**Shrimp trader stabbed to death**

A shrimp trader was stabbed to death at Choudhohajari village in Bagerhat on Thursday night. The victim was identified as Eskander Sheikh, 38. The police arrested his wife Parveen Begum and his younger brother Mahmud Sheikh in connection with the murder. The arrestees confessed that they hired a killer to kill Eskander Sheikh, the police said. But the motive behind the killing could not be established yet. The killer could not be arrested as of yesterday evening.

**Man gets life for possessing heroin**

A special court in Gopalganj has sentenced a man to life imprisonment for possessing heroin. Special Tribunal Judge M Sekander Ali handed down the verdict to Rahman Sikder, son of Riju Sikder of Sonakura village in Sadar upazila, on Thursday. According to the prosecution, a case was filed under Narcotics Control Act against Rahman Sikder for possessing heroin on December 8 in 2006.

**Call to take immediate steps to tackle climate change**

Leaders of the Lions Club of Dhaka Central at a discussion yesterday said the southern part of Bangladesh would go under water while the middle part and the northern region would often face natural disasters mainly due to the adverse impacts of global climate change. In view of such a situation, they urged the government to take immediate steps for protecting the country from the wrath of nature as the agriculture sector, the main lifeline of the economy, would suffer the worst due to probable calamities over the next few decades. The discussion on "Global climate change and Bangladesh" was held at the Lions Foundation at Agargaon on the occasion of the UN Day, said a press release. Lion Engr M Shahjahan Khadem, district Governor of District 315 B2, was the chief guest while Council Chairperson Lion PK Roy was present as special guest with club president Lion Fazlur Rahman in the chair. Bangladesh Lions Foundation Chairman Mujibul Haque Chumnu, past council chairperson Nurul Islam Mollah, past district governor Gazi Abul Kalam, Engr Nazrul Ahsan, club secretary Abu Daraj Bhuiyan and UN Day Observance Committee Chairman Reaz Ali Khan addressed in the programme. The speakers stressed the need for taking joint preparation both at government and private levels to face the climate change. Lion Engr M Shahjahan Khadem said nearly one-fourth of Bangladesh would be lost into the sea as the water level of the Bay of Bengal is likely to rise by one meter over the next 50 to 70 years. He said the sea level has already started rising due to continuous melting of ice both in the north and south poles, threatening countries like Bangladesh, which depends mainly on agriculture. "Due to climate change, we are going to face three major problems, gradual fall in agriculture production, prolonged flooding and natural calamities," he said and called for a realistic approach towards combating these problems by collective efforts.

**800 sacks of fertiliser seized**

The police captured a trawler along with 800 sacks of fertiliser in the river Padma in Naria on Thursday. Acting on a tip-off, the police conducted a raid and seized the trawler along with the fertiliser in Wapda area in the afternoon. Action would be taken against the persons responsible, Naria Upazila Nirbahi Officer Haider Jahan Faras said. Fertiliser dealer Dulal Bepari, owner of M/S Mary Traders, said the police seized his fertiliser while it was being taken to his Noapara business centre.

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
