"He has recently moved to opening the batting in all three forms of the game in interstate competition and played very well in Western Australia's run chase and victory at the WACA against New South Wales.

"As a replacement batsman on the tour, should the opportunity arise, we are confident that Shaun could fill any role in the batting order. We have also taken the opportunity to enhance Shaun's international experience as we consider him to be one of the promising young batsmen in Australia capable of having a significant impact in Australian cricket in the future."

The third Test gets underway on October 29 in Delhi. India lead the series 1-0 with two to play.

The journey began two years ago with 4,500 footballers joining trials, organised by Canary Wharf, UK, for this final leg where they will spend three weeks at the David Beckham Academy in London. The Canary Wharf Bangladesh

Youth Football Academy, brainchild of the UK real estate company, announced in August 2006 in presence of the then British High Commissioner to Bangladesh Anwar Chowdhury that it would hunt talents from all corners of the country and train them to contribute in development of the game.

From the 4,500, the coaching staff of the academy headed by former international and Bangladesh coach Golam Sarwar Tipu picked up 155 for long term camp and selected the final 23 with help of visiting British coaches.

Renowned for their worldwide support for football, Emirates is sponsoring the whole programme from the beginning.

"This academy started with 4,500 young hopefuls and 23 footballers have been selected from this large group. During this period, we have facilitated the travel of coaches from London to Dhaka for various training sessions. And today we are happy to be facilitating the travel of these young footballers to the home of English football so that they may sharpen their skills," told Emirates' area manager Bangladesh while addressing a reception it accorded
