduce poverty in the region which is known to be one of the underserved and less developed in the country.


