13 madrasa students held for breaking EPR

HC to hear 3 pending writ petitions today

The High Court (HC) has fixed today for hearing three pending writ petitions regarding the Election Commission's (EC's) redemarcation of parliamentary constituencies.

An HC bench comprised of Justice Mir Hasmat Ali and Justice Shamim Hasnain yesterday fixed the date while hearing the EC's petitions for vacating the earlier HC order staying the redemarcation of constituencies.

EC's counsel Mahmudul Islam told the court that the commission could not publish voter list based on constituencies till the HC order staying the re-demarcation remains in force.

So, the stay order has to be vacated, he added.

Dhaka welcomes artists from Asia, beyond

CA opens 13th Asian Art Biennale

Artists from 27 countries of Asia, Africa and Latin America gathered in Dhaka as the month-long 13th Asian Art Biennale 2008 began at the Osmani Memorial Hall in the city yesterday.

Inaugurating the programme, Chief Adviser Fakhruddin Ahmed urged artists to portray the hopes and aspirations and also the sufferings of people in their works.

"The rich tradition, values and glorious heritage of the orient are facing a challenge in today's extremely competitive globalisation era. The need to further concentrate on the development of our own art and culture is being felt more acutely in this age," the chief adviser said.

"It is my belief that the artists



have the merit and aesthetic sense to meet these challenges," Fakhruddin said.

The CA called on the corporate houses and business community to patronise the development of culture in the country. He also emphasised the necessity of organising talent hunt programmes and better coverage of cultural programmes in the media.

The chief adviser also announced that the National Art Gallery at the Shilpakala Academy, which has only partially been completed, would be completed

A total of 481 art works -- including paintings, drawings, sculptures, printmakings, installations woodcuts and works in mixed mediums -- by 319 local and foreign artists competed at the event.

The grand prize winners of the 13th Asian Art Biennale '08 are Anisuzzaman from Bangladesh for his woodcut work "Complexity 59" Budoor Riami from Oman for her video art titled "The Peak of Burning" and Mazem Al Miestikawy from Egypt for his cardboard work titled "Pattern".

Pakistani airstrikes kill 11 militants near Afghan border

Pakistani helicopter gunships and fighter jets yesterday pounded militant hideouts in a tribal region near the Afghan border, killing 11 rebels, a security official said.

The attacks took place in the Bajaur region, where Pakistani troops and militants linked to al-Qaeda and the Taliban have been engaged in fierce fighting since August. "Jets and gunships bombarded

miscreants today in several areas. Eleven militants were killed and 10 others wounded," a senior Pakistani security official told AFP. There was no independent confirmation of the toll.

On Monday Pakistani helicopter gunships, fighter jets and artillery pounded militant hideouts in a Pakistani tribal region bordering Afghanistan, killing 12 rebels, officials said.

Robbers posing as customers robbed a jeweller's, stealing at least 700 tolas of gold at Sobhanbagh in the capital yesterday. They held the employees of the

shop at gunpoint during the robbery in broad daylight. Witnesses said a gang of at least 15, armed with firearms, explosives and sharp weapons, took part in

the robbery at Amin Jeweller's on the first floor of Prince Plaza Shopping Centre. Of them, seven to eight entered the shop at around 11:20am while

"Seven to eight people entered the shop separately and asked to show them various types of ornaments. According to their wish, the employees showed them the ornaments. The robbers then showed their arms and explosives and threatened to open fire and explode bombs if they cried out for

Vettori denies Tigers

Daniel Vettori, evoking memories of Inzamamul Haq in Multan and Ricky Ponting in Fatullah, played out of his skin to hand Bangladesh a close three-wicket defeat in the Brac Bank first Test at the Chittagong Divisional Stadium

The New Zealand captain, who took nine wickets in the match and scored a fifty in the first innings, played a crucial knock of 76 that spanned more than four hours as the visitors reached a record victory target of 317 in the fourth Ponting and Inzamam had both

struck hundreds in similar circumstances to snatch the game away from Bangladesh and Vettori's knock only saw those bitter memories resurface in the port city.

This was New Zealand's highest successful chase away from home, beating their 164-4 in Australia in 1985-86, and their second best

chasing score overall. More tellingly, Bangladesh again failed to defend a sizable total in the fourth

knock of 76 on the fifth and final day of the first Test against Bangladesh at the Chittagong Divisional Stadium yesterday.

But kudos to the Tigers for trying hard on a fifth day wicket that surprisingly remained as true as it was on the first day.

The Black Caps, on 145-2 at the start of the final day's play, took the honours in the first session despite losing the wickets of Aaron Redmond (79 off 237 balls with ten boundaries) and Ross Taylor (nine off 20 balls). Overnight opener Redmond added 17 before edging Shakib Al Hasan to Zunaed Siddiqui at slip. 24 runs later, it was Taylor's turn to depart as he found substitute Mahbubul Alam at point off Mashrafe Bin Mortaza.

New Zealand went to lunch with Vettori and Brendon McCullum intact but the visitors were jolted as early as the second over after the break, when the wicketkeeperbatsman was adjudged leg-before to Abdur Razzak. Television replays

later showed that the ball had pitched outside leg-stump and would have missed it as well.

But Vettori found his namesake, Daniel Flynn, as an able partner and the two fought hard as Bangladesh's chances slipped away with every defensive prod.

The Tigers did create a few occasions to appeal and one Shakib over saw a lot of action as, if the players' gesture is to be believed, Mushfigur Rahim seemed to have dropped something that Vettori edged. Bangladesh captain

Mohammad Ashraful tried everything but the two batsmen had an answer and by tea, it was all over. Both fell in the end, man-of-thematch Vettori to a wild slog off Razzak with his score on 76 off 213 balls while Flynn (49 off 126 deliveries) gave Shakib his ninth wicket in the match. It was all over when Ashraful,

Pakistan holds key talks with IMF

Seeks endorsement for stabilisation programme

Talks were being held in Dubai last night between the International Monetary Fund (IMF) and Pakistan, which faces the threat of defaulting on its foreign debt.

\$10bn over the next two years for loan repayments and to stabilise the economy. Pakistani officials say they will

only ask the IMF for money if other available options fail. Pakistan's traditional allies, China and Saudi Arabia, have so far

refused its request for help. Correspondents say the country is going through its worst economic crisis in a decade, with massive trade and budget deficits, plunging foreign currency reserves and capital flight.

The BBC's Barbara Plett in Pakistan says Islamabad has prepared an economic stabilisation programme and is looking for IMF endorsement, hoping this will encourage international allies and financial institutions to release emergency funds.

Our correspondent says that if the country. that does not work, Pakistan would be forced to accept an IMF

programme to avoid defaulting on its debt obligations.

But that would be politically unpopular and an option of last resort because of the strict conditions attached, she says. 'NO CASH ADVANCE'

The IMF says Pakistan needs Although the Pakistani economy has recorded some quite robust growth in recent years, foreign exchange reserves have dropped by three quarters in the last year and it is believed there are sufficient funds for just a few weeks of imports.

The country also needs up to \$3bn within a month to avoid defaulting on loans.

In addition to strains on the country's foreign currency reserves there is a deficit in its trade with the rest of the world, approaching 9% of national income this year.

A balance of payments crisis is a possibility, analysts say, which would result in importers struggling to pay for foreign goods, including oil imports from the Middle East.
